Our very dear Ludmilla,

It is long since I wrote to you or you wrote to me. It is such a pity that you are so far away. Often we wish to meet you and talk to you about so many things. This year due to certain reasons which propably you can well imagine, we shall not be going to Kulu now but we hope that we shall go there sometime in October because that is a better time than now.

As you know we have had several changes but we hope that the Forces of Light will prevail later. A lot of things are happening which are interesting, it is interesting to live in all times but of course we wish, all of us, that we have preace in India. Our country has seen many changes in all the thousands of years that it has been and I suppose fresh changes India will also see and be able to overcome all conditions.

We are very busy with our work and my husband is painting a great deal. He read in the magazine "Knowledge is Power" about your new book on Australations in India. We were very happy to read about this most interesting and important work of yours and we would like very much to have a copy of it.

We will not know until we are in Delhi about several matters including the new Monograph on my husband which is coming out in Russia. who the Committee members are. Please let us know. We do not know anything about the Bogdanova affair or how it is functioning.

We hear from Pavel Federovich that the paintings which Mrs. Campbell had and for which my husband arranged when he met her in Switzerland, have reached Russia and we have also heard that she may visit Russia in this connection. Have you seen the paintings? They are very beautiful and interesting set and we are so happy that they have gone home to Russia.

In the changed circumstances at the moment we have to find out how we can manage about Mulu and the Institute Urusvati. The collaboration that we wanted to have may or may not be that easy as it was but one never knows. The present Prime Minister, Mr. Morarji Desai, is a very old friend of ours. By himself he is an excellent man and a fine administrator who has held important jobs in the Congress Government being first the Finance Minister and then the Deputy Prime Minister. He is a true follower of Gandhi and a man of principles but his Party consists of all the various Parties who joined together to make a Party called the Janata Party Strong, otherwise the Opposition was not strong enough to overthrow the previous Congress Government. There is no restriction on expression of speech etc. — let us hope that things will work out.

You can well understand our feelings I am sure about many things especially because we are not getting younger and we hope and wish to establish Kulu in the best possible way.

Do write when you can. The Rupee you gave me is still kept for you and I really do not know when I can make Puja in your name at the Shrine at the old Banyan tree.

Bless you dearest friend. May you have all you desire and more.

My very dear Ludmila,

What a joy to receive your dear letter after such a long time. I just cannot understand why you don't write to me because at least we keep in touch with each other. We have a saying in India that letters are most important as they are part of a person who sends them and so in this way one can contact each other.

We have just received your fascinating book "Australoids Live In India". It is amazing! I really don't know how you managed to bring out such a beautiful book. My tragedy is that I am unable to read it but I must congratulate you, along with Svetoslav, for this lovely publication. The photographs are just lovely and it gives one such a happy feeling. Hearty, hearty congratulations!

We ordered 50 copies of the little Monograph on S.N. in a most peculiar way. There is a firm here that deals with the firm in U.S.S.R. and through the Information Department of U.S.S.R., a friend helped to get us these copies. The text of Dr. Tyulaev, I understand, is very good but the English translation is quite weak in many places and not really correct. I am wondering what to do about it because I want to send it abroad. It is strange also that many of the paintings have been named wrongly. The exhibition ran for such a long time that surely they could have got the right names of the paintings. Of course, if they only asked us and sent us a copy of the translation and Dr. Tyulaev's text, my husband himself could have translated. Anyway, what can one do? Friends in U.S.S.R. tell us that still it is a fine thing that this book was printed at all. Forty thousand copies were printed and everything was sold out at once, so Mr. Belicov writes.

We are very interested to hear of all the news about the different celebrations proposed to be held. It is very good that you saw the paintings of Professor Roerich which were gifted by the President of the Roerich Museum in New York. If you remember, during our exhibition, we left for Switzerland to meet Mrs. Campbell? It was then that my husband persuaded her to give as a gift during the

Centenary of Prof. Nicholas Roerich these special paintings which were in her possession. In fact after it was decided by her that she would do so, my husband made an announcement of this gift, even on the radio and Television in the U.S.S.R. At one time Mrs. Campbell thought that perhaps after giving this gift the people concerned were not interested to get back these paintings because it took so long for them to contact her and we also had to write and remind them. It was the Minister of Culture who accepted the gift and in fact accepted the letter of Mrs. Campbell which S.N. gave to him when we met him. But we are happy that they are now in Russia as it is really their home.

