A Kalimpong branch of the "ssociation was established under the presidentship of Shri Moti Chand Fradhan, retired Deputy Magistrate of "est Dengal, and a prominent resident of Kalimpong. The Association has opened classes of colloquial Chinese, Tibetan and Pengali in Kalimpong, and have asked me to supervise the work of these classes in my capacity of Vice-Fresident of the Association. The work of these classes is still at its very beginning and the classes are held in the sitting room of the Hillview Hotel, Kalimpong,, the use of which was given free by the notel "roprietor, as the association has no sufficient funas to rent quarters. Most of the students ate local residents desirous of acquiring a spoken knowledge of the colloquial - officials, doctors and representative of the business community. The classes are at present held twice a week in the evenings. The existenece of these classes is indicative of the ineterest shown towards the study of these languages.
