Everything which has accumulated unworthy in my heart has burned away without any traces with leaving only additional strength in me and never will I follow the footsteps of the past, this is an oath that I am giving to the Blessed and to you.

As to the new responsibility entrusted to me I feel grateful from all my heart and shall carry it out to the fullest measure of my capacities and devotion. While you were discussing to entrust me with the Halls I was giving there constant thought, as to - whom to attract, whom to approach, how to go about it. I had conferences with our manager in regard to the practical part in comparison with other halls etc. Everybody thought it was too early but nothing could stop me from doing some work already and cristalizing my thoughts. 30 As when the indication came I was so grateful and touched. I feel competent to do it.



because I have the conviction of the whole spirit of its importance. To have the firm belief oneself helps so much to gain peoples confidence, besides I have in my heart friendliness towards people and this helps so much to establish the contacts with other human souls. As to the practical side of it I fully realize it. Therefore I resume the responsibility with all the joy of my spirit and shall work very hard.

My own, beloved D. I, I know how interested you are in everything progressive this is why I want to tell you about my teaching, a vocation which I regard as a sacred task! A new world of creative power was opened these years before me. Oh, I know how I was helped, I am conscious of 'the gift which was bestowed' upon me, and in <sup>no</sup> way I ascribe it to my capacities. The task to me is so manifold and the results of it are so benedict. Before I go on I want to confess to you that with a few lazy students I was vitally which really was due to sometimes a general unhappy condition. I am over it now and can speak of it as of the past.

The task in teaching is to me to teach the pupils how to live how to think to mold the character and to enrich their spiritual <sup>through art</sup> life. This is a part of my work that I considered very sacred, and which I am happy to say I have accomplished. I love

joy not only from the artistic point of view but  
as to their comrade and spiritual mother because  
of the higher principles of life that I wanted them  
so much to realize in everyday life.

My most beloved Mother!

Many an eager passenger passed by and stopped wondering whether it was a man's couple or a ladies' couple. One typical angry English lady stopped and asked a railway man in highbrow language what it meant a Raja and a lady in one couple. He dumb

camels with little bells around  
the neck with loads of skins  
I thought of our expedition. They  
looked so picturesque.

The country is beautiful. Some-  
times we passed thru a whole  
alley of blossoming trees and  
how I enjoyed seeing these beauties.

The Minister was very friendly  
I saw him just for a few minutes

While passing thru Mandi and Kangra I wrote to you in spirit letter after letter. When the song of love and gratitude fills ones heart how much more beautiful every thing looks and so my thoughts were flowing and flowing to you my Mother. How happy I am that I can so vividly not only feel you but see you. With each beautiful blossom you stood before me and your eyes do not leave me. Marik Marik beloved, how happy you have made me thru your whole being! We started out in the dark from Mandi. The State sent for me their car at 5 o'clock at -



ready to take me to the bridge.  
These coolies were waiting to  
take the luggage across the  
bridge and up the hill to the  
climber's car. It was a stormy  
sky, so beautiful when we started  
out. At the moment when the thought  
of how useful torches are flashed  
through my mind, my torch went  
out for good. Our meetha Bhaji  
Shibaji Bahadar fixed the lamp beau-  
tifully but did not change the bat-  
tery, so the Raj rupi of Riga is  
responsible for my dressing at  
moonlight. I just felt like mataka.  
Lying a bulb and I found one  
in the beavers' torch which was  
not charged with batteries and my  
torch was of great use to us  
while carrying over the luggage.



from car to car. The journey was beautiful, the country is like a dreamland, an other kind of cymbol adorns the slopes. The flower looks like a large lily, a fiery blossom on silver green velvety branches. The first tree we saw took away my breath and how I longed for, beloved Mother to see it. 9

exhaling but not inhaling. In  
what paradise we live at home  
in Naggar. How luminous is for  
me each minute I spent with you.

Forgive this scribbling. The train  
is so shaky. We are leaving Agra  
and I want to post it there.

We will discuss with you our going back after the monsoon.



