We were glad to learn about the happy reunion of your family. Nowadays we can especially appreciate it.

Yesterday we received a telegram from D., it seems he will not stay so long in Bombay, as he asks not to write him, but to telegraph in case we need something from Bombay.

Really things are moving so rapidly, that

one may expect many new developments in the spring. But as before I am fully confident in our victory, in the defeat of Hitler. As my intuition tells me that Japs will not succeed in subjugating India. - Thus I do not worry too much. A great lesson will be learned from this terrible slaughter of human beings. Let us hope that new causes for war will be eliminated in future at their very beginning, and a real Brotherhood of nations instead of a farcical League of Nations will ~~be~~ be founded.

Thank you so much for having sent to me the black stuff. ~~It~~ you have been so generous, that it will last to the end of my life.

I am sending you some apples, but unfortunately they are not of the best kind, as the latter cannot travel. Many kisses to you and Leo - I often think of you both. My family sends you the best wishes -

Dearst Asghari, I was happy to get your letter with all the news about your family and yourself. It will give me a real pleasure to have new photos from all of you. Who knows where and when we shall meet again! For the present we have no intention to return to Baggar with its beautiful but also tragic Reminiscences.

We are still staying at Rhandala, a hill-station near Narm-Poy. It seems incredible but the summer season here has been much cooler than at Baggar. The nature is lovely and the ^{of} green hills are nice for a change.

Probably you know that I have been very ill and for a period. Sretaslaw found the small house at Rhandala in which we stay now and brought a doctor and a skilled nurse from Bombay. Mrs. Byatt, the nurse helped me to recover - I feel much stronger now and we are planning to move soon from here towards the Himalayas, but have not yet decided whether it will be Deogiling or Kalimpong - As I have to avoid the heat of the plains we shall not stop on our way down in Delhi or Calcutta.

The revolutions are a real curse especially where the consciousness of the masses is still in its primitive stage.

Let us hope that the situation is well at hand and the worst has been already lived through. -

Here at Rhandala among its rural population, we have muslims and Hindus and they seem to be friendly and sympathetic to each other. There, where are no investigators people live peacefully. But the great problem is how to avoid these "bicycles", who may be met in the most unsuspected positions and places.

But I am confident that ^{the} Great Hierarchy of Light ^{will} help our beloved India, especially now when she has adopted, signed, the Banner of Peace - the sign of the great Protection!

George stays with me and is very anxious to resume his interrupted scientific work. His big work on Buddhism is being printed by the Asiatic Society in Calcutta -

As to the girls they both are well. You would not recognise our Rayer - she is blossoming like a rose! She has gained weight and with her permanent wavy hair she looks surprisingly nice.

Ludmila is the same, ^{not taking care of herself but of every one else} she enjoys her small electric stove and cooks all kind of dainties for all of us.

Svetik and Devika visit us from time to time and are always very busy with their art-activities.
