You also stated so justly that deplorable destructions take place not only in times of war but during other perturbations and misunderstandings. We have many marks of disunity and we must think now of the sign for better understanding among men and preservation of the highest human achievements.

Indeed, if the human life, as you point out so justly, is short the milestones of human thoughts and creativeness are guiding and serving human progress for millenniums. Truly it is not because of the earthly bread that man is alive. As you see I am expressing our common thoughts and are not all thoughts dedicated to constructiveness and Culture akin and cooperative?

You are quoting so subtly the French author who stated that civilization is for comfort and we may continue with the words of Louis Madeleine that "la Culture est tres humaine". Precisely in the name of this feeling - one very human, I greet you heartily. And now when I shall hear of the progress of our Pact, I shall always remember your inspiring and very humane high judgment for the sake of true progress of humanity.
