It seems to me that a piece of furniture is perhaps as good a subject as you could possibly have. Fabrics, etc. have been well handled, but I do think the furniture that is being made today is mostly copied from old designs which I am not in favor of, as you know. By furniture, I mean a piece of today's requirement furniture which would consist of a cabinet which any young man or young woman could have in their own room. A part of it to open out as a desk, to hold some books, papers; have a cupboard combined with it so that a few clothes could be hung. Having stayed with Mme Roerich for such a long time and having witnessed Mme Roerich's condition and rapid decline of her strength, I therefore beg you to present my statement and testimony about Mme Roerich's health to our American authorities, a statement of an American citizen, one of the Directors of American cultural Institutions and of one witnesses having had a medical training in Germand America, as you know. I thus testify that for the last few mo I have witnessed how facts about Mme Roerich's health have been ditorted and her real critical condition concealed by the authorities here. I therefore testify that Mme Roerich is critically ill, her attacks frequent and acute and the heart action sustained only on stimulants. Any statement to the contrary about Mme Roerich's health is false, unfounded and ill-intended.

What do those who distort the facts about Mme Roerich's health aim at? Are not severe heart attacks, fainting spells, sufficiently dangerous? Or do they await her agony to permit Prof.Roerich to join her? But then they must realize that it may be too late as the journey alone to come out here takes at least three weeks.

We have to take drastic measures therefore, please, dear Mr. Horch, let me know to whom could I appeal from here at the State Department because the whole burden of responsibility in Prof.Roerich's absence and after Mrs Horch's departure weighs on me and I am dreading to think that may be in future I shall have to reproach myself that I have not done all in my power to safe Mme Roerich.

Through the cultural events given by the South African Roerich Association at the Roerich Museum, New York under your leadership, Americans have become better acquainted with the artistic and cultural achievements of your nation.

To further this work, which you are so ably carrying on, I would like to offer on behalf of the Trustees of the Roerich Museum a proposal to your Legation which we believe would link still closer the two nations through Culture. This proposition was discussed in presence of Miss E. J. Lichtmann, Dr. J. E. Holloway, and yourself at your recent visit to the Museum and I am now pleased to submit this proposal to you

"At their last meeting the Trustees of the Roerich Museum unanimously expressed their desire to submit the following offer to be conveyed by you to your Government.

"If a Museum in your capital or other leading city of South Africa would be able to dedicate a Hall or Room, the Trustees of the Roerich Museum would be happy to cooperate with South Africa by sending ten to twelve paintings of Nicholas Roerich from the collections of the Roerich Museum, - these paintings to constitute a Branch-Hall of the Roerich Museum. Branches of the Roerich Museum have been established in other cumntries, such as in Paris, France; Bruges, Belgium; Belgrade and Zagreb, Yugoslavis; Benares, India; and Riga, Latvia.

"The transmission of the paintings would, of course, entail no expense for the Museum in South Africa, since

the Paintings will remain the property of the Roerich Museum in New York, although no limit need be placed upon the time of their exhibition remaining in South Africa. Should the idea of a similar Branch meet with the pleasure of your Government, the Board of Trustees would be happy to proceed with the fulfillment of this plan."

I have been simply overwhelmed with requests for personal interviews and the pressure of official work has been so heavy, that it has become just impossible for me to comply with them.

I appreciate fully the deep interest you have in the work of the Museum and the situation you explain confronts you, and I do sincerely wish it were possible for me to arrange to see you. As you undoubtedly know, however, the Legislature is at present in session, and the budgetary, taxation and other problems now presented for solution are so numerous and complex that every minute of the day is consumed with conferences and other duties.

In the circumstances, I am sure you will understand my regret that because of these unusual circumstances, it will not be possible for me to detach myself from official requirements, at least during the period of the legislative demands upon my time.

In reply to your letter of December 1, 1932, I wish to tell you that the Polish Government will glady cooperate in organizing an exhibition of Polish modern art at the Roerich Museum in New York. I received this news from the Association for propagation of Polish art abroad (the "Towarzystwo Szerzenia Sztuki Polskiej wsrod Obcych") which is in close contact with the Polish Government and from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Warsaw.

However, assembling and transfer of sixty or more paintings from Warsaw to New York requires considerable time and special funds. Therefore it is impossible to determine at the present time when the paintings will be ready for shipment. In the meantime, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs plans to arrange an exhibition of Polish modern aquarelles and engravings. Polish engraving belongs to the best develped fields of Polish art and it is felt that the exhibition comprising from 100 to 120 exhibits would be of real interest to the American public. Almost half of the exhibits would consist of works by Wladyslaw Skoczylas one of the foremost Polish artists who was able to develop very originally the traditional Polish folk art style. I will be able to give you more detailed information concerning this prospective exhibition in about six weeks; for it will take me that long to collect the exhibits. I will return to New York in June, 1933, and will bring all exhibits with me. I am gathering also biographical notes about the artists whose work will be included in the exhibition.

