

#### PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT AND WORLD GOVERNMENTS ASKED TO ADOPT ROERICH PACT AND PEACE BANNER

Third International Convention for Protection of Cultural Treasures
Recommends Action by Governments

Recommending to the President of the United States and to the Governments of the world, as well as to all international conferences, the adoption of the Roerich Pact and Banner of Peace, the Third International Convention for the Roerich Pact and Banner of Peace closed its session on November 18th, before representatives of 33 countries as well as delegates from cultural institutions of the world.

The countries represented include Argentina, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Czechoslovakia, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Greece, Guatemala, Honduras, Irish Free State, Japan, Lithuania, Nicaragua, Panama, Paraguay, Persia, Peru, Poland, Portugal, Spain, Switzerland, Venezuela and Yugoslavia. Observers were sent by Belgium, Italy, Netherlands, Turkey, France and Albania.

The Hon. Henry A. Wallace, Secretary of Agriculture, was Protector of the Convention and represented the Hon. Cordell Hull, Secretary of State, and read his message. U. S. Senator Robert L. Wagner was Honorary Chairman; Prof. Nicholas Roerich, creator of the Roerich Pact, who is now in the Himalayas, and Mme. Roerich are the Honorary Presidents and Mr. Louis L. Horch, President of the Roerich Museum, was Chairman.

The Roerich Pact and Banner of Peace was created and promulgated by Nichola's Roerich in 1929. Briefly, it provides that educational, artistic and scientific institutions, artistic and scientific missions, works of art and cultural sites and monuments of all kinds be respected in times of peace and war. To insure this a Banner was created by which such museums, universities, churches, cathedrals, libraries, and any other sites constituting a cultural, educational, or artistic center, be declared inviolable.

The Convention was the first to be held in this country. The previous two conventions have been held in the city of Bruges, Belgium, under the auspices of that city, and with Dr. Adatci, President of the Permanent Court of International Justice at the Hague, as Protector.

With the adoption of this measure by the nations, all artistic, scientific, religious and educational sites will become neutral and the Roerich Banner of Peace will mark these monuments in token of their inviolability.
