My dear Mme. Lichtmann:

I have not sooner answered your various communications because I wanted to have all the material in hand before giving a report. Now I think some account of the ceremony of the signing of the Roerich Pact and some explanation of that pact would be very much our stuff for the high-school magazine. I am sorry to say, however, that I think Dr. Roerich's beautiful articles are just entirely too far over the heads of our high-school youngsters. I think perhaps there will be not one in a thousand that could appreciate his material. I am, therefore, regretfully returning the articles on Tibet and the Mongols.
