David A. Wells Prize

The David A. Wells Prize in economics for 1920–21 has been awarded to Zenas Clark Dickinson, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of Economics at the University of Minnesota, for his thesis entitled "Economic Motives, or Social Psychology and Some of its Applications to Economics."

This prize of \$500 is offered for the best thesis, embodying the results of original investigation, upon some subject in the field of economics.

Prize of the Harvard Club of North China

The Prize of \$100, offered by the Harvard Club of North China for the best thesis on any subject connected with China, has been awarded to Dudley Tyng, A.B., S.T.B., of Milford, a seventh-year student in the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, for a thesis entitled "Lao Tzu, a Study in Chinese Philosophy."

SUMMER SCHOOL OF ARTS AND SCIENCES AND OF EDUCATION

In 1921 there will be one session of the Summer School, from Tuesday, July 5, to Saturday, August 13.

Courses will be offered in Architecture, Astronomy, Botany, Chemistry, Economics, Education, Engineering Sciences, English, Fine Arts, French, Geology, German, Government, Greek, History, Horticulture, Hygiene, Italian, Latin, Mathematics, Medical Sciences, Music, Philosophy, Physical Education, Physics, Psychology, Public Speaking, Social Ethics, and Spanish. Most of these courses are accepted as half-courses toward the degrees of A.B., A.A., and S.B., but cannot be counted in addition to the corresponding courses in Harvard College.

By recent votes of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences and the Faculty of the Graduate School of Education, a programme consisting of summer school work only may be presented for the degrees of A.M. and Ed.M.

Harvard undergraduates with an average of B or better during the previous academic year and men who, because of their service in the army, the navy, the volunteer police, or the state guard, deserve special consideration, may, in the Summer School of 1921, be allowed to count toward the degree of A.B. or S.B. two summer courses, but no undergraduate shall be permitted to obtain credit for more than one full course. Undergraduates not in the above categories shall not be permitted to obtain credit for more than one half-course.

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
