Explanations to accompany Preaudit Difference Statement No.35387 dated November 5,1935.

Camp equipment listed in Sv.No.I represents extra camp equipment for the use of Dr.Y.L.Keng, of the Academia Sinica, and assistant Yang. Both Dr.Keng and assistant Yang were receiving subsistence and camp equipment while engaged in field work on behalf of the Expedition.

Sv.No.3. The canvas bag for rifles was specially made for the railway transportations of the six army rifles, property of the Department. The bag had been handed over together with the rifles to the army authorities in Tientsin and a receipt obtained.

Sv. No. 4. The Leitz field glass listed in the sv. was acquired as present for Prince Teh-wang, Secretary-General of the Mongolian Govt. Council. It is customary in Mongolia to accompany a request for assistance by a present. The Prince's goodwill was essential for the success of the Expedition's fieldwork in his territory. While discussing the Expedition in Washington in April 1934, we were told that presents were authorized, and we had received from the Department several knives and flashlights as presents for natives. However a flashlight or a knife is not an adequate present for a Prince or high Governmental official, and could be used only for minor persons. A field glass must be considered as a minimum present for the Mongol princes are accustomed to receive expensive presents from Expeditions and firms trading in their territory, such as rifles, expensive cameras, and even a M\$ 15,000 Buick car presented to Prince Teh-wang by the Wostwag Company in Khalgan! During the summer of 1935, the Prince's residence was visited by some German travellers, who had no presents to offer, except a wrist-watch and a fountain pen. These presents however were considered not adequate, and the Prince demonstratively sold them in the local bazar to show his displeasure. This of course did no good to the travellers. In our case, the Prince had been of the greatest assistance throughout the period of field work, and even supplied Mongol Govt. lorries for the Expedition 's transportation to Kuei-hua, the hire of which would have cost us at least M\$ 200/- and thus exceed the cost of the field glass. We therefore feel ourselves justified to have bought the field glass, and are resubmitting the amount.

Sv. NNo. 20 & 32. Extra tent-pegs were necessary considering the violent wind storms in Mongolia in early spring. Pegs of a larger bize were used to fetter Expedition horses for the night.

Sv.No.22. Extra kettle for the use of Mongol guides who were receiving subsistence while engaged in field work.

sv.No. 28. The tent listed in the surv. was acquired in Khalgan for the use of Mongol guides and camp-servants, not personal servants.

Sv.No.6. Both Dr.Y.L.Keng and Assistant Yang agreed to join the staff of the Expedition on the understanding that they were to be supplied with all necessary field equipment and subsistence while engaged in field work. Dr.Y.L.Keng received no salary for his work. Mr. Yang fell ill in Kuei-hua while travelling on behalf of the Expedition.

Due to oversight the sum of M\$ 200, representing an advance payment made to Dr.Y.L.Keng, was not deducted from M\$ 337.58 under item No.6. Please deduct and correct total on Voucher which should be thus Mex.\$ 200 less.

An itemized account for the advance payment of M\$ 84.97 has been requested from Harbin, and will be forwarded on receipt.

Explanations to accompany Preaudit Difference Statements
No.35382 & 35381 dated November 5,1935:-

Sv. No. 1. The acquisition of the second-hand Dodge car was the only solution of the Expedition's transport problem. In the spring and the early part of summer horse transport is not available in the region, as the animals are extremely weak after winter. It was found impossible to secure a sufficient number of strong animals able to stand hard work. The camel caravan season ends in May, and the Mongols never work their camels in the summer. Chinese cameleers were not available at that time. Heavy tricks can be used in Mongolia only on certain routes, and could hardly be used for botanical exploration in the open steppe and in the hill-ranges. The Dodge cars in Mongolia are used both to carry passengers and goods. The Expedition to be able to carry on with its work over such a vast area, required a light car, and since cars were not available for hire, the only solution left was to acquire the second-hand Dodge car belongin to Mr. Larson and to use it both for botanical exploration and transport of the Expedition's equipment. Hired cars from Khalgan could not be had because of the events in North China which for several weeks closed the Inner Mongolian region for all motor traffic. Moreover a hired car for the whole season of field work would cost infinitely more. We therefore feel that the acquisition of Mr. Larson's car was the only solution of the transport problem, and are resubmitting the amount. The car is now left on sale with the local Ford Agent in Kuei-hua, Mr. G. Soderbom, and the proceeds of the sale will of course be refounded to the Department.

Sv. NNe. I & 2. Extra repair parts and tires were essential in field work, as tires are very quickly worn out on the gravel surface of the Mongolian Gobi.

Explanations to accompany Preaudit Difference Statement No.35384 dated November 5,1935:-

Sv.NNo.2,3 & 8. This additional field equipment was found necessary because of the increase of the Expedition staff by two new members, Dr.Y.L.Keng, of the Academia Sinica, and Assistant Yang, whee were receiving subsistence while engaged in field work.

Sv.No.5. A supply of medicines was required for the use of the members of the Expedition's staff who were receiving subsistence while engaged in field work.