The Polish Association for the propagation of Polish Art Abroad kindly requests you, Mr. Horch, to be so good as to reserve the exhibition hall at the Roerich Museum for the purpose of our exhibition. If it is possible, we should like to open the exhibition Winter Season at the Roerich Museum with the presentation of Polish engraving, i.e., around the first of November, 1933

Yesterday I examined the "Bond" at your office. I was greatly astonished to see how this document has been distorted by Mr. Rickaby, and that he deliberately omitted the conditions which were agreed upon at your conference with him. You will recall how we insisted on having a letter written at that time regarding the agreed upon conditions, and now he has obviously changed the conditions. It is evident that Mr. Rickaby continues to show his bad faith and unethical attitude.

You will note that the free space granted to the Museum as well as the 17 rooms for the Trustees are deliberately omitted, as well as the clause giving us the right to collect the income from the educational work. In addition, the interest to be paid to the bondholders is incorrectly stated, and the fee for the management is also excluded, which is absolutely essential as you already know.

You will recall that it was in the middle of July that you submitted the Bond and Mortgage to Mr. Rickaby, and it is hardly believable that in spite of all my pleas to hasten the matter, over two months have passed and the "seven pages" are returned entirely unsatisfactory. It is evident that in addition to Mr. Rickaby's schemes and deceit, he also employs the method of delaying proceedings with the purpose of destroying us.

I know you understand, my dear Mr. Schur, that strong measures must be used to stop these dangerous methods used by Mr. Rickaby, and that every effort must be applied to have this matter straightened out satisfactorily without any further delay. I strongly suggest that at the coming meeting with Mr. Rickaby, all the necessary points be settled immediately and written down without giving Mr. Rickaby a further chance for delay. In addition, there should be a decision that a Bondholders letter be sent out immediately.

The above mentioned points are some which pertain to the Museum. The other points you have already noted.

I should also like to suggest that the corrected Bond be prepared and submitted to Mr. Rickaby, so as to avoid any further delay. Would you also see that the financial statement which will be submitted, does not apply to our educational activities.

We know that Mr. Ernst and yourself must feel indignant at the disgraceful attitude shown by Mr. Rickaby in this matter.

My dear Mr. Sawada:

Under separate cover please find subsequent copies of the "Harbin Times" (Japanese Paper), of November 18, 20 and 21, containing a continuation of distorted and malicious attacks against the Founders of our Institution, Professor and Madame Roerich, the Trustees and against the Institutions.

In accordance with our conversation today, I deeply appreciate your kindness in cabling to the authorities in charge, conveying our protest against these statements, and also requesting an investigation and the removal of the offending editors of the "Harbin Times".

In addition to the maserous distortions, the "Roerish Fact" and "Banner of Peace", which has been honoured by Your Government as well as by other nations has also been falsely misrepresented.

I have just received further information that a Japanese paper at Tientsin, China, has reprinted these articles, thus showing the serious consequences of this totally unjustified slander.

I am living temporarily at the above address - for how long I do not know, but I also have the faith that a life spent in attempting to do the beautiful, to give it freely to mankind, without envy or jealousy or greed cannot entirely have been a failure, even tho we cannot see any results -- that the great white Spirit will recognize the endeavor - the sincerity of purpose is my firm belief.

I have just received your note of October 25th, and it will be almost impossible at the last moment to re-arrange that which was agreed upon by you and me in September, to have Dr. Vrionides's lecture recital in Hall 21 on October 25th.

At that time when I spoke to you about Dr. Vrionides's and Mr. Engel's series of lectures, you asked me whether they were open for Resident Members, as well as for Master Institute students. It was affirmed by me, and you put the event of October 23rd, Mr. Engel's lecture "Cinteenth Century English Music" and also Dr. Vrionides's event for Oct. 25th into your schedule for October.

Moreover, when Mr. Kimmell spoke to Mrs. Kraft about sending programs of Dr. Vrionides's lecture recital to all Resident Members, Mrs. Kraft transmitted your opinion as affirmative. Therefore we sent programs to all residents of the Building, expecting a large attendance from this source as in the past, with the notice that the event was to take place in Hall 21, as it had been determined by you and me in September.

I should also like to inform you that Mrs. Horch, Miss Esther J. Lichtmann, Mr. Sidney Newberger and I have terminated our relationship with Professor and Madame Roerich and we are no longer accept their leadership.

I take this occasion to advise you that Secretary of Agriculture Wallace, Dr. E. Gil Borges, and Professor Ralph V. D. Magoffin have resigned from the Permanent Committee for the Roerich Pact.

Let me thank you for the book, "Heart," I have waited until now, when I have read it through, to send you my thanks; otherwise my appreciation, which is today profound, would have been no more than conventionally polite.

Until life grants me pause again, I probably shall not know how far I have sped or whether wisely, Meanwhile, "Heart" has become a precious companion on my journey and I send you this note as a small measure of the great gratitude in which I cherish it.
