

Conditions of Salaries in the U.S.A.

Already a year ago many industrial firms cut the wages 10% - If they did not reduce the salaries they employed the men only 3 or 4 days per week. Other firms forced their workers to take vacations lasting from one week to 2 weeks without pay. -

At the present time with the increase in unemployment wages and salaries have declined still further. At this writing America leads the world in unemployment -

For instance we had a secretary work here who knew shorthand and typing for \$10. - per week. The best stenographer can be secured for \$25. - per week. Our leading secretaries who received \$40. - per week a year ago and are still receiving \$40. - now, really in fact are receiving ^{to the equivalent of} \$48. - per week now, because food & stuffs, clothing and rentals have easily declined 20% or more. Especially hard hit are apartment houses where in some cases a reduction of 40% over last year's rent was made. Prof. Kahn stated his salary was reduced and Prof. Hewett said his university and other universities are reducing their salaries 25%. - Therefore it seems that

the Reich Museum, which so far has refrained from cutting salaries hoping that conditions would improve and not wishing to cause hardships to its employees should join in the general reduction of salaries now taking place in the U.S.A.

Salaries in the Reich Apartments have already been cut 20% and some salaries within a month's time will be still further reduced.

A. R. Hall

Subject enlisted in the Army Transportation Corp 82nd Division United States Army in 1915 and was discharged in 1919. He then went to work for the American Express Co in Hoboken as a Stock Policeman. From there he went to work in the Police Department of the Brooklyn Navy Yard. He worked there from June 1925 to July 1927. The commanding officer that was interviewed claimed that they found him very satisfactory.

He next went to work in the United States Customs Office as a guard having passed the Examination and had been appointed. He went to work July 2 1927 and on June 1st 1928 he was dismissed for Cause after a hearing in which he was found guilty of numerous charges. Among those were abandoning his post on Board the S.S. Paris; obtaining liquor and consuming same; of abandoning his Post on Board S.S. Grassi; obtaining liquor and consuming same; of abandoning his post on numerous ^{other} occasions obtaining liquor and consuming same; buying liquor from Bootleggers and consuming same while

on duty, leaving his Post on the Pier
and stealing a Case of Canned
goods, disposing of same and
returning to the loft and
stealing another Case of
Canned Goods. —

After being dismissed from the
United States Customs he obtained a
Position with the Guernsey Co. acting as
guard as sometimes a Collector
a position that requires a great
deal of Confidence. The Guernsey
Trust Co. investigated him very thoroughly
before putting him to work,
but he never advised the
Guernsey T. Co. that he had been
working in the United States Customs
and they did not know of that
incident at the time they hired
him. He worked with them from
October 1st 1928 until July 1st 1929.

We, the undersigned, for the purpose of forming a corporation pursuant to the provisions of the Membership Corporation Law of the State of New York, do hereby certify and state:

1. The name of the proposed corporation is
WORLD LEAGUE OF CULTURE AND WORLD COUNCIL OF CULTURE Inc.
2. This corporation is organized for the following cultural and benevolent purposes, to wit:

- A. To advance the cause of peace through culture among nations, to encourage the adoption of the Roerich Pact, and the Roerich Banner of Peace for use in the protection and preservations of workd of art and the cultural treasures of the world; to catalog the cultural treasures of the world; to secure the cooperation of all individuals, without distinction of race, creed or class, and educational, scientific and religious institutions, institutions of art and other bodies formed to advance the cause of peace, in the work of this organization; and to disseminate knowledge and information con-

cerning the activities of this organization and its aims. The corporation is empowered to use for these ends such methods, agencies and means as from time to time shall seem expedient to its directors, or be found appropriate therefor.

B. This corporation shall have the power to take receive and acquire by bequest, devise, gifts, purchase, lease or otherwise, either absolutely or in trust, for any of its purposes, and to hold any property, real or personal, without limitations as to amount or value, except such limitations, if any, as shall be imposed by the laws of the State of New York; to convey such property, and to invest and reinvest any principal, and deal with and expend the principal and income of the corporation in such manner as in the judgment of its directors will best promote its aforesaid objects, or

C. This corporation shall have all the powers and be subject to the restrictions which now pertain by law to membership corporations, so far as the same are applicable thereto.

