MASTER INSTITUTE OF ROERICH MUSEUM REPORT 1932-1933.

In spite of the great financial difficulties which have gripped the entire country and therefore kandicapped considerably the work of our Institution, we have had one of the most successful and brilliant seasons. Althought our Scholarship Fund hardly could assist during this year the many deserving students, yet through splendid cooperation of our Faculty, which have shown utmost generosity, we were able to give eighty-eight Scholarships in all departments of Art, such as painting, design, illustration, sculpture, drama, dance, plano, violin, music appreciation, composition, counterpoint, and special lecture courses. Most successful dramatic performances, concerts and ballet presentations were given throughout the year, indicating the expansion in the many departments of the Master Institute.

Many of the music students received wide recognition through concerts in hospitals, churches, schools and community centers. Our painting students have given Exhibitions of their works in Sears Roebuck Galleries, Washington; Howard University, Washington; Tulsa Junior Art "eague, Tulsa, Oklahoma; Fifth Avenue Hospital, New York, and other leading Institutions. The Annual Students' Exhibition given at the International Art Center of the Roerich Museum has been acclaimed as one of the best School Exhibitions of the year. The Enclosed review from the "New York Sum", June 3rd, 1933, bears testimony to this.

Many contacts have been formed with Hospitals, Industrial Institutions, Vocational Guidance Institutions, Bureaus for the Unemployed. To many of these Institutions Scholarships have been offered by the Master Institute.

The work of the Department for the Blind has grown in the most significant manner - Scholarships in Piano, Piano Pedagogy and Sculpture have

been given to Blind Students and the results of their work surpassed all expectations. New Professions in fields of art have been found for the Handicapped through the untiring work and research of our Faculty members.

Thus, the Master Institute has fulfilled this year the noble Panhuman Ideals of its Founder, asserting with him that "Liberated from prejudices and superstitions, serving victorious beauty, uplifting knowledge, we shall apply in all measures and for all branches the zealous thought of affirmation of bliss, by thus helping the further branches of research and betterment of life."

CHANGES IN FACULTY

Master Institute accepted with regret the following resignations: Mr. Kurt Grudzinski, in Voice Department, who left for California. Miss Lubomirska left for Germany early in the season and Miss Munde has devoted herself completely to the corrective work with children.

LECTURES AND SPECIAL LECTURE COURSES GIVEN DURING THE YEAR.

A number of interesting lectures as well as special lecture courses were given to the Master Institute students by noted lecturers and members of Faculty.

Beginning October 28th, a course on "Comparative Philosophies" comprising ten lectures was given by Miss Frances R. Grant, Vice President, Reerich Museum and member Faculty. These comprised lectures on: Buddha, Krishna, Confucious and Lao Tze, Plato, Jesus Christ, St. Francis of Assisi, Spinoza, Thomas a Kempis, Ramakrishna, Vivekananda, The Threshold of Fire. These lectures were open to the students of the fine art classes as well as to the resident members of the Reerich Museum.

On December 1st, Victor Hafner, well-known architect, gave a lecture on "Micheal Angelo's Cupela for St. Peter's Cathedral".

On January 27th, Eli Seigneister gave a lecture recital on "Music of Today and Tomorrow". Mme. Caslova, violinist, Mr. Linscott, singer, members of faculty participating.

Mr. Lichtmann gave a course of 12 lectures on Piano Pedagogy, comprising: The Most Important Methods Pro-Bach up to the Method of Relaxation, Relaxation and Weight Method, The First steps in Piano Pedagogy, Scientific Method of Imparting the Study of Notation, Rhythm and Fingering, Indpendence of Hands, The Study of 200 Short Canons by Kunz, The Practical Application of Pedaling, The Importance of Phrasing and its Practical Application, Musicianship, Interpretation, The Pedagogical Value of Outstanding Pieces and Studies in Piano Literature for Beginners.

Mr. Earl Newton gave a course of ten lectures on "Old and Modern Masters in Music", comprising: Palestrina, Vittoria, Josquin Despres and Orlando de Lasso; The English Madrigalists; Domenico Scarlatti; Jean Philippe Rameau; George Frederick Handel; Modeste Moussorgsky; Jan Sibelius; Alexandre Sciabine; Debussy and Ravel; Modern American omposers.

On November 10th, four murals by Misses Nimtzowitz, Virginia Clark, Elsa Lorhke and Dick Sharpe, were sent to the Fifth Avenue Hospital for six months loan exhibition, to be hung in the recreation room, surgical room and private patient rooms. Dr. Humphreys arranged this loan exhibition.

On November 27th, two students of the Master Institute, Mr. Lebedinsky, singer, and Miss Prohaska, Pianist, gave a program at the Y.M.C.A., Sloan House. The director, Mr. Whittington, expecially asked for our students to be sent up there.

In December the Master Institute students founded the Craftsman's Guild, holding regular meetings once a week, with the purpose of giving monthly exhibitions. The Director gave them the use of Studio #14 for their Exhibits.

On December 11th, Y.M.C.A., Sloan House, presented a program given by our two students, Misha Aschenbaum, Violinist, and Addi Prohaska. Pianist.

On December 6th, a Christmas Sale of students works opened in the Library of the Roerich Museum, on the third floor and continued until after the New Year.

ACTIVITIES CLOSELY CONNECTED WITH THE MASTER INSTITUTE.

