Though we all have had ration trouble, and so on, yet, every villager I met says that he was putting everything right slowly, and they actually mourn him with tears in their eyes when they talk about him. As you know, here in the South, people do not feel so much for people in the North, there is so much difference in everything, that even our late PM. was to them loveable, and he gathered huge crowds, and they loved him, but when he was away, they became different. Now they seem to feel that they have lost some part of themselves, which is a new thing, everyone I met malies, sweepers, villagers, headmen, cartmen, and so on mourn him as if he belonged to them! Indira will ofcourse be the P. M., may God Protect her and give her strength, poor child, I do not envy her.

Do write to us when you can, we hope that 1966 will be a very very happy year for you both, take every care of yourselves.

joy, wonderful air, and though we were very busy for all the
months there, as new Flush system was put, and work for the
Roerich Museum, plans only, collecting stones etc. and Svetoslav's
painting and writing, and short journeys also in the mountains,
all of which kept us very busy, still, we just felt wonderful:

Conditions are not as they should be, administration seems to suffer to so many reasons, perhaps when we join Himachal, things will be better. For any work worthwhile, one has to bring labour from down plains, the local people are somehow fading away, and they will not work, they have small holdings, and are con tent with very little, work when they wish, and thus Tibetan labour, or others are engaged - all Mistires are brought from Chandigarh etc. ours too, which takes a lot of time, and also costs a lot, but this is the only way it seems that any building can be put up- or any work done. It all is very sad, and the valley suffers greatly, but what can one do? Indira is trying her very best to do things in the right way, she really is splendid, and if she is re-elected, many good and constructive things will be possible, let us see, poor girl is now trying her best to overcome this huge machine of things deeply rooted -! When will you both be coming here? You do come once a year let us know when please as we would love to see you.

The Unveiling ceremony of Panditji's postrait was on the 5th. May in Parliament, a most impressive occasion, and everyone liked the portrait, I must say it is really a great work of Art- of Panditji at the best time of his life, just before he fell ill, some people wanted to know why Svetoslav did not paint him when he was old and during his last days- but we hear these were those who never had any liking for him, can you imagine such a dreadful thing? Nehru was a man of Youth and beauty, and this portrait as the President so rightly said was for posterity, for the generations to come, he spoke very beautifully and thanked Svetoslav- so did everyone, it was Svetoslav's gift, as he said this was the best he could do in his memory, a simple tribute to this great man.