3. The territory in which its operations are to be conducted is within the State of New York and elsewhere throughout the United States and in foreign countries.

4. The city in which its principal office is to be located is the City of New York, in the Borough of Manhattan, County and State of New York.

CONSTITUTION

Article I.

Name.

The name of this organization shall be: WORLD LEAGUE OF CULTURE INC.
American Section.

Article II.

Objects.

The objects of the organization shall be:

To advance the cause of peace through culture among nations, to encourage the adoption of the Roerich Pact, and the Roerich Banner of Peace for use in the protection and preservations of works of art and the cultural treasures of the world; to catalog the cultural treasures of the world; to secure the cooperation of all individuals, without distinction of race, creed or class, and educational, scientific and religious institutions, institutions of art and other bodies formed to advance the cause of peace, in the work of this organization; and to disseminate knowledge and information concerning the activities of this organization and its aims.

Article III.

Membership

Section 1. Individuals or organizations in sympathy with its aims are eligible for membership in this League.

Section 2. Organizations, societies and other collectives join the League on autonomous principles, not losing their identity or name, but for the mutual help in various spheres of communion.

Section 3. Prospective members and organizations must be proposed by a member of the League in good standing and must be accompanied by an application stating the class of membership desired, accompanied with a check for one year's dues. Such applications will be submitted to the Executive Council and a Majority vote will be necessary for final acceptance.

Section 4. The term of Membership will be for one year from date of acceptance by the League. Membership accepted on or before the fifteenth of any month will date from the first of that month, and if accepted after the fifteenth of any month will date from the first of the following month.

Article IV.

Governing Bodies

Section 1. The governing power of this League shall be vested in an Executive Council, and the officers.

Section 2. The Executive Council shall consist of the Directors who founded the League, the officers during their incumbency of office, and such other members as are elected annually to that Body by a majority vote of the Executive Council. The Executive Council shall have the authority to conduct the business of the League, to order Disbursement^s and Investments of the funds of the League.

Article V.

Officers

The Officers shall be a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and a Treasurer. They shall be elected for a period of one year as shall be provided for in the By-Laws and shall hold office until their successors are elected.

Article VI.

Section 1. The Executive Council shall hold its regular meeting on the first Monday of each month, with the exception of July, August, and September, unless otherwise designated by the Ex. Council.

Section 2. Seven members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article VII.

Amendments.

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Executive Council provided the proposed amendment has been presented to the Council, in writing, at a meeting not less than four weeks previous.

BY - LAWS

Article 1

Election of Officers

Section 1. The officers shall be elected by a majority vote of the Executive Council.

Section 2. The election shall take place every year at its November meeting, which shall constitute the annual meeting of the officers.

Section 3. The nominating committee shall present a slate at the monthly meeting preceeding the annual meeting of the officers.

Section 4. Election shall be by ballot.

Article II

Duty of Officers

Section 1. President. The President shall preside at all meetings at which he is present.

Section 2. Vice-Presidents. The Vice-Presidents shall preside at all meetings in the absence of the President. The Vice-Presidents shall succeed each other in the order in which they were elected.

Section 3. Secretary. The Secretary shall keep the records of the League and shall record all Minutes in a book to be kept for that purpose. The Secretary shall also see that notices of all meetings be sent to the Executive Council. The Secretary shall conduct all correspondence relating to the organization. The Secretary shall keep a register of the members of the organization.

Section 4. Treasurer. All moneys payable to the organization shall be paid to the Treasurer of the organization. All moneys payable by the organization shall be paid by checks signed by the Treasurer, and countersigned by one of the officers. He shall report at each meeting of the organization the condition of the treasury.

Article III.