It is strange to hear from you that this Committee has been formed and that Pavel Federovich and you are members of the Committee and that the President of this Committee has not been named. Surely now that you all know that the Committee has been formed, someone of you can enquire from the Ministry of Culture so that the work can start. Indeed it is a pity also that we are not there as we could push matters. Please try, dear Ludmila, to expedite this matter.

We have had quite a lot of important things to settle here because as you know there is a new Government and until the new Government settles down, things will have to be managed in the right way.

The thing that pleases us most is to hear of all the work you are going to do and we hope that as and when you publish these books, we shall receive a copy. Remember one thing, that we shall eventually put all these precious gifts of importance in our library in Kulu. Kulu is still a problem as again the Government has changed there. therefore the laws also change. It seems that there are definite plans of the new Government and that America is helping it. Since our beloved Russia has done so much to establish many important things in India in the Public Sector, one does not know how the balance of these 2 powers will be in the future. As Madam Roerich said, Russia will always be India's friend and our peoples will come closer together with the years. Let us hope so. After all, we are almost neighbours and we certainly hope that friendship will prevail between our two countries. I am sure and I hope that once the new Government gets settled and evaluates the tremendous help that Russia gave to India, it will also extend its hand of understanding and friendship.

Life is moving fast, good things and bad things are happening and all of us hope of course that whoever comes or goes, India will be able to survive and prosper. The future generation must have Peace to prosper. The more I study about India and Russia and other countries, I have a feeling that our two countries are bound to come closer with time. Now also as you must have heard, Pakistan has enough upheaval but there too may be this is for the best. Of one thing I am certain, Evil cannot succeed over Good. The Forces of Light will prevail for each phase is important in the life of a Nation and who knows that these changes are due to mistakes made from which one has to suffer and learn.

I will write to you again but I would be most happy to hear from you about the Committee. Can you not contact Pavel Federovich about this?

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With the year ending next month I choose to write to you better than to send you just a card of greetings. 1979 has not been too eventful a year for us because we have had plenty of trouble with strikes etc. which is very sad because we have given everything to the workers including their villages and their homes and yet they are not satisfied. What can one do? But the result has not been good. Because of these worries Svetoslav Nicholaevich has no peace of mind and he has not been painting much nor writing except seeing to the day to day work at the estate. Of course he leads his cultural life here and that is important, he has given important lectures and it is really surprising how much energy he has to do all the work in the office that he does. His health is good, thank God, and now he is in Kulu with two Russian Scientists and an Orientalist, Prof. Bongard-Levin.

The Bulgarian Ministers and experts are here also and Bulgaria is ready to start work of Urusvati. I think the Bulgarians will start first and then the Russians will join. Since I am not there I don't really know what will happen and what the arrangements are. Someone told me that you would be coming to India in the near future. This of course is wonderful news but when?

The present condition in India before the general Elections is one of instability and two political parties are busy trying their best to do something for themselves so that they are elected. I do not know who will ultimately succeed but many people think that Madam will return. Poor thing, she has all sorts of cases against her, all sorts of troubles against her son and so on and I really do not know how she will be able, inspite of all this, manage. Madam is going about travelling and campaigning and fighting without any rest.

Svetoslav Nicholaevich writes that Kulu is very beautiful - it is cold but very beautiful and they all are having a wonderful time.

