Dear Dr. Chklaver,

Many thanks for your kind letter of June 26th with the enclosed two copies of the letters from Col. K. The situation is apparently difficult for the Colonel, but he has made it hard for himself by moving away from the place where he had employment. You know how strenuous times are now for every one and how difficult it is to find employment or to find financial support.

I was so happy to hear from Boron M. de Taube and you of the enthusiasm aroused by the news of the Banner of Peace Convention in Washlagton under the auspices of the Recrich Museum. During our last visit to Washington, Mr. Horch and myself met with the greatest cordiality on the part of all the Ambassadors and Ministers of all the foreign lands. All of our friends consider it an unprecedented case when an institutions was treated like a country ___ it is indeed an unprecedented case when all the doors of all of our Embassies were opened with such response and cordiality within a couple of days to representatives of cultural institutions; and all this open heartedness and respect are due to the admiration and highest esteem which the representatives of all foreign countries have for our beloved and great Leader - Micholas de Roerich. As soon as Mr. Horch asked for an appointment, the appointment was at once arranged within an hour's time. Even such Embassies as the British Embassy arranged the appointment to suit our time. All Ambassadors and Ministers were exceedingly interested in our Master's epoch making idea of the Roerich Pact and Banner of Peace. Needless to tell you how heartily hailed was the Roerich Pact by those high representatives whose motherlands have contributed to the world's treasury of Art and Culture. It was a continuous testimony of highest esteem and admiration for our Leader's great work and ideals. It was indeed an unforgetable visit - the memory of which we will ever cherish as well as to be humbly grateful for the great privilege given to me as well as all of us - to work for such a great and noble cause in the name of our Master and our beloved "Inspiratrace Madame de Roerich".

As to the American Government and State Department, the Roerich Pact and Banner of Peace has aroused their great interest as well as a very sympathetic and encouraging attitude. The Convention promises to be in every way of greatest intertance and will be crowned with a meri vecess. Your cooperation to be part valuable as well as

well as the cooperation of Baron de Taube.

We were so happy to learn of your/and dignified stand which you took with with Mr. Tulpinck. Soon there will be a committee in every country towards the recognition of the Banner of Peace for the World is greatly in need of this saving measure.

I can well imagine how the lowering of the dollar affects your budget. You can't imagine how we worry about it. Ofcourse it is yet far from being balanced financially, and the inflation of the stock market has in no way improved the life of the country. Thus far only a very insignificant portion of our population have gained through gambling— the others still remain hard up for money, but with our enlightened President and "the new deal" - a new dawn will come for America. We are as confident and as hopeful as ever.

As to our battle, we are winning out more and more every day. The law of justice has so provided that our Chief Attorney who has wen for us the case was chosen the next day by President Rosevelt after he had taken our case- to serve as one of the twelve members of the Banking Commission- appointed to investigate the doings and wild practices of the banks and committees, which have brought about the disaster in our country. As it so happened the Committee and the bank which intended to swallow up the Roerich Museum- were on the bench of those condemned by public opinion for ruthless racketeering and our attorney was one of their prosecutors. This fact as well as many others have indicated to us the great Hand of Justice and Providence! What else remains for us co-workers and disciples of our Great Leaders if not to dedicate all of our devotion, faith and tireless efforts in the Service. Who knows better than we that our great cause shall and will live.

We strive heartly with you in the desire of achievement.

I have sent to you forty more books of Davernois in various parcels for distribution among worthy friends.

Dear Miss Lichtmann,

Many thanks for the beautiful photographs which you have kindly sent me and which gave me a new glimpse of the splendor of the Himalayas. I am also in receipt of Madame de Roerich's letter N° 6 to which I am replying per Air Mail, so that this letter may overtake the reports and documents sent herewith. Thus you will be fully informed of the work here and the developments which are taking place here in every direction. In these streneous days it was a real bliss to receive the beautiful message from Madame de Roerich and Her inspiring encouragements.

All our thoughts accompany Professor de Roerich and our dear George who must have reached now Japan. In my report I mention the measures which I have taken here to prepare for them the way, in asmuch as it is in my power. The Japanese Embassy here is willingly co-operating.

The other day I had the visit of the President of our Chinese Association of New-York who is sailing for Shanghal. He will keep in touch with me and work for the Pact.

Last week I have had an interview with M. Vitalis, Chief of the Cabinet of the Minister of Foreign Affairs. I emphasized the argency of a move on the part of the French Government as regards the Pact. M. Vitalis is very favorably inclined towards the Pact and he will advise the Minister to act as soon as he will return from abroad. M. Marin is also bringing new pressure.

Our groups continue their activities, especially the group "Affirmation" which is holding meetings regularly every week. The apbuilding of new groups in the other countries of Europe is progressing. We just have inaugurated the Roerich Association of Esthonia. The Lithuanian Association is being reorganized with the co-operation of a new friend, Dr Serafinin, who is particularly devoted to the Teachings of the Master.

You will find in the reports herewith enclosed all the details concerning our work. With our eyes fixed on the Great Fature, we march onwards, under the Banner of the Master.

I am writing to dear Svetoslav giving him the information he required. Please give him my affectionate regards. I beg you to convey my love and respects to Madame de Roerich. My Parents, Madame de Vaux-Phalipau and all our friends here are sending you their cordial greetings. Please remember me to Mr Shibayeff and
