Dear Prof. Roerich.

After many nights of reading Hierarchy before I go to sleep and many days of ceaseless battle against determined opposition I begin to realize the meaning of tension. The battle against the poisonous ones burrowing their slimy way has made me very tired and at times almost despondent but nearly every morning comes the renewal of strength. And thus I begin to realize in some small part your trials and tribulations.

My faith grows as I see one problem after another solved on the brink of disaster. And so I stretch to uttermost that inward perception which is always there even in the midst of seeming disaster. Thus I discover the strength which trouble can give. But I crave more - I ask for joy, and light and beauty, things which a spirit too continuously taut may fail to appreciate. I find now that I sink into music like a child into its mother's arms, - not exactly appreciation but surely rest. And the fresh air of the morning out-of-doors is like a great luxury.

Some great tiger plan is brewing but I have not yet found the outline yet.

We run along the razor edge striving to maintain our balance by the speed of motion. The man at the center has a lovely spriti but also a certain attitude of "all things to all men" which at times is disconcerting. Everyone is inspired to think his own ideas will be carried out. But there are many ideas and I fear many future conflicts. Ingenious temporary solutions, but statesmanship is yet to appear. I have been striving to lay down certain broad principles on which a later foundation can be built.

I hear from the "steadfast one" (FRG) about Mme Roerich whom I have never met and whose books I have never read. I can think of her as alert, vivid, Intelligence combined with High Order of Intuition. I think of the time when I can truthfully say "I have done my outward duty for this westward country - now I can go to the heights of the East".

In the meantime I must seek Agni Yoga in simple action guided by intuition.

The reward is the privilege of saying with a rising of the heart "Lord, I love Thee".

I shall speak of the need for the Banner of Peace to strengthen theheart of the world at the moment the Economic conference has proved so disappointing. I shall speak of the qualifications of the Messenger who comes from a distant land as is usually the case. And I shall speak of the signs of the times and of the need of the great Banner being recognized by the best in the different nations We are hoping to see you in America this winter so that it may be possible to talk over these great visions more definitely.