For Dr. Bongard-Levin his visit to Kulu is a pilgrimage because he was a pupil of Yuri Nicholaevich. I wish you had come during the time the Roerichs were alive to see the work done and to see the Tamas and various Scholars who used to visit them. You would have learnt something very important with the contact of these people. Lama Karmadorji was a wonderful man and you know, he never slept in the house. Summer or Winter he would sleep outside and once when his Teacher called him, he flew to Tibet. He had the power of moving like that - this particular form of Yoga is called Yu Yoga. At will the man can move to different places. Whatever may happen, I hope that wonderful India will always remain the same and have the same spiritual values that it had for centuries. The very soil of India is sacred. For me personally it is a never ending study and one day when I have a little time, I hope to visit all the places which I have not done so far as yet. Of course with Svetoslav Nicholaevich it would be wonderful because he knows so well the different places, historic and otherwise, of this country. 



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The Year 1980 is ending and with it I hope better times will prevail in the coming Year. I send to you my very best wishes, not only for Christmas, but for the New Year.

For us the Year has been busy but I can't say too fruitful. We have been doing a lot of work with our cultural association with various Academies in India and abroad but we hope that next year things will be better. It seems as if the Astrologers are right when they predicted, during the time of the Solar Eclipse which passed over India after 80 years, that for the whole world there would be some sort of turmoil, one can see their predictions are true. The War in the Middle East, which cripples the flow of Petrol and crude oil, is very upsetting not only to us in India but to all countries. Here in India we have many problems such as the Assam issue which just does not get settled, and the whole of Assam is crippled because two different parties there wish to dislodge the foreigners who have settled there and who have jobs. It is impossible in a Democracy like ours which is entirely secular, which means that throughout India different castes and creeds exist and different minorities also such as the Christians, Parsees, Muslims etc. - we all have lived together all these years and if the Assam idea to dislodge foreigners is allowed to prevail, it will mean that other parts of India may also follow the same disruptive tendencies. How is it possible for the South Indians only to live in South India and North Indians the same way etc., because people have made their homes all over India and one cannot segregate them. Besides, this would be a most awful disintegration of the country as a whole. I mention this because we see the repercussions even in Karnataka when the people belonging to this place are now saying that they don't want foreigners. The general unrest has led to the rising prices, scarcity of sugar, kerosene and other commodities which affect the whole economy and cause dissatisfaction because they cannot pay for the expensive items, or even ordinary items because of the price rise which causes discontent. Of course our Government is slowly trying to stabilize things and we all hope that in the New Year, things will be sorted out and dealt with firmly. Opposition parties we hear, are making capital out of this situation causing riots etc., and even inciting some people to be violent. This is not everywhere in India but still, when published in the newspapers, the ordinary man feels a certain anxiety as to what will happen.

Personally of course we have full faith that everything will settle down. It is interesting that with all the above mentioned conditions, the life of the country goes on. There are so many cultural events, so many Art exhibitions, so many new ventures, and it is most interesting how Fashion Shows and new ventures take place such as, new designs for costumes and new styles evolved, of course with the Indian motive. Our girls are very smart these days and look lovely. It is interesting that orders come to these firms from abroad and therefore, these. new firms make good money. The Theatre and the Cinema are as strong as ever, in short this life goes on. As I said, the Art world is full of exhibitions and new Artists coming up all the time.

We hope that our Research Centre in Kulu will start functioning in 1981 with Foreign collaboration. "Urusvati", in Svetoslav Nicholaevich's home in Naggar, Kulu, used to be a Research Centre and a lot of work was done but, during the last War, it was closed down and only Dr. George Roerich's work was carried on in Tibetan, Mongolian, Sanskrit etc., Now when we start again, such research on Medicinal Herbs, the Spiritual history of those regions, research in Botany, the Arts of the region, and so many other subjects will be taken up besides building a few Museums for the specimens that we have of animals and birds and Paleontological which were collected a long time ago by experts from India and abroad. There will be also a small Museum with some of Prof. Roerich's paintings and Svetoslav Nicholaevich's also and a section dedicated to the Arts and Crafts of the region. Kulu shawls are famous.

I don't know how far all this will take place and be realised, but we hope that it will be started and continued because it was Prof. Roerich's and Madame Roerich's dream that Kulu should be developed and also Dr. George Roerich and Svetoslav Nicholaevich's wish to have an organisation of this type.