The membership of the League shall be divided into the following classes:

Members of the Advisory Council. Members of the Advisory Council shall be elected by a majority vote of the Executive Council of the League in recognition for valuable services rendered to this organization, or for distinction in their fields of endeavor. These shall be granted all privileges of memberships and shall be exempt from all dues.

Corresponding Member. A corresponding member shall be a member regularly elected for the purpose of promoting the ideals of the League. Such member shall be granted all privileges of the League and shall be exempt from annual fees.

Annual Membership for Individuals. An annual individual member is one who contributes \$1.00 annually to the support of the League.

Annual Membership for Organizations. An annual organization member is an organization which contributes \$3.00 annually to the support of the League.

Article IV.

Delinquent Members

Section 1. The name of any member of the Society may be stricken from the rolls by a majority vote of the Executive Council.

Section 2. Members who do not pay their dues within four weeks after a second notice has been sent to them may be dropped from the membership list without further notice.

Article V.

Meetings

Section 1. The regular meetings of the Executive Council shall be attended only by the Executive Council of the League.

Section 2. A special meeting of the Executive Council may be called at any time at the request of three members, with due notice given.

Section 3. Should the Executive Council of the League deem it necessary to call a special meeting from any classes of membership, they may do so upon a majority vote.

Section 4. All organizations which have joined the League have the privilege to send their representative to special meetings called by the Council of the League.

Section 5. For the discussion of questions of general importance partial or general conventions can be summoned, to which can be invited according to the resolution of the local council institutions as well as individuals who did not enter into the League, but who can help in the cause of Culture through their knowledge.

Article VI.

Vacancies

Section 1. In case of the death or resignation of any one of the officers, his successor shall be elected by a majority vote of the Executive Council.

Article VII.

Standing Committees

Section 1. The activities of the League shall be conducted by the following standing committees:

- (a) Membership Committee
- (b) Nominating Committee
- (c) And such other committees as the Ex. Council may create

Article VIII.

Amendments

The By-Laws may be amended only at a special meeting called for that purpose. Notice of such meeting must be sent four weeks previous, stating the proposed amendment in the notice and must be approved by two-thirds vote of the members present.

Article I

Name

The name of this society shall be "The Society of Friends of Roerich Museum."

Article II

Object

The Society of Friends of Roerich Museum is an international society devoted to the ideals of brotherhood through art, as expressed in the paintings and writings of Nicholas Roerich. The Society of Friends of Roerich Museum will pursue its aims through the extension of the collections of the Roerich Museum, through the issuing of publications pertaining to the creative art of Roerich and the work of the Museum. Through its publications the "Archer", the society aims to extend the knowledge of the art of Nicholas Roerich as well as other cultural movements.

Article III

Membership

Section 1 . Any person _____

_____ Is eligible for membership in this society.

Section 2. Prospective members must be proposed by a member of the Society in good standing and must be accompanied by an application stating the class of Membership desired, accompanied with check for one year's dues. Such applications will be submitted to the Trustees and a Majority vote will be necessary for final acceptance.

Section 3. The term of Membership will be for one year from date of acceptance by the Society. Membership accepted on or before the 15th of any month will date from the first of that month, and if accepted after the fifteenth of any month will date from the first of the following month.

Article IV

Governing Bodies

Section 1. The governing power of this society shall be vested in a Board of Trustees and an Executive Council.

Section 2. The Board of Trustees shall consist of the eleven members that founded the society. Their term of office shall be perpetual. Upon the death or resignation of any member of the Board of Trustees the successor shall be elected by a majority of vote of the remaining trustees. The Board of Trustees shall have final action of all

measures passed by the Executive Council whenever such action is deemed necessary.

Section 3. The Executive Council shall consist of the Trustees and the Officers of the Society. The Council shall have authority to conduct the business of the Society to order disbursements and investments of the funds of the Society.

Article V

Officers.

The Officers shall be a President, one or more Vice Presidents, a Secretary and a Treasurer. They shall be elected for a period of two years as shall be provided for in the By-Laws and shall hold office until their successors are elected.

