

Prof. Nicholas Roerich was born in 1874 in St. Petersbourg.

As a student he attended the Academy of Art, the Historic and Philological courses of the University of St. Petersbourg, the Faculty of Law and the Institute of Archaeology. Later he went abroad for higher studies.

He was one of the most famous artists — with over 7,000 paintings to his credit. The Himalayas were a constant source of inspiration to Nicholas Roerich and he loved them so much that made him known as "Master of the Mountains". He revealed in his numerous paintings of Himalayan landscapes, his ability to convey their colours and moods, soaring heights and wast spaces of a mic proportions.

Prof. Hicholas Roerich died at Kulu on December 13,1947, after spending most of his life in Himalayas.

This exhibition is being organised to celebrate the Birth Centenary of Prof. Wicholas Roerich. It consists of original paintings, photographic reproductions, colour transparencies and excerpts from his writings.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I am very happy to be amidst you all this afternoon on the occasion of the centenary celebrations of the great Russian Artist and friend of India Nicholas Roerich. My memory takes me back to 1035 when as a young student I first visited Naggar and got introduced to the Roerich world which is so well preserved till to-day at that place. I visited Naggar quite a few times thereafter and stayed in the castle there. It could never occur to me in 1935 that it would be my privilage in 1974 to inaugurate an exhibition the works of the Great Nicholas Roerich.

I am glad that this opportunity has been provided

provided by the Chandigarh Museum and Art Gallery, which, true to its character, has the privilege of possessing some of the rare paintings of Nicholas Roerich. It is but befitting also that Dr. Randhawa is present amidst us and has just introduced us to the great painter on the basis of his personal knowledge of his work.

The learned, it is said, understand the reason of art while the laymen just feel the pleasure. Dr. Randhawa has just now given us a learned account of the art and works of Nicholas Roerich and has drawn our attention to the sources of inspiration underlying

his art. As a lay person I can marely say that it was always been a pleasure for me to see the Bornich paintings "Nicholas Roerich possessed a highly evolved sensibility and a sophisticated and multi-faceted personality. The sweep of his endeavours and imagination was truly stupendous. He was an archaeologist an explorer, a student of history and spiritualism, a writer of poems and short stories and above all a painter. His murals and mosaics adom many public buildings and churches in the country of his birth and the settings designed by him for operas and ballets introduced a new dimension in the renaissance of this particular aspect of Russian culture. The collection

of his paintings has touched the staggering number of 7,000. The fact that his birth centenary is being celebrated not only in the U.S.S.R. but also in India in the United Kingdom and in the U.S.A. simultaneously is a proof of the fact that Nicholas Roerich had a cosmopolitan outlook and made a contribution to the knowledge and enriched the treasures of art of humanity as a whole.

W hat was the secret of Nicholas Roerich's multifarious and yet uniformly splendid achievements?

A significant clue, to my mind, is provided by his son Svetoslav Roerich, himself an acknowledged painter, who testifies that his father had "wonderful composure of

mind and of self which were the very foundations of his character". Svetoslav Roerich goes on to say that "it was the composure of a superior man, grave and yet kind, thoughtful with a remarkable and happy sense of humour". This composure of mind and self would seem to account for a synthetic quality of Nicholas Boerich's art. He gleaned from various sources and blended and synthesized various elements in his creative art. He was not a place but of all places. He will survive in the memory of succeeding generation not as one belonging to a particular time but as one who belonged to all times. He imbibed in himself and portrayed with his brush not merely the narrow or parochial aspects.

of human aspirations and urges but the universal and the immutable emotions and yearnings stirring the human spirit. Nicholas Roerich's paintings are silent poetry. He has been hailed as the mester of the mountains. Hi landscapes of the mountains and the Himalsyas are un rivalled - unrivalled because they are because not merely pictorfel representation of the mighty moutains but are a sign as well as a symbol; a meaning animates them and makes them communicate more than meets to e eye. They symbolise screnity, etermity and beauty". Nicholas Boerich had dedica ed himself to the search and service of beatuty - service deries all harmors and boundaries beauty is timeless and transcendental. Beauty is truth.

and as the English poet Keats said,

"Beauty is truth and truth beauty,

That is all ye know and all ye need to know".

Beauty for Nicholas Roerich was the supreme truth which

by symbolishing synthesis of form, values and ideals

was the main bope for unifying all humanity. To quote

the great painter's own words -

"In beauty we are united, Through beauty we pray, with beauty we conquer."

Nicholas Roerich's paintings bring us face to f ace with beauty and also with his most intimate self and the secret concurrence which he had perceived in things by means of his vision or intuition. The

celebrated Russian writer Corky aptly described him as the 'Greatest Intuitivist',

To us Indians the celebration of Nicholas Roerich's birth centenary has special significance. Every since his coming to India in the 20s, he has dedicated thousands of paintings to the sublime beauty of the Himalayas and by the sacred concepts of the ancient wisdom of India. Indeed, he concludes the chapter on India in his book 'Altai Himalaya' with the words:

"We know the fragrant essence, India. We know the depths and finesse of thy thoughts. We know the great Aum, which leads to the inexpressible heights. India, we know they ancient wisdom." He brought the sould of Russia close to the soul of India and having enriched his own life with the fusion of true culture, he became an emissary of universal art for humanity as a whole. Micholas Roerich's work since his coming to India is a tribute to our motherland, its treasures of wisdom and philosophy and its capacity to inspire great minds. He pay him our homage today especially as one of the greatest artists and also as a great explorer of the hidden treasures of human thought who made us aware of our own mich heritage. Thus, in his own right, he occupies place of pride amidst our country's cultural and spiritual leaders.

I am sure, the art lovers and art critics will interpret

interpret afresh the works of this great painter in this year of his centenary and draw lessons from his style and the scheme of colours and forms in the context of the current themes, styles and forms of art. But I hope that under the superficial and externy aspects of his paintings they will all find the basic truth and eternal beauty standing forth and shining undimmed. As time passes the themes and styles of art change. Quite often foreign influences result in substitution not only of atyles but even of thomes and subjects. Basically, there may be nothing wrong about it, But the Indian painters should, I feel, continue to take pride in our own heritage and explore the vast potentialities of our

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the content and the form of art has been enunciated since times immemorial as 'Satyam Shivam Sunderam' that is art should be true, good and beautiful. Nicholas Roerich not merely concurred in this but actually practised this concept. Let our artists keep this in view and draw fresh inspiration regarding scope of themes and the manner of expression from Nicholas Roerich's own words:

"Beauty still lives in India; Beckons to us the Great Indian Path."

## Speech made by Shri B.S. Ojha, Home Secretary.

I welcome you all to this function being held to commemorate the birth centenary of the great painter,
Nicholas Roerich. The Art of this great Russia born painter who did us Indian's honour by talking up residence in a place, by now world famous, in the valley of the gods, has been described as the "Realm of Roerich". As one who is a lover of art and as one who has admired Roerich for the last 40 years, he is eminently suitable to be the Chief guest today. Similarly, Dr. Randhawa also does not need any introduction though I must say Dr. Randhawa as a subject for introduction has a newer aspect of his personality to reveal in every occasion. Today he is present amidst us as an admirer and promoter of Roerich; for he it

was who initially got acquired the paintings, which were later purchased by him as Chief Commissioner for this Art Gallery in 1968 and which are on display here today. I would now request Dr. Randhawa to make a brief comment on Roerich and his work.