Here a big Art Complex is being built for which Svetoslav Nicholaevich obtained the land, he is the Patron of this Complex and when it is finished, it will attract a great deal of attention not only from India, but also from abroad.



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
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

Svetoslav Nicholaevich has received your long letter, a translation of which he will give me, but he has told me just a little bit and I am writing to you to tell you that you should please do whatever you can to keep Pavel Fedorovich's work alive so that there can be a continuation of all that Pavel Fedorovich wanted to publish with regard to the family Roerich.

It is so sad that the two men which Pavel Fedorovich hoped to train to carry on his work, or at least to know about it, somehow disappointed him so there is no one there to help you go through his Archives which must be considerable. There is no one in Russia who has such an exhaustive library and such information and documentation on the Roerichs as Pavel Fedorovich had, but there is no one also to make use of it because I hear from Kira Molchanova that Kiril is not competent to do so having a job of his own, and his daughter aged 40 now also is not in touch with the ideals of Prof. Roerich. Kira wrote that his daughter is now trying to understand Pavel Fedorovich's work and his inner spiritual feelings. Of course she is quite new to this work but still, maybe she can help you somewhat with the documention on the Roerichs etc. if there is no list of his books.

I hear that Vasilchick had been to Pavel Fedorovich to meet him but Pavel Fedorovich would not see him. It is important to see that Vasilchick and his group do not try to persuade

Madame Galina Belicova to enter or to have anything to do with
Pavel Fedorovich's work, I am sure they will try their best.

But you must please meet Madame Galina and tell her that no one and nobody should be allowed to examine Pavel Fedorovich's library EXCEPT YOU. FOR THIS PURPOSE I SUPPOSE YOU WILL NEED A LETTER FROM SVETOSLAV NICHOLAEVICH, AND I THINK YOU SHOULD GET A LETTER FROM PAVEL FEDOROVICH'S WIFE, KIRIL AND THE DAUGHTER SO THAT YOU CAN CONTINUE THE RESEARCH AND WORK OF PAVEL FEDOROVICH IN A FINE MANNER. Of course whatever you take from his library or his ideas you will acknowledge it as is done always in any literary work.

Whatever you need from Svetoslav Nicholaevich in the manner of a Power of Attorney, you will have to please ask him and if I know about it, no matter how busy Svetoslav Nicholaevich may be, I will see to it that he will give you this Authority.

There is a chance that we maybe going to Moscow on the occasion of Yuri Nicholaevich's 80th Birthday Anniversary, in which case of course we shall meet and you can then discuss matters. Before leaving Moscow last year, Pavel Fedorovich introduced Sve toslav Nicholaevich to a lawyer who is a very fine person and who took it upon himself to get the Power of Attorney to conduct the case against Raya Bogdanova. Kiril knows about this because Pavel Fedorovich sent for this lawyer friend and I believe Sve toslav Nicholaevich signed some papers giving him the Authority. There was something more which the lawyer needed and I do not know whether Sve toslav Nicholaevich did what was needed or not. Since it is always in Russian, it is not possible for me to follow what they say, neither do they explain to me what exactly has to be done, but since Pavel Fedorovich was entirely in charge of this matter on Sve toslav Nicholaevich's behalf, I don't press the point and left it entirely to the discretion of Pavel Fedorovich.