Article VI

Meetings

Section 1. The Executive Council shall hold its regular meeting on the first Thursday of each month, with the exception of July, August and September.

Section 2. Seven members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article VII

Amendments

This Constitution may be amended by a two thirds vote of the Executive Council provided the proposed amendment has been presented to the Council, in writing, at a meeting not less than four weeks previous.

BY-LAWS

Article 1.

Election of Officers

Section 1. The officers shall be elected by a majority vote of the Executive Council.

Section 2. The election shall take place every two years at the meeting.

Article II

Duties of Officers

Section 1. President. The President shall preside at all meetings at which he is present.

Section 2. Vice-Presidents. The Vice-Presidents shall preside at all meetings in the absence of the President. The Vice-Presidents shall succeed each other in the order in which they were elected.

Section 3. Secretary. The Secretary shall keep the records of the Society and shall record all minutes in a book to be kept for that purpose. He shall also see that notices of all meetings sent to Trustees and Officers.

Section 4. Treasurer. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer:

- (a) To have charge of the funds of the Society.
- (b) To keep full and accurate account of the receipts and disbursements of the Society.
- (c) To render to the Executive Council, at each meeting of the Society, a statement showing the financial condition of the Society.
- (d) To prepare with the aid of the Executive Council an annual budget.
- (e) To make an annual report at _____
- (f) To keep an accurate list of the members of the Society. (?)
- (g) To invest the funds of the Society when ordered to do so by the Executive Council.

Article IV

Delinquent Members

Section 1. The name of any member of the Society may be stricken from the rolls by a majority vote of the Executive Council.

Section 2. Members who do not pay their dues within two weeks after a second notice has been sent to them will be automatically dropped from the membership list.

Article III.

Classes of memberships and Dues.

Honorary Members. Honorary members shall be elected by a majority vote of the Executive Council of the society in recognition for valuable services rendered to this organization, or for distinction in their fields of endeavor. These shall be granted all privileges of memberships and shall be exempt from all dues.

Corresponding Members. A corresponding member shall be a member regularly elected for the purpose of promoting the ideals of the society in America and foreign countries. Such members shall be granted all privileges of the Society and shall be exempt from annual fees.

Article V

Meetings.

Where is article IV?

Section 1. The regular meeting of the Executive Council shall be attended only by the Trustees and officers of the Society.

Section 2. A special meeting of the Executive Council may be called at any time at the request of three members.

Section 3. Should the Trustees of the Society deem it necessary to call a special meeting from any classes of membership, they may do so upon a majority vote.

Article VI

Vacancies.

Section 1. In case of the death or resignation of any one of the officers, his successor shall be elected by a majority vote of the Executive Council.

Article VII

Standing Committees

Section 1. The activities of the Society shall be conducted by the following standing committees.

- (a) The Editorial staff of the "Archer", which shall be composed of an Editor in chief, and three associate Editors. Two members of the Editorial staff shall be chosen from among the Trustees.
- (b) Membership committee.
- (c) Press Committee

- (d) Social committee.
- (e) Circulation committee

Article VIII

Amendments.

These By-Laws may be amended at any meeting of the Executive Council by a two-thirds vote of the members present, provided the proposed amendment has been sent to each member of the Executive Council one week before said meeting.

Article IX

Suspension of By-Laws.

The Executive Council may suspend for one evening any article in these by-laws by a two third vote of the members present.

Article X

Order of Business.

4. Secretaries report.
5. Report of committees.
6. Unfinished business.

8. Adjournment.

Article XI.

Parliamentary Authority.

Roberts rules of order shall govern the proceedings of the Society in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with this Constitution and by-laws.

BY - LAWS

Extra from Article III

Classes of Memberships and dues (cont)

The membership of the society shall be divided into the following classes.

Section 1. _____

Section 2. Patrons. A patron is a regularly elected life member who contributes \$ 5,000 to the support of the society.

Section 3. Life - members. A life-member is a regular elected member who contributes \$300 to the support of the Society.