The Educational Campaign Committee .

On October 28th, 1932, the first concert and bridge was held under or the auspices of the Educational Campaign Committee.

On December 5th, a Christmas sale of drawings and sketches of our students began under the auspices of the same Committee. Proceeds of \$54.65 were donated to the Scholarship Fund.

On May 10th, the Conference on "Education for the New Leisure" was held at 8:15 P.M. in the Hall of the East, under the auspices of the Educational Campaign Committee, Mr. Louis L. Horch acting as Chairman. The following eight speakers participated: Dr. Edward Humphreys, Dr. Frederick Kettner, Marion Bauer, Henry James Forman, George Sylvester Viereck, Frances R. Grant, Leon Solon, Professor Patty Hill. Among those in the audience were Harvey N. Davis, President of Stevens Institute of Technology; Vica Waldren, Fresident, Association Teachers of Vocational and Educational Guidance; Mr. Elbert K. Fretwell, Teachers College of Columbia University; Professor Fife, Stevens Institute of Technology. Representative of National Council of Women, Farents Teachers Association, National Congress of Women, Professors of Universities and rincipals of High Schools, etc. A resolution was unanimously adopted for a Convention to be held in November on "Education and Culture as a Foundation for Peace".

COMMITTEE FOR THE BLIND AND PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED.

On January 10th, 1933, a Scholarship contest for the Blind and Physically Handicapped was held under the auspices of the Connittee for the Blind and Physically Handicapped, inxRixma and awarded two scholarships in Piano Pedagogy to two blind students, one scholarship in piano to a blind student, three in sculpture to blind students.

On March 1st, 1933, a Round Table Conference on the "ARt Education for the Blind and Physically Handicapped was held in Studio #13. Mrs. Ljonel Sutro acted as Chairman. Speakers were Mr. Giles, Mr. Montana, Mr. Foldes, Colonel Dan Edwards, Mr. Robert "rving, Director for the American Foundation for the Blind, Mr. Forest Grant, Director of Art in "igh Schools, Dr. Edward Humphreys, Psyciatrist, Fifth Avenue Hospital, Dr. Maken McKinnon, Consultant in Psychiatry at the Medical Center, Dr. Helen Smith, Board of Education, Supervisor of 12,000 crippled children in Public Schools, Mr. Jonas (blind) connected with the New York Life Insurance Company, Miss Moore of the Hospital of Joint Deseases in New York City; Miss Wilson, and others. The Conference proved of great value, since all speakers discussed from various angles the art f education of the Blind and Physically Handicapped, d Those present who represented various Institutions, such as crippled children of New York City, hospitak for the crippled and joint diseases and institutions for the blind offered the coeperation to the Master Institute in promotion of several of its art courses.

ORIENTAL DANCE YEICHI NIMURA teachers turn into guides, transmitting to the students not only the technique but also life's experience, sharing with them the valuable acquisitions which will prove a strong shield for the new generation.

How often humanity, entangled in its problems, attempted to deny the significance of the teacher. In epochs of decadence, it was seemingly possible to shake the basic conception of the spiritual hierarchy. But not for long did this darkness last. With the epochs of renaissance again the great leadership of teaching was inevitably crystallized, and people again began to feel the ladder of ascent and the blessed hand of the Leader. Many times small minds hesitate, fearing that they be oppressed by the personality of the Teacher. Especially those who have little to lose worry most often lest they lose something. In this regard, we now enter a very significant epoch. In certain strata of humanity the spirit of denial has just succeeded in evoking a protest against the Teacher. But as always happens, denial can arise only temporarily, and the creative origins of humanity again lead the wanderers of life into the path of affirmation, of fearless search-to the path of creation and beauty. People again remember about the Teachers. Of course these teachers must not pertain to a grandfather's study with all its petrified remains.

The Teacher is He who reveals, enlightens and encourages; He who will say, "Blessed are the obstacles, through them we grow"; He who recalls the beautiful Golgothas of knowledge and art, because therein lies the creative achievement. He who is able to remind, to teach the means of achievement—he will not be rejected by the strong spirits. He himself, will realize the value of the Hierarchy of Knowledge; and in his constant movement will create the ascending researches.

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So many schools and useful disseminators of knowledge can be organized in our societies. To all of them the same advice can be given, each tree can be planted only as a small sapling. Only gradually it will become tried and find steady roots. Therefore, if there is heartfelt desire to help the dissemination of knowledge and beauty, let it be fulfilled without delay. Let it not be handicapped by small possibilities. Practicality is not in the measure, but in the inner substance of the seed. Himalayas. 1931

Nicholas Roerich, leader of contemporary art and true apostle of beauty, founder of the Master Institute, pronounces as one of the formulæ of attainment: "Simplicity, Beauty and Fearlessness." In this, he crystallizes a principle applicable to all creative work. And it is with such spirit that the Master Institute aims to imbue its students, that they may strive to attain the joy of creation which is immutable, however the expression of their work may vary. The departments are open to students of all ages and grades of advancement. There is also a department for children through which the Master Institute aims to instil in the young spirit from the earliest years this devotion to beauty.

In uniting the arts for the first time, the Master Institute has lent to each art the same importance given to it in a school of a single branch. In addition, however, it provides an opportunity for its students to have intercourse with other arts and creators in other fields, thereby encouraging in them the spirit of reverence for all creation as well as stimulating a selfless dedication to art.