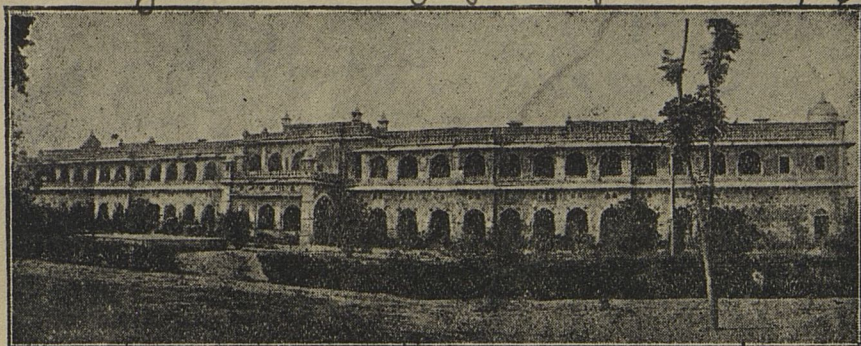
We like so much to know how you

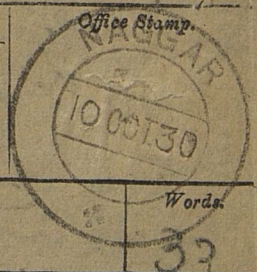

My precious, most cherished Massik!

It was so strange to greet the New-Year in these new surroundings. I recollected every moment and detail of the years I have met with you and your divine image filled me with joy and nostalgia..... and I especially remember the two men who wanted not a bakshish but wanted only "to take a look at Mam Sahib..." I feel the same way my cherished Massik.

Your beautiful letter with the letter to Cath. came just to start us off on the beginning year. The very same evening the letters & translations are translated. I had at once called up Cath. to share with her the great news of the message to her from you. I expect her to come today to call for the letter and I will transmit it to her with all the warmth and love in my heart for you & her. As these lines are for you and beloved Father I like to give you a few of my viewpoints. Cath. needs much help & support and your letter, precious Massik came so timely for, it contains an answer to everything; your great heart always knows just exactly which strings to touch. Cath.'s test is now over. - being very goodhearted and very fond of him she does a lot for him and he takes great advantage, being of a strong & persistent nature and having the possibility to be in their home from morning till night and accompanying Cath. to theater & everywhere she goes (her husband approves of this friendship.) When I arrived to N.Y. I found her employed for \$100. - a month. now she will contribute to the campaign \$200. - for his salary plus salary for a secretary



Time will show how good he will be for spreading the post-cards; he must be given a chance. As to becoming a representative of the Institutions, we ought to think it over carefully for people may easily judge him d'apparence and that part does not inspire confidence. We are very tactful & very careful with him, being tolerant and friendly & not hurting Cath. feelings, whom we all love dearly. If she would only see him as he is. We encourage him greatly to approach cathol. organizations. He might be useful in this because of his ancestry if he applies fireaxe in his approach.

Cath. bought one sketch for \$400 & gave another payment for \$50.- for another sketch - she would like so much to have two sketches: one of Terra Slav. (like the one I brought here) and a similar one sketch of Madonna Laboris, which she likes so much. The sketch of Ter. Slav. is marked on the list \$100.- I promised her to inquire whether such variants would be possible and would appreciate advice on this matter. - Cath. also mentioned that she might pay the Expenses's salary. She is also willing to help out with the deposit of the needed sum for taxes. She asked very much all these matters to remain of a private nature only for you to know, blessed Massix & Father. I shall be so happy to read to her the new Teachings - each time I am with her. We exult in spirit - in the love to the d. & you.

As to poor Bratix - S-Lux. told me the whole story and I suggested to him that we must be loyal first of all to the highest and most dear to us, then comes the rest. Hence we have no right to hide anything from those who are everything to us. Poor Bratix knew everything a year ago when he was so very perturbed, while we were in Lathoul. & you saw him kneeling at the Chair. It is of course



a great blow to him, but it is always better to face the truth & life bravely. I am & was very sorry when I heard about the whole occurrence.

