"I cordially commend the Russian Clergy and Church Aid Fund to the continued support of members of the Church of England. Our hearts were stirred when we first heard of the persecutions in Russia of our fellow Christians and indeed of all who profess any belief in God. But with the lapse of years we tend to forget that they are still patiently and courageously suffering manifold forms of oppression. It is impossible, for example, to provide in Russia itself any training for the clergy of the Russian Church. It is the more necessary to support the Theological Institute in Paris maintained by the Fund where such clergy can be adequately trained not only to minister to the large number of Russians in Europe driven from their own country, but to be ready to minister in Russia itself whenever this may be possible. Meanwhile, it is good to learn of the signs of religious progress and revival even in Russia itself.





Dear Mr. President:

Following your suggestion I have read the allegory by Arthur Hopkins, transmitted to you by Eddie Dowling. This is a beautiful thing and essentially more true than the reports which you get from your economists and administrators.

Has the time of the "singing children" come? Are
we again willing to perceive the beauty of the "world mother"?
Has the "strong one" lost his power because hatred, greed, prejudice and selfishness have left the human heart? Have the
"turbulent one" and the "fervent one" lost their fears and
suspicions so that they can sing with joy? Has the time come
when we are at home with the potentialities of a knowledge
which is continually passing into an ever-growing wisdom?

If so, then this is indeed a New Era but I feel for a short time yet, we must deal with the "strong ones", the turbulent ones", the "fervent ones" and perhaps even with a temporary resurgence with the "flameless ones" who with one last dying gasp will strive to re-animate their dying giant "Capitalism".

Mr. President, you can be the "flaming one", the one with the ever upward-surging spirit to lead us into the time when the children of men can sing again, but I feel, Mr. President, that the perils concerning which I spoke to you last Wednesday must be successfully passed before we can enter safely into the time of the infinite unselfish expansion of the spirit.

Dear Mr. Secretary:

I greatly appreciate the kindly personal attitude which you have concerning the objectives of the Banner of Peace and the Roerich Peace Pact.

With regard to the official attitude I am not altogether surprised because in the past the United States has usually been very slow in recognizing international ideals of this sort. You may remember that 31 nations recognized the Red Cross in an official way before the United States. It was, in fact, 16 or 17 years after the Red Cross had been recognized by most of the important European nations before the United States was willing to join in this great humanitarian enterprise.

It seems that the Red Cross proposition was put up to Secretary Seward in 1866 and at that time he took very much the same attitude which you are now taking as a result of advice given him, so tradition says, by one of the assistants in the office. This situation in the State Department continued until 1881 when Glara Barton went direct to President Garfield. The President gave her a little note which she took to Secretary Blaine and as a result the way was cleared for the United States to join with the 31 nations which had previously signed in this great humanitarian project.

I really think that the objectives of the Banner of Peace and the Roerich Peace Pact against the background of the present day are even more important in some ways than the Red Cross. I am trusting that the attitude which characterized the Hoover administration in this matter will now be changed and that we can begin to make some real progress toward doing our part in holding up international ideals in the way that is so dear both to your heart and to mine.

It is my understanding that in the Hoover administration there was some active opposition toward this general idea. I would appreciate it, therefore, if you could direct Mr. Dunn or whoever has charge of the inquiries, concerning the convention next November 17, to handle the replies in the most friendly manner possible, within the limits of your letter of September 29. I am hoping also, of course, that you, like Secretary Blaine in connection with the Red Cross, will eventually be willing to see your way clear to take the effective next step. Perhaps you can tell me the preliminary conditions under which this might be possible.

Some years ago I think in 1930 I bought from a publisher in Vienna, Springer, two books: Symbolae Sinicae, part IV and part VI, a work published by Handel Mazetti on the plants collected by him in Yunnan in 1914-1918. For these I paid 14 dollars gold. I have however never received them. Handel Mazetti looked into the matter for me and found that Springer had sent them by registered bookpost to the Dept. of Agriculture in Washington, and he had the registery receipts which he showed Handel Mazetti. The books one on (music) the other on (Pteridophyta) have never been forwarded to me and are apparently still held in your office for that is where they were sent. I should not like to lose these books as I have subscribed to the whole set. I would greatly appreciate if you would kindly see if they can be located and if so please send them to me out here.

I presume you have received the seeds of lilies, etc. in poor condition. I have sent to Goodspeed over 1250 packages of seeds representing as many (plants) species and some 25,000 herbarium specimens.

