THE CHILD BY DR. MARIA MONTESSORI.

T is the distinction of Dr. Montessori to discovered the fundamental importance of the personality of the child. Much has certainly been talked about the etymology of the word 'education': the root, educere, means 'to draw out': education therefore should mean the drawing out of our latent faculties, the development of personality according to its own laws of growth. But in practice, until Dr. Montessori came on the scene, the child has always been considered as the citizen of the morrow. His one business is to learn to imitate the adults: and the function of education has generally been conceived to be to coax, cajole or bully him into this imitation. The Montessori method, however, is based on the principle that the child has a distinct personality and needs a suitable environment for its growth and development.

In these two beautifully produced pamphlets, Dr. Montessori sets out the principles and philosophy of her method. Place the child in a suitable environment and allow him outlets for his energies. Entice his attention, and create for him opportunities for concentrating his attention and drawing upon the hidden powers of his inward life. Let him be allowed to teach himself and absorb such knowledge as he needs and feels

interested it. Only thus can he rise up to the full height of his potentialities. And the teacher will do well to ponder over the interpretation that Emerson put on the message of Jesus Christ: "Infancy is the eternal Messiah, which continuously comes back to the arms of degraded humanity in order to entice it back to heaven."

It is inevitable that in these brief brochures Dr. Montessori cannot give details of her system or indicate except in the barest outline their underlying principles. But they contain enough material to arrest attention and provoke thought. And we would that everyone, who has anything to do with children, whether as parent or teacher, will persue these pamphlets.

The Art Society of Amritsar have planned a series of brochures on art and related topics. Given proper encouragement, they hope to do even more. "it is, I believe, their intention," writes Professor Eric Dickinson in a stimulating Raison D' etere contributed to the first of their brochures, "to create interest and stimulus through organising more exhibitions on the lines they have already demonstrated from time to time: through public lectures on art history

and approach: in short to leave no stone unturned to bridge the gulf between the much-maligned highbrow and the man in the street, all to the end of encouraging him to take a few of those values connected with man's higher faculties."

In this small book, Professor Roerich has written a moving essay on the saving powers of beauty. He has ransacked the history and literature of the world to gather together anecdotes and allegories that teach of the spiritual value of art and the healing and elevating power of beauty. In the midst of this terrible Armageddon, while the forces of destruction are wandering all over the earth seeking whom they may devour, Professor Roerich would ask us ' to ponder on eternal values, which are the cornerstone of evolution. ' In making this appeal, he bodly challenges the accusation that he is a mere impractical idealist. For to him 'the most idealistic ideas are the most practical.' He is buoyed up by the hope that the darkest hour is just before the dawn, and he is certain that out of this welter of destruction may arise a brighter and a better world. In the meanwhile, he would appeal to the warring nations not to destroy culture and all the monuments that it has created. He suggests that steps should be taken to create a flag, which will be respected as International Neutral Territory and which will be flown over museums, cathedrals and other cultural centres. It may be that the belligerents may not heed this appeal and that before peace dawns again on this storm-tossed world, many irreplacable treasures of beauty will he lost. That does not in any way detract from the value of this plea. And as Professor Roerich himself recognises, the vandalism of war is only one of the numerous enemies of art. "We have noticed," he says, "that the greatest enemies of Beauty are vulgarity, hypocrisy, selfishness, and above all, ignorance." And these remain with us in peace no less than in war.

Let us hope, in the words of Sir S. Radhakrishnan, "that this powerful book by a great seer will have the effect of rousing us to a consciousness of the vulgarity which has afflicted us, and of helping us to escape from it."

Two sketches, one by Nandalal Bose and the other by Khan Bahadur, Chaghtai, add to the value of the book. It is however unfortunate that it should be marred by some mistakes in proof-reading.

The Joy of Art is the first number of a series called 'Art Miscellany'. Readers of this pamphlet by Mr. Nicholas Roerich will surely get what they are always prepared to expect from that well-known Russian artist who has now made his home in India. The idea that man does not live by bread alone receives a new illumination here from history, from the sayings of philosophers, artists, poets, mystics of many countries and from the writer's own personal experience. Art is that living fountain of spirited joy and beauty that has sustained the hungry soul of man through the ages. It has now its greatest task for humanity to accomplish, to aj show the way of escape from the present imbroglio to a type of ordered existence in which harmony will prevail and blood-lust will be a thing of the past. 