You remember the two accounts of the Bank which failed while I was yet with you last winter - I have received about 45% & the other account also, making a sum of \$2140 (about) for the other account. I suggested to Maurice to take out half in gold and half in notes - one never can tell now with banks, the feeling is very uncertain at Wall Street. Would it not be advisable to transfer some to the owner rather.

From your last letter I see that at least one of my letters, the one giving you an account of my dealings with Poroditzk, must have been lost - I wrote the letter on the 15<sup>th</sup> de France before she left Havre and left letter and 15 frs for stamps (they had no stamps on the ship before sailing on 24<sup>th</sup>) with one of the men who sent off the telegrams, but apparently the scoundrel cashed in the money and did not attend to the letter. I was so anxious the news of his willingness to cooperate should reach you as soon as possible. He has yet Ag. Yo. When his stock will diminish he will take more. I sent him 25 50 books of "Illumination". I was told we have no more the book "Call" to send to him. The price of Illumination to be 20 frs (about 80 cents) and he receives 33%.

The manuscript "Infinity" left with instructions you gave us to send the proofs to you for reading.

So many souls are eager to hear about the d. & Teachings - it is a divine joy to share one's innermost happiness in the Teachings with the knocking ones.



Your *tehelvetchek* lives & thrives only on these joys of spirit and the heart filled with love to the Lord and You, my cherished *Masik* & Father. The joy of spirit outweighs everything else on the path. I had a hard time to acclimatize myself. - I found it so hot & stuffy in N.Y. The ugly much uglier than before and the unreal still more ungenine than before. A real "re-evaluation of values" has taken place within me. After having faced the Sun of Jesus having lived so long with You, Beloved Mother, so close to the Source of light so many things have changed for me - all else is so relative and ~~then~~ is the only real and great - the love to the d. & You & The Holy of Holies!

Switzerland greeted me with the news of Mr. Jaguet's death which occurred on the day I left Naggar. The gray rainy day & sky of Switzerland tried to evoke sad memories - but on the path one should not look back and so I transmitted these feelings alright without showing any sadness to any one. I am so glad his poor body released his soul.

Our dear inner circle - the main thing that everyone should see to the change for the better in himself. I often have to repeat it and wish to apply it to myself first of all. They all try to cooperate. I found Maurice very cooperative and willing to do everything. Beloved, very own and cherished *Masik* & Father, Your *tehelvetchek* friends. very little if one wants to attempt to offend - I have a perfect immunity & peace in my heart and it is such a sure weapon and an example at the same time. There is so much to accomplish! I am putting all the enthusiasm of my spirit to draw new friends to the work. Your love gives me the strength to do it. Women's unity develops fine! With all my love & devotion to You, your very own Father

My spirit wept when the last minutes came with the paragraph of Frances's complaint about your letter of the 20<sup>th</sup> of April, having been read on June 8<sup>th</sup>. This misrepresentation on Frances's part was certainly not inspired, neither by the love to Hierarchy, nor by justice & truth. For the letters are not only translated the very same day but they are translated the very hour they come & not only orally translated but in a written form with a copy for every member. Frances should know best that they have been all done the very hour they come because I do them mostly with her & meet with plenty of excuses & nastiness, as usually when she is asked for cooperation - one has to beg her or convince her, but she will always bargain when asked, either allotting 1/2 hour to the work or shift it off for 1/2 an hour. I know & feel too well the significance of your fiery letters, beloved Massik & Father, as to be eager to be an instrument that all the others should have the privilege of having the letters as soon as possible. Therefore I hope, for Frances's sake that she told the truth - that the letter of Apr. 20<sup>th</sup> was read to Nettie & done the very day (this letter being the only one which was orally translated) & excerpts read to her about the possible publishing of "Hierarchy" & the "Heart" before Infinity. I also hope that she did not conceal that I have made my secretary copy for her Hierarchy & Infinity so that she might advance on this work, making her convenient and a ready copy without having to typewrite