Section 4. Sustaining members. A sustaining member is a regularly elected member who contributes \$25,00 annually to the support of the Society.

Section 5. Annual members. An annual member is a regularly elected member who contributes \$10,00 annually to the support of the Society.

Section 6. Active Fellows. An active fellow shall be elected by the Society on the grounds of merit for active participation in the Society. The annual dues of such a member shall be \$5,00.

Section 7. Junior Members. A junior member shall be a regularly elected member under ~~\$25,000~~ 25 years of age and the annual dues of such members shall be \$5,00.

Section 8. Non-Resident Members. A non-resident member shall be a regularly elected member who lives outside of Great New York. The annual dues of such members shall be \$5,00.

Translation

FRENCH ASSOCIATION OF FRIENDS OF ROERICH MUSEUM

R u l e s

Object and Organization

Article 1

The French Association of Friends of Roerich Museum, founded under that denomination, has for its object to spread in France knowlege of the work of the Master, Nicholas Roerich, and to contribute, in collaboration with the Roerich Institutions in New York City, to the strengthening of the links of friendship and cooperation uniting France and America in the field of artistic and intellectual relations.

Article 2.

The seat of the Association is established in Paris, 397 Rue Vaugirard.

Article 3.

Its (the Association's) means of action are: lectures, publications, meetings, performances, concerts and exhibitions, and all enterprises designed to help the spreading of Nicholas Roerich's Teachings in France and to promote artistic, intellectual and spiritual understanding between France and the United States.

The Association shall maintain relations with French and American organization pursuing similar aims.

Article 4.

The Association consists of Honorary Members, Active Members and Adherents. To become a Member one must be admitted by the Administrative Board of the Association.

Active Members pay an annual fee of Frs. 20.
Adherents pay annual fee of Frs. 10.

Life Members may be admitted in accordance with the law on Associations (Law July 1st 1901)

The title of Honorary Member is granted by the Administrative Board to persons who have rendered exceptional services to the Association.

Administration of the Association.

Article 5.

The French Association of Friends of Roerich Museum is governed by an Administrative Board of eleven Members. That number may be increased by a decision of the General Meeting.

The Board elects among its members:
a President; two Vice-Presidents;
a Secretary General; and a Treasurer General.

The Honorary President is ex officio Member of the Board.

Article 6.

The Administrative Board is elected for a period of three years and shall meet once every three months, at least, at the Seat of the Association; or at any other appointed place. Its decisions are determined by a majority of votes of the Members present.

A quorum of Five Members is required for the validity of the Boards decisions.

One third of the Board is renewed every year. Its Members may be re-elected.

Article 7.

The Board shall establish its internal regulations, appoint its executive officers and determine its methods of procedure.

Article 8.

The Board nominates the Honorary Members of the Association.

Article 9.

The General meeting shall assemble once a year, at a date appointed by the Administrative Board.

An internal regulation shall determine the rules of proceedings of the General Meeting.

The budget of the Association shall be adopted by the votes of the General Meeting, on recommendation of the Administrative Board.

Article 10.

The resources of the Association are constituted by:

- (1) Fees of Members.
- (2) Donations and subsidies which may be granted by the Association
- (3) Miscellaneous receipts.

Article 11.

The Board may exclude from the Association any member who by word or act has injured the common work.

LOCAL GROUPS.

Article 12.

The Administrative Board may authorize the creation of local groups in any place where twenty Members of the Association are at least in residence.

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES -- DISSOLUTION

Article 13.

The Rules may be subjected to amendment only on the advice of the Administrative Board, by a decision of the general meeting comprising at least two thirds of the members of the Association and with the concurrence of a majority of two-thirds of those present.

In the event that the above mentioned quorum is not reached, a second general meeting shall be summoned and may decide by a majority of votes, whatever be the number of those present.

Article 14.

The dissolution of the Association may be decided only in accordance with the same forms of procedure as those prescribed for amendments to the Rules.

In case the quorum is not reached, a second meeting shall be summoned for this special purpose within a month and may pronounce the dissolution of the Association, by vote of the majority of those present.