We have received the first of this series of Art brocures containing Rishi Roerich's moving essay entitled "Joy of Art," introduction by the late lamented world poet-artist, Sri Rabindranath Tagore and foreword by India's great living philosopher, Sir Radhakrishnan.

Rightly has Roerich said: "Books andimages are rivers that carry wisdom world through, the and are as deep as rivers!" The main object of this series of brocures is "to work to try and remove something which is far more disquieting than any stigma of illiteracy - the stigma of complacent Phillistinism." The promoters of these art brocures visualise practical means beyond the idea of discussions. Their watchword is expressed in the idea contained in the words "Art for young people!"

We do witness how before a ruthless commercial zation of values nearly everything relating to things of the 'spirit' is driven from our lives. "Any" nation which desired to be known as civilized had better enquire into what it did with its spare time, " says a noted public figure. It is true that modern times give an ample indication that there is (I) a vast conspiracy abroad to breed more insensitiveness among the young; (2) "an absolute poverty of ideas, a complete absence of any intellectual interest." Clive Bell blames the educationalists. He says: "if teachers could make ordinary boys and girls realize that if only they will, they can have: (a) life full of downright, delectable pleasures: (b) the joy of being alone in a bed-sitting room with an alert, well-trained and well-stocked mind and a book (better than a glass of champagne)."

Thus the teachers would have solved the central problem of humanity. But wha type of teachers? "Only those, who know how to value art and thought for their own sakes and knowledge as an instrument of culture, possess the key to that palace of pleaures!"

According to Roger Fry," the man who works at some uncreative and uncongenial toil merely to earn enough food to enable him to continue to work has not properly speaking, a human life at all. The pressure of commercial life has crushed and atrophied the creative impulse completely!"

F.R. O'Neill summarises the effects of astonishing discoveries upon the unity, peace and happiness of men! Says he, "we are not progressing, we are becoming less civilized!" The plain fact (about the cities and towns) is that today we are far too busy, weaving our distracting max moral, political and economic ideals, so-called, to find time for enquiry into the divinity for man! The spiritual values hardly find any place in our social system. What hope then for art?

It is often urged that poverty and the economic pinch preclude the possibility of any attempt at making the home beautiful. But a highly gifted Bengali artist like Jamini Roy might help us to change our minds. He shows us that "the craft instinct has not totally vanished from Bengal - specially the huts of the poor!"

Rishi Roerich insists that "the creative sense of the beautiful should be applied in everyday life; that every household should be beautified; that in each home books should have the place of honour!"

The spirit tunes our harp of life which makes a (i) singer-artist send his aspirations in music beyond the finite; (ii) worshipper or devottee send his aspirations in prayers and hopes (iii) architect or designer to build and descrate temples which are flames of fire in stone; (iv) painter to paint life's dreams in pictures which are dreams made everlasting; and (v) dancer express his aspirations through dance which is estatic meditation in the still centre of movement!"

The Art Society of Amritsar have started a series of Art Miscellanies, published by Miss Sneh Lata Sharma and edited by Udaychandra Naval. The first of these -the Spring number - contains an introduction by Rabindranath Tagore and a foreword by Sir S.Radhakrishnan. There is a well-reasoned and convincing "Raison Dietre" by Professor Eric Dickinson, the president of the Society One's first thought, on hearing of a new publication at the present time, is likely to be : how is this going to help to win the war? Professor Dickinson shows that the society are by no means unmindful of what is going on in the world to-day and her expresses the views of the Society in the following paragraph .- "But it has for xuk me sometime been increasingly felt by many of the younger generation , that if there is too much clamour for the incarceration of the spiris of beauty and delight, with permission to emerge only in times less tortured and tiresome , the position instead of improving may well enter a period of greater disintegration and confusion when the present proportion of values can remain so adverse to the spirit of man .
