Like yourself we are anxiously awaiting to hear some news from Paris: I feel sure everything will be successful in every way. —
Sweetig my darling brother spends quite a few evenings with us. Last week he was at least 3 nights at our house for supper and one night with Lichtmanns. He is very busy arranging his studio and is looking forward for some portrait work. We have send letters to many Museums in his behalf in hopes of arranging his exhibition trip. One Museum declined another expects to send one of its directors here to see his pictures. Nothing further about the Medecins. We speak to everyone about it and we know in time the
