I am trying to keep it till Xmas Day, and hope to start off with a most pleasant bath that evening. It really is sweet of you to remember my taste in this way!

I was very glad to have your letter, and to hear how much you are enjoying your own home. It does make a great difference to have ones own goods and chattels surrounding one.

It rather looks as though the arrangement about this house will go through. Although we shall all be very sorry to leave the old place it will be a relief not to be tied to ones property too much. BUT when everything will be finished I do not know.

We are having a lovely time up here so far as the weather is concerned. The other day some friends and we three drove across to Lat Pancho. It was a long drive, but when the top of the hill was reached we all stood lost in amazement. The Kinchanjunga group looked as though we could reach out and

touch it, and to the South the Plains were laid out like a map for miles and miles. Lat Pancho is one of the cinchona plantations, and the point from which we saw the view was about a couple of miles higher up. The road leaves the Teesta Valley road just near Kali Jhora.

We are all very fit and well up here, and are enjoying the approaching cold weather. I like it so much better than the heat, - even of Kalimpong!

Aunty Mary Scott is coming to stay with us for a time. Darjeeling is proving too high for her, and she was rather glad to be coming across to K-pong again. SO there will be no lack of conversation for the next week or two!