Moreover medicines had to be frequently given to natives, and as such formed an indispensable part of the Expedition's field equipment.

The required receipt for Mex\$ 283.00 (Subvo.No.6) is herewith enclosed.

With reference to the payment of Mex\$ 24.00 to the French Bakery, Peiping, I have to state that this payment was made by our agents, the Pacific Storage Corporation of Peiping, during our absence in Mongolia. A general bill of the Pacific Storage Corporation is herewith enclosed showing that M\$ 24.00 were actually paid for. Please return this statement after perusal, since it contains items of personal expenses not chargeable to public funds.

Explanation to accompany Preaudit Difference Statement dated December 16th, 1935.

Re transportation of two boxes of ammunition on Sept. 6th, 1935:

This ammunition (rifle and pistol ammunition) was the property of the Government, and was returned to the 15th Infant ry in Tientsin together with the six rifles and four pistols. The amount of US\$ 3.06 is therefore resubmitted.

With regard to the rate, 2.55, as per Ban statement dated March 16th, 1935, I have to state that the last exchange of funds took place in March, when the last transfer was received. Since no transfer was received afterwards, there was no exchange in September.

The two cables of the 15th and 18th September, 1935, had been sent from a Chinese Telegraph Office and proper receipts were obtained and attached to the September Voucher. It is impossible to send telegraphic messages from a Chinese Govt. Telegraph Office according to the U.S. Govt.rate. The amount of M\$ 65.18, which had actually been paid by us according to the receipts, is therefore resubmitted. Both telegrams were urgent, as otherwise the sending of botanical collections would have been delayed.

The sum of Mex. \$ 31.00 represents the sum realized from the sale of the expedition's kitchen & camp equipment acquired in Peiping and Kalgan / see our December and March, 1935

Vouchers %. The equipment was sold to Mongols and no receipts could be obtained, though efforts had been made to secure properly signed receipts.

In our letter of May 2ist,1937, we have requested that this item, together with one single fly tent (purchased 10/28/34 at a cost of \$ 46.94), one stove (purchased March 7,1935 at a cost of \$ 9.69), six wooden tent-pegs and one broken camp stool, sould be treated as personal property in view of the difficulty of communicating with Kuei-hua over so far a distance, and the present situation in North China.

The two canvas bags purchased on Dec.4,1937, were made to hold camping cots and being damaged during field work, were sold with the cots.

Additional explanation re one coat purchased on the 18th June, 1934 (See voucher 37179):-

This cost formed part of the field equipment given to the first assistant and was used by him in field work.

Additional explanation re advance of funds made to Mr.Kitagawa, Japanese Secretary to the Expedition (See voucner 37179).

Mr.Kitagawa's services were obtained through the Japanese Foreign Office. His monthly salary and the ¥ 200.00 advance to enable him to prepare for the trip, were communicated to us by Mr.Tsubokami, Chief of the Bureau of Cultural Relations in the Foreign Office. Under circumstances it was difficult to argue this point.

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Additional explanation re advance of Sunds made to Mr. Kitagawa, Japanese Secretary to the Expedition (. See voucher 37179).

Mr. Kitagawa's services were obtained through the Japanese Foreign Office. His monthly salary and the ¥ 200.00 advance to enable him to prepare for the trip, were communicated to us by Mr. "subokami, Chief of the Bureau of Cultural Relations in the Foreign Office. Under circumstances it was difficult to argue this point.

One saddle with bridle was given as a present to the Mongol Serat, who acted as guide and driver to the Expedition, and on several occasions brought supplies for the Expedition from Kuei-hua. Efforts were made to secure an acknowledgment from him, but as he had left with Sir Eric Treichman's party for Hsin-chiang / Hastern Turkestan/, we were unable to get it.

Explanation to accompany Subvouvhers NNo. I-9.

The items listed in the subvouchers were paid for by the Pacific Storage Corporation, Peiping, acting on behalf of the Expedition. The amounts listed in the subvouchers were paid to the Corporation on the Expedition's return to Peiping in September.

The provisions listed in the bills were ordered in August, but the money was paid in September on the Expedition's return to Peiping. No efficer subsisted from the above supplies. The 2nd Class rly ticket from Peiping to Shanghai (M\$ 55.80) represents the return transportation of assistant.

The sum of Mex. \$31.00 represents the sum realized from the sale of the expedition's kitchen & camp equipment acquired in Marbin, Peiping and Malgan (this equipment included the kitchen equipment bought on July 23,1934, kitchen equipment bought from Carl Wolff, Peiping, on March 6,1935, one kettle bought on 21/3, one lantern bought on 21/3, one tea-pot bought on 25/3, one kettle bought on 25/3, one iron stove bought on 25/3 (broken), one second-hand kettle bought on 4/VII). The equipment was sold in camp to visiting Mongols and unfortunately no receipts could be obtained, though efforts had been made to make the buyers sign their names. Much of this equipment was damaged and could not be sold at Kuei-hua or Peiping.