There is little news save that the Tibetans are again on the warpath trying to conquer LW, and West Szechecan and the Kokonor. they are well supplied with English Enfield rifles; it is interesting to see how the British on maps of Tibet always include the entire Kokonor and even Tatsienlu into Tibet, although Tatsienlu was never Tibetan territory but always under Tussu or petty kings, the Chiala King whose territory extended to Litang. The idea being now to encourage the Tibetans to take all that territory for sooner or later, at any rate after the death of the present Dalai Lama,. they will ammex Tibet and the larger the territory the better. for the Kokonor has the large wool trade and the Tatsienla side the tea. fur, musk, etc. trade, and with these nearts in their hands they control everything. The present Panchen Lawra who hates the Dalai Lama, and the British, and who is fearfully pro-Chinese, is a refugee in China; I saw him last fall in Peking, and if the British tarry too long Tibet will revert to China, should the Dalai Lama who is getting on in years die, for the Panchen Lamas a much younger man will swoop down with Chinese help, and take charge of Tibet. Furthermore a Tibetan prophesy says that Tibet will have 13 Dalai Lamas and no more and the present Dalai Lama is the 13th; so it is very likely that the present pontif will be the last one, and the British will have another excuse in that prophesy to extend their political influence ere the Chinese take a hand in the affairs. China, in spite of what Britain says, has never relinguished her authority over Tibet and she is no doubt anxiously waiting for the death of the Delai Lama to push the Panchen Lama who is the spiritual father of the Dalai Lama, and much better liked than the latter, to the fore and with his anti-Brisish attitude he can swing the majority of the Nomads and other Tibetans of the more oppressed classes to his side, although the Tibetans as a whole can't love the Chinese who are all but colongers, looking down on everyone who is not a son of Honess a dog-barbarian and treat them accordingly. It will be interesting to see what the next 10 years will bring. Someday I may write a political treatise on that part of the world from first hand observations and experiences. It may be better for me then to stay away from this part of the world. With kindest regards.

ings by explaining to the press and other persons concerned the real intention of the Professor. At the same time, our Embassy at Hsingkiang arranged that newspapers in Manchoukuo would publish articles about Professor Roerich in order to disseminate his friendliness toward Japan, his efforts to introduce Japanese art to the United States and elsewhere and the fact that the Emperor of Manchoukuo had received him in audience. Such articles appeared in newspapers all over Manchoukuo.

The Japanese authorities concerned have thus been taking the necessary steps to counteract the unfortunate reports about Professor Roerich, but in view of Mr. Wallace's representations they are renewing their efforts in the matter.

Lest any further obscuration of the matter arise, I have written to the American Consuls in Tokyo and Harbin as well as to Colonel Saito at Hailar and enclose copies of my letters to them for your information.

I sincerely hope that matters with the expedition, unfortunately hampered by the actions of the botanists, will now continue most advantageously for the complete success of its purposes. Great public anticipation has been aroused by the expedition due to the sad situation caused by our unprecedented drought this past summer and I feel confident that this work under your leadership will make available to this country plant material which will help decidedly in making and totally possible greater human happiness in the western plains area.

I was delighted to learn through articles in the Japanese and Manchhrian press which were brought to my attention here of the splendid reception which you have received both in Japan and Harbin. I am not surprised since I am well awars of the high regard in which you are held there. Permit me to congratulate you for these tributes to your great personal accomplishments.

Dear Sir:

This is to notify you that Dr. H. G. MacMillan and Mr. J. L. Stephens of this department who have been in Manchuria as botanist and assistant botanist of the expedition for drought resistant grasses under the leadership of Professor Roerich have been recalled by me to America for insubordination and failure to carry out instructions on the expeditions.

This department is fortunate in having secured the cooperation as leader of this expedition of Professor Roerich, one of the greatest authorities on Central Asia and deeply respected in these countries. In addition to Professor Roerich as leader and Dr. George Roerich, assistant to the leader, the expedition also comprises such native personnel as Professor Roerich finds it necessary to add to his staff for the success of the work. Professor Roerich's actions have my entire approval and confidence.

I am transmitting this information to you for your use as well as an addition to your knowledge if any inquiry in regard to the expedition should reach the consulate. This emboding the Roeith Part" treaty, which was initiated by the Roerich Museum in the United States, was prepared in its present form by the Governing Board of the Pan American Union in pursuance of a resolution approved on December 16, 1933, by the Seventh International Conference of American States at Montevideo, and was signed at Washington on April 15, 1935, by the respective plenipotentiaries of the twenty-one American Republics.

The treaty has for its object the protection of historic monuments, museums, scientific, artistic, educational and cultural institutions both in time of peace and in time of war, and provides for the use of a distinctive flag to identify the monuments and institutions coming within the protection of the treaty.

was signed for the United States by the Secretary of
Agriculture by virtue of a full power issued to him by me.

As is stated in the accompanying report of the Secretary of State, the treaty, which was initiated by the Roerich Museum in the United States, was prepared in its present form by the Governing Board of the Pan American Union for the purpose of carrying out a recommendation made to the Governments in a resolution approved on December 16, 1933, by the Seventh International Conference of American States at Montevideo.

Gradually I begin to understand more and more the language of the Great Heart. Surely we are as children newly born. May the Lord guide us and keep us and may we do our part to ease the great burden. for the Glory of the World that is to be.