No one really knows whether Raya Bogdanova is married now to Vasilchick. I hear that she is married to him and if this is so, then naturally Vasilchick will have access to all Raya's property and affairs. Raya keeps on telling the authorities concerned in the Ministry of Culture that she keeps all these things and that the Oriental Institute should keep all Yuri Nicholaevich's books etc. because Svetoslav Nicholaevich may take them away to India. This is absolutely false and it is, believe me, on the insistence of Svetoslav Nicholaevich and the wish of Svetoslav Nicholaevich that all of Yuri Nicholavich's library was loaned by Svetoslav Nicholaevich to the Oriental Institute. Moscow. This is something Yuri Nicholaevich would have liked because people could avail themselves and study from the wonderful Manuscripts which Yuri Nicholaevich had in his library. Professor Bongard-Levin, who is now a Corresponding Member, Academy of Sciences, was a student of Yuri Nicholaevich's and certainly they would not like any interference in the running of the "Cabinet" of Yuri Nicholaevich. When we went there last year to the Oriental Institute, nothing was arranged properly of Yuri Nicholaevich's library, but we were assured that a room in the new wing of the Oriental Institute would be dedicated to Yuri Nicholaevich and on the door there would be, as there was before, the words printed "Cabinet Of Prof. Yuri Nicholaevich Roerich". Prof. Gafurov as you know has passed away and as far as I know it is Prof. Bongard-Levin who knows all about the "Cabinet". When we visited the new building because I asked to see Yuri Nicholaevich's room, there was nothing arranged and there was no sign of the Tankas or his personal things, or the large photograph of Yuri Nicholaevich, in fact nothing was arranged at all.

Now Prof. Bongard-Levin, who was here in India and with whom Svetoslav spoke about all this, will I am sure arrange the "Cabinet" of Yuri Nicholaevich in a perfect way. It is difficult for him because there was a new Director of the Oriental Institute and of course one has to be careful as to how one approaches such subjects. What matters is that Yuri Nicholaevich's "Cabinet" should be arranged in a proper manner and that all his library should be there. The person who maybe of help in this matter is

who works in Leningrad and who Prof. Bongard-Levin knows, you probably also know her. At the time of Yuri Nicholaevich's death, Rita Vorobyeva-Desyatovskaya and Kira Molchanova made a complete list of the library in his flat of books left. One does not know what has happened to all those books and paintings. I hear that some of Prof. Roerich's paintings have been sold, but I do not know. In any case, Raya Bogdanova has claimed everything that is in Yuri Nicholaevich's flat and I suppose if she has married Vasilchick, then the things belong to him as well.

However, the main thing is that you must please look after Pavel Fedorovich's work and publish his last book and whatever else you find that he wished to publish. I am sure Pavel Fedorovich's wife would be most happy with this idea because after all, his whole life was devoted to doing this work and someone understanding and knowledgeable and who is a friend like you should take up what he left behind. You my dearest Ludmila, have the ability and full understanding about this matter.

To have lost Pavel Fedorovich for us is as if we have lost something very precious and to go to Russia again and not be able to see him will be a very sad experience for us. Pavel Fedorovich was a special friend of mine, he loved me and we were both very close friends. Strange but true, though I don't speak Russian and he dids not speak English or German, we would converse to each other and be understood, and we used to spend some time talking to each other. He understood my bad Russian and I could understand what he said. To think that this man suffered so much and had to go through so much pain and suffering is something really unbelievable. During his illness, I often thought that I would put him on a plane and bring him to India because the climate here and the doctors here are very good indeed. I always told Svetoslav Nicholaevich that if I become ill abroad he must put me on a plane and send me back to India. Our doctors are extremely good and their approach is also much more simple. We do not have to go through so many tests etc. as they do in the West, and I see that so many friends of mine have suffered deeply purely because when they were sick, they had so many tests that they were completely ill. Our doctors, although it is a poor country, have tremendous experience and their diagnosis is really excellent. Of course I mean the good doctors. Here there are also modern doctors who follow all the ideas of the West and one has hospitals with all sorts of gadgets etc. My old doctor at once diagnoses and treats in a very simple manner even rather serious illnesses.

How are you and how are all the aches and pains you were suffering from? I am sure you are not looking after yourself at all. Please try to take care because after all when we are well, it is possible to do those things which are important for our life and happiness.

I send to you my dearest friend, my very, very best wishes for everything that you desire and more. Take every care of yourself because you are precious to us.



I have just received your letter of September 15th which made me very happy. It is a very interesting letter but as you say, Kiril should not disturb the Archives and should leave it as Pavel Fedorovich had arranged it because Pavel Fedorovich knew which was important and in what manner the data could be used.

