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From Diary October 10th 1930:

"Shocked beyond words that F. once told father "Well, you received a huge sum of money for your paintings" - this is an outrage and certainly was only made up by her small Self. I can imagine how Father was hurt to hear such words - I nearly cried when I heard it and I wish to assure Father and Mother that no such small ridiculous thought came from our mind. This is the lowest - How little, dear Father, Mo.(Fr.) understands your Great Sacrifice. It is appalling. Simply no understanding.

About the same date in his official letter to Prof. Roerich (when the latter was at Paris) he wrote that the Museum should also provide for Father's and Mother's needs, since their account was so heavily burdened during those years.

This will be found, on page #3, at the end of one of the October letters of 1930 to Prof. Roerich to Paris, which are in the beginning of the file called: OFFICIAL LETTERS AND REPORTS Oct. 1, 1930 to Dec. 31, 1931, which has already been sent on Saturday, March 7, 1936.