Article 15.

In case of dissolution, the assets of the Association shall be absorbed by the France-Amerique Committee.

WORLD LEAGUE OF CULTURE

The World League of Culture is a world organization, founded by Nicholas Roerich and Helena Roerich, aiming to enlist all men, without distinction of race, creed, or class in a united protection of the world's highest cultural traditions.

It is in answer to the call of Nicholas Roerich to Peace through Culture, as expressed in the Roerich Pact and Roerich Banner of Peace, that the World League of Culture is hereby organized, dedicated to furthering the world-wide adoption of the Roerich Pact and Roerich Banner of Peace, guarding and preservind the monuments of human genius and to uniting all those throughout the world who wish to preserve the products of human evolution and genius from any harm, as well as to remove them from the possibilities of any danger of destruction.

The World League of Culture aims to realize its purpose through the following ways:

1. By enlisting as members of the World League of Culture, men, women and children throughout the world. Membership in the World League of Culture shall be without distinction of race, creed or class, and shall be open to all who cherish creative heritages of man, and who desire to unite in preserving the monuments and traditions of culture.

2. The World League of Culture will cataligue and preserve for public knowledge through photography, description, sketches, literature and in any other manner as seems best, the cultural treasures of the entire world, so that this catalogue may remain an immemorable record for posterity, constituting the annals of cultural evolution and the true history of the creations of human genius.

World League of Culture:

3. The World League of Culture shall establish publications, periodicals, etc., to spread knowledge of the world's treasures of culture, and to provide continuous exchange of worthy proposals in behalf of culture, its preservation and its advancement.

4. The World League of Culture shall aim to encourage all educational movements which shall be aimed towards furthering understanding and widening of education in the broadest scope of the traditions of culture.

5. The World League of Culture shall cooperate with all existing cultural associations, scientific and art institutions, peace bodies, schools, museums, cathedrals, universities, in the fulfillment of their aims dedicated to furthering world culture.

6. The World League of Culture shall organize branches in all countries, as well as libraries and lecture series, and act as a bureau for unifying all movements relating to world culture and peace.

7. The World League of Culture shall have a body of Directors whose number should not exceed thirty.

RESOLUTIONS

Unanimously Adopted by the

THIRD INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION FOR THE ROERICH PACT AND BANNER OF PEACE

NOVEMBER 18, 1933 WASHINGTON, D. C.

With the Participation of Official Delegates from Twenty-seven Nations, and Observers from Six Nations.

WHEREAS the World's cultural achievements constitute the greatest treasures of the human race, and are the common heritage of all humanity,

AND WHEREAS injury to these treasures is a violence against the common benefits of mankind and of the future,

AND WHEREAS the Roerich Pact and Banner of Peace have been created by Nicholas Roerich, internationally renowned artist and cultural leader, for the protection of churches and all religious monuments, temples, shrines, museums, libraries, universities, and other monuments and treasures of culture and all natural sites and their designation by the Banner of Peace as inviolable and neutral at all times,

AND WHEREAS the Roerich Pact has been unanimously endorsed by the International Museums' Committee of the League of Nations as well as by numerous governmental and learned bodies and numerous leaders in the world of culture,

AND WHEREAS the efficacy of this cause depends upon its adoption and application by the nations,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Third International Convention for the Roerich Pact and Banner of Peace recommend the adoption of this humanitarian measure by the governments of all nations as a demonstration of the noble attitude of their people towards the cause of cultural protection and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to the appropriate representative of each nation.

WHEREAS the principles embodied in the Roerich Pact and Banner of Peace lend themselves to adoption or adhesion by unilateral action through proclamations of the executive, by bilateral action through international agreements, and by multilateral action through declarations of international conferences, Therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Chairman of this Convention be directed to transmit copies of the Resolution recommending the adoption of this measure by all nations, through the proper channels to the Governments, to international conferences, and to international organizations working for peace and culture, for such action as they may consider appropriate.