How strange that Mr. Alexce Annenko did not contact Pavel Fedorovich or his family, and it is possible of course that he found the work too difficult or was not capable of it. Many of the works had a spiritual and philosophical outlook and perhaps this man was afraid even about this. One never knows how these things form in people's minds but the problem is NOW WHAT TO DO?

I can fully understand that it would not be possible as you say, for you to complete the books on the Roerichs because you yourself are writing a book on the Roerichs and it would not be fair to you to complete someone else's book.

Of course Pavel Fedorovich never gave us a list of what he had collected, nor has he ever mentioned what type of books he is doing. Once I think he mentioned that he was writing a book on Prof. Roerich and also on Svetoslav Nicholaevich, but whether it was ready or not or whether it was only in Manuscript form I don't

You are there and you know all the writers and people who are interested and can do this work which I am sure they will like to do if you can help them by discussing the matter with them and with Kiril and Pavel Fedorovich's wife. You have asked us what we think about this problem but it is impossible for us to give you the slightest idea because we really do not know. We do not know anyone except you who could really complete this work. It is very complicated and has to be understood so, I request you to kindly think about this matter and find a really good person.

Sidorov has his own work and I do not really think he is capable. He is a Poet and has his own style though he has written very wonderful articles on both Father and son. The difference between writing an article and editing and finishing a book on the style of Pavel Fedorovich is two different things, it needs application and knowledge of the subject and a great deal of study from the Archives of Pavel Fedorovich.

Of course the whole household must be completely broken up because of this tragedy and so it maybe some time before anyone of them think of completely these publications.

I HAVE NEWS FOR YOU. IT MAYBE POSSIBLE FOR US TOWARDS THE END OF OCTOBER TO VISIT MOSCOW. We have been invited to a very important meeting in Bulgaria commemorating the death of Madame Ludmila Zhivkova since we were also involved in her work for the Project Kulu and her other work with regard to the study of the Roerichs, in particular Prof. Roerich, which she had worked out. It was quite a big scheme and a very interesting one, and she had allotted a very beautiful house in Bulgaria for the scientific research of Prof. Roerich's work and I think most of the paintings that they bought and were presented will also be exhibited there, so it is important that we go to Bulgaria and discuss with the new Minister of Culture all these points and to know what his intention is. I am always happy to go to Sofia because I love that country and its people. They are very Eastern because they have this Turkish blood in them and the girls are very beautiful, so are the men very handsome - not all but this is the general trend. It is amazing also what a tremendous activity there is all around in this tiny country. There are all sorts of conferences and meetings of trade and otherwise which never stop, it is a small country but it is very alive and all of them love Russians because Russia liberated them from the Turks.

From Bulgaria we go to Soviet Union because there is some work there also, so we are phoning the Russian Embassy to find out whether we can go for 10 days. If we do come we would like to stay at SOVIETSKAYA in our old rooms, perhaps you could phone Mr. Kadakin about this matter. Of course I think an invitation would be extended to us because without an invitation it would be very hard to go about and meet people of the right type which Mr. Kadakin arranged so well during our last visit.

From a human point of view of course it would be nice for Svetoslav Nicholaevich to visit his home and his people. He is 78 now and has not been well this year, he had a lot of worries.

Our exhibition of paintings is still running in the USSR with tremendous success but Mr. Popov of the Ministry of Culture does not inform us as to where our paintings are being shown and does not send to us any Press reports but we do hear from people that the exhibition is a tremendous success. I believe it was in Mongolia, and will go to the Caucasus and perhaps right up North. I feel happy but at the same time I wonder what condition our paintings are in. They have been through so many exhibitions in Russia under all climatic conditions, but Svetoslav Nicholaevich says, "My people know how to look after Art." I hope so and I pray so.

It has been a long letter in answer to yours but I request you to kindly think as to who can complete the books. Surely they should not remain unfinished.



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

Dearest Ludmila, I hope we meet and then we can talk about everything.

The heat is terrific in Bangalore and all over India and we just don't know how things will be because people are just dying with the heat which is terrible. Svetoslav Nicholaevich stands it better than I do but for him also it is too much of a strain to go through all this and therefore I shall be glad if we can go to Russia.

