But I was filled with said longing, too, for the narrow mountains and all that they begin to mean to me. Yet I believe we must learn to live serenely in any place that it falls to our lot to be in. Sometimes in a town the world begins to seem terribly small!

we have had an amusing - if not very

Now, I think, in the Spring she & I will visit Naggar - and when she will be able to talk a little to her god mother and to feel the mountain. She has a passion for flowers and very gay colours.

Otherwise she loves best of all to play with match boxes and cigarette tins, so she is not yet a very elevated character. But there are times when she simply quivers with delight and sweetness which makes me feel there ought to be a baby in every household!

The writer is pleasant in Lahore - but it is so flat ^{watering} ~~at~~ ^{well} as though it does not get one anywhere & one feels helpless & lost like an ant!
