I am sorry to write to you after such a long time.

During this interval I had been organising a Museum at Pauri the Head Quarters of the Carhwal Dist. I am glad to let you know that our collection has reached to a value of about Rs.80,000 and the Deputy Commissioner who is also the Fresident of the managing Committee has kindly given us a Covt. Building for the Museum.

In my previous letters, you will remember, I have mentioned that Pauri has the best view of the Himalayas and once I had requested you to kindly grace the place by your visit.

Masterpieces of your art now grace many Museums of
the East and the West. But it is surprising that no hilly country
so far has requested you for the gifts of your Paintings. Like all
art critics I have consideed not only as a prophet of beauty and
Culture but as the only artist of Himalayas of all the times.
Garhwal is thex situated in the Bossom of the Himalayas and it
should have a Museum of your Himalyan Paintings. We have therefore
decided to set up a Roerich Hall in case you very kindly desire
to give us a set of at least six Faintings. How With a glorious
view of the Himalyas in front of the Museum your art will not
only inspire but will convey the secret of the mountains which
philosophers. like yourself could only capture. You had been
generous enough to all the Institutions and I am sure our
appeal will not go in vain.

If the gift of six paintins is not possible we request you kindly to give us at least two paintings.

Our Museum is still in its infancy. Whatever

collection we have made is all from the donations and gifts. We can not afford to buy , specially your masterpieces. Your donation would the effore inspire other artists and Collectors.

If this plan apeals to you and if you kindly favour uswith the donation of six paintings , further corrospondence would be done by the President, who is on tour at the present moment. I am only writing because I had the good fortune of being acquainted with you for some time past.

The brochure of your art, material for which you supp--lied me is still incomplete.