We were invited to attend the International Writers' Conference on the 8th of October but due to great pressure of work, it was not possible, also the President of the Academy of Fine Arts invited us towards the end of October which is about the time when Svetoslav Nicholaevich will be free so, when Mr. Yarikov phoned from the Embassy, Svetoslav Nicholaevich told him that it was impossible for him to leave India before the end of October so Mr. Yarikov said that he would contact both the above people and arrange it at the end of October which he also thought was better. I mention this to tell you that we hope we shall have the joy of seeing you.

We understand that AURORA will be printing a fairly large Monograph on Svetoslav Nicholaevich and I hope that they have contacted you in this respect because you are fully aware of Svetoslav's Art and it would be a very fine thing if you were in some way associated with this work. In my last letter I told you that AURORA is printing a Monograph on Svetoslav Nicholaevich's Art and Olga Vladimirovna has written the Foreword. It would have been very nice if you could have seen it and perhaps given some suggestions to her. I do hope you can do that because it is a important publication which would be of interest throughout the world.

What are you doing? What about your book and your work? I think it is a case of out of sight out of mind because you have not written after we returned from Moscow after Svetoslav Nicholaevich's 80th birthday. What a birthday it was in Russia where thousands of people wished Svetoslav Nicholaevich for his birthday, even clapping on the streets!

Tomorrow the 31st is the death anniversary of Indira Gandhi. Even now I cannot imagine that she could have been assassinated in the way she was. Of course she felt that something would happen to her because she was receiving all the time threatening

letters and she just did not take notice of them so tomorrow is a very solemn day. It is a miracle that Rajiv her son is doing so brilliantly and is actually quite fresh and new in his ideas and is liked very much even by the Opposition Parties. He has however many tasks to complete - he has somehow managed the Punjab but still the terrorists are murdering people every other day and we are told that even Pakistan has Schools to train the terrorists, who are mostly the Sikhs, to attack and disrupt the Punjab and India. Rajiv of course is taking every precaution but it is sad to think that this stupid man in London who calls himself the President of the Khalistan Movemnet is still allowed to stay in London. Khalistan is not possible in Punjab but large sums of money is sent to these terrorists through Pakistan and at one time it was very bad, but since the Punjab Accord with the government and the installation of a Sikh Minister who has his own Cabinet, as determined to bring the Sikhs and the Hindus together and rebuild, India of course with the help of the Centre: How Rajiv managed this I don't know but during the recent elections the Sikhs won and the Congress-I lost. All these things are playing on our minds but still all of us have to do our duty and work hard which we are doing.

We have had very bad crops here since the last 3 years because of the drought situation in Karnataka. Practically all the villages have no water and the people and cattle are dying for want of water, food, and rain. It just rains a little and then stops which is awful - even our garden suffers. It is very sad to be in this situation because everything is very expensive and even not available. Of course where you are you don't have these problems but with it all it

is lovely to be in India. There is something so nice about the comfort of India, the beauty of India, and all its varied and interesting historic races. It will take a life-time to really see India and though I travelled all over India before, we do not go out so much because we have a lot to do here in Bangalore.

I very much look forward to seeing you and hope that the Academy can arrange it in the Spring 1986.

As the year is ending I send to you dear good friend our loving thoughts for a very Happy New Year and I hope we meet definitely in 1986.

I don't know why you don't write to us? Is it because you are too busy or because you have forgotten us?

India is not going through a very happy period at the moment and our Prime Minister is trying his best to stabilize the country. It is such a huge country with so many vast problems in various States and he is trying his best to overcome them and to unify India. The floods case are briaring out. we have no idea about the

have been terrible in Bengal especially and it is terrible to think of so many thousands of people homeless. It is also a great strain on the economy of the country to arrange for food for everyone. The prices are quite high now and living is not that easy for the people in general, everything is very expensive. Thank you so much for your greeting on the occasion of Woman's Day which made me very happy. I wish you also everything best on this day. Frankly I think women are much better than men on the whole.