herself, because else it would have been an endless affair. The implication as if letters are not translated is horrible to me because it aims to give a blow at the most sacred & precious to us all. And as I am fully aware with heart & soul of the great significance of each of your words, I took the responsibility of translating your letters. The letter of Apr. 20<sup>th</sup> arrived at one of our very difficult periods with a formula of Rickaby of \$65,000.- but for..... I spent days & weeks with Louis at the lawyers offices & I felt more than ever that my presence was imperatively needed there to shield the works & fight the constantly overhanging compromises. My friends - Massik - Your great all embracing heart will understand when I will tell you that all other joys have departed from me, I know but one consuming joy - that of the battle. To this battle I am dedicating my entire heart & being. Should this battle last 3 more days or 3 more years or any amount of years I pray the Lord to keep me only for the battle until the danger is still on! I wish to help to win. This is my entire striving - let everybody else enjoy the outcomes of the victory. Every action of mine is imbued with this spirit. I am happy any where, where I can do anything for the works & their shielding now. When all the co-workers go out of town for week-ends I deem it a privilege to stay in the building - it is inconceivable for me to stay away outside of these interests.



and I am happiest in these functions. I feel the entire seriousness of the time & great responsibility, like in the other cause célèbre, but here it is so grave because one never knows what somebody else will say or do when one is not around. "Solemnity" beamed Marx, as you say, is so very close to my heart and I always feel lately like in presence of events when one should not speak loud even - the space itself feels <sup>as if</sup> grave, filled with importance.

My Herzens - Marx with such feelings in my heart and so many other feelings indescribable & in a letter, I do not mind having a petty & ugly attitude against myself - I am immune completely where a personal offense comes in, & have no grudge against Frances or anyone else if the blow is not directed against the work. But unfortunately for a petty mind personality & work get confused. Thus Frances preferred to send out & distributed articles of Father which she did not look over with me, neither did she look it over after her secretary has typewritten it - with omissions of words & even paragraphs. She sent out the publicity for the Exposition of Bruges, mentioning 5 small countries, no paper printed it - but she did not show it to me beforehand, I would not be bashful, of course, to ask her to show me anything I know when & what she is doing, but time is so pressing & so many



imperative things are to be done for me, that I cannot  
 sit the whole day & watch her. All the ill-feelings  
 are aroused by some of my successful approaches  
 to people - a friendly visit of Dr. Magoffin to me  
 (he is so needed now on the Bondholders' Com.)  
 arouses a sour face for 3 days, and the greatest  
 unhappiness was called forth when I announced  
 that following a visit of Dr. & Mrs. Botha to  
 me for tea, there is a great possibility of having  
 a Museum Branch in South Africa, with some  
 purchases of paintings. This is a fine possibility  
 & I am working on it. All such things  
 arouse great unhappiness & discontent on the  
 part of Dr. But I continue undisturbedly my  
 work & go my way as the heart dictates me best.  
 And not to speak of Louis who is subject to  
 assaults, "Why do not you take me down town  
 instead of her?" etc, etc, etc. I am sorry to speak  
 to you about all this, beloved, precious Massie R.,

 but do not mind to enter an office with beloved  
 father's article 10 times & meeting 10 times obstacles

There never was the question of offences with me - the worst could be said about me by anyone in the immediate surroundings and it may have pained me but not offended, it is not that nor praise that I expected from any of the coworkers. My most Cherished Massik, most Beloved One.

Raphael was right in predicting storms for the months of Febr, and March.... Some weather we had... some wind and some waves. We were due to arrive yesterday morning, March 5th, but today on the 6th we arrive with over 30 hours of delay...

It was rocky alright... with the exception of ONE CALM DAY... the Ocean was furious all the time... I was not seasick but had a terrible headache and DO I WELCOME THE SHORES OF NEW YORK. ....

It has been very cold too. And my little grey suit of the Grande Maison Harichand Taylor of Naggar City... was the garment which I put on in the Mediterranean... wore it in Paris and on the Atlantic... Beloved Massik, it felt like HOME... in that little suit, which comes from HOME... where Beloved Massik sits in Her Terem....

As I told You in my note from Paris I had a touching talk with Baron de Taube. When he saw me he was very moved and began to cry, relating to me the last hours of his beloved son. The boy must have been indeed a very beautiful soul to have departed from this earth as he did. When his father tried to tell him that he will get well, he replied to him - "no, I do not belong anymore to

this world, I saw the Saviour, He is so good! And when he departed there was such joy and happiness reflected in his face, and he asked them not to cry for he sees the Saviour.

