ROERICH FOUNDATION IN BELGIUM

King Leopold of Belgium has bestowed upon the 'Roerich Foundation pro Pace, Arte, Scientiæ et Labore' in Bruges the honorary distinction to name itself henceforth 'in memoriam Alberti Regis Belgarum' and to use the royal crown in correspondence and documents. To those who know that the late King Albert had so heartily sponsored the two World Conferences of the Roerich Pact and Banner of Peace held in Belgium in 1931 and 1932, this will be a very welcome news. Amongst the latest essays by Prof. Roerich is one dedicated to the great King-Hero of Belgium.

Besides archives on the peace movement, the Roerich Foundation possesses art collections and a special hall dedicated to the paintings of this great world artist, amongst these paintings being the famous 'Madonna Oriflamma.' The building of the Roerich Foundation has been presented by the City of Bruges and is in itself a monument of art; it is situated on the famous square Place van Eyck.

Prof. Roerich is honorary President of the Foundation, and its president is M. Camille Tulpinck, member of the Royal Archaeological Commission. The board of honorary members includes such distinguished personages as members of the Government: Count Carton de Viart, Mr. Jeanson and Mr. Jules Destrees; the Governor of West Flandres, etc.