A few days before the boy got sick, Baron de T. was in Munster and saw suddenly a vision of his wife, who told him "Sacha has again 39,5 fever".- Baron awoke puzzled and worried because the face of his wife in the vision was so painfully worried... But he did not hear anything about any illness before and so he tried to find out by calling them up in Paris. When he spoke to his wife, she addressed him with the VERY WORDS HE HEARD IN HIS VISION... He left immediately for Paris But the doctors did not know at once what the matter was with the boy, not even when the legs of the boy did not function anymore. Two days before his death, they made the exact diagnosis, but the paralysis was already spreading further, to the arms and lungs. I had a hearty talk with Baron de T. who, after such grief is so open to the concept of the immortal...and the life of the spirit. Beloved Massik, I felt so sad for him - he has placed all the hopes of his life in this boy and it was a terrible blow for him and his wife. I must say, he takes this blow in a wonderful spirit.

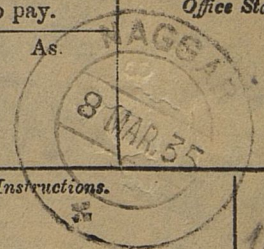

New York, March 9th, 1935.

My most Beloved Precious Massik,

You can well imagine my feelings when on the 6th in the morning we were told on the Boat that we may not land in New York until the 7th in the morning because the dense fog prevented the boat from landing.... this on the eve of March 8th, was certainly a cause of worry for me.... But we did land on the 6th in the evening and on the 7th I had just the time to repack my valise and leave for the appointment we had.

Beloved Logv. gave some of the details which I shall not repeat.

Hence I shall give to my Precious Massik the essentials. The greeting of our host was more than cordial - he greeted Logv. like a friend, with all the warmth and addressing me he said "it is good to see you".-- I started with the bringing him greetings from You, telling him from the depth of my heart of the Radiant and Great Soul, of the Great Personality of our Beloved One and of Her closeness to the Source of Light. He did it verily, flamingly, and as soon as I entered St.'s room, I felt the warmth and cordiality towards Logv. and his eagerness to hear and know more about Beloved Mo. and Her Great Divine Image. Glory to the L. and You Beloved One for this beautiful Bridge. Beloved Poroomotchka is aflame in heart in the carrying out of this great Mission and we unite flamingly in our divine Love for our Precious Mother.

My most Beloved Precious Massik,

You can well imagine my feelings when on the 6th in the morning we were told on the Boat that we may not land in New-York until the 7th in the morning because the dense fog prevented the boat from landing...this on the eve of March 8th, was certainly a cause of worry for me...But we did land on the 6th in the evening and on the 7th I had just the time to repack my valise and leave for the appointment we had.

Beloved Logv.gave some of the details which I shall not repeat. Hence I shall give to my Precious Massik the essentials. The greeting of our host was more than cordial - he greeted Logv.like a friend, with all the warmth and addressing me he said twice "it is good to see you".-- I started with the bringing him greetings from You,telling him from the depth of my heart of the Radiant and Great Soul,of the Great Personality of our Beloved One and of Her closeness to the Source of Light. He listened warmly and nodded with understanding and interest,which came from his heart.--- He read Your letter with the deepest attention and slowly and find "hopefulness" in every point You have taken up,except on the matter of Flav.place. He accepted fully the Indic.on this matter too and we had an interesting conversation on the problems,greed and policies of those,who are involved in this created situation as well as their neighbours. He took everything with deepest consideration and openness,along the lines of Your letter. We spoke about the dangers of godlessness and those who spread it...and he fully agreed with our points on this matter,taking the Indic.in Your letter.

During the conversation with me he turned many times to Belov.Logv.addressing to him his points of view on the problems he has discussed with him during his previous visits,which so clearly indicated that he has studied Bel.Mother's letters and remembered well what Logv.spoke to him about at those various visits. This gave me such joy,for it all proved his deepest interest and the spirit in which he took these glorious letters.

I spoke to him about the scholarship and the importance of those(for those) whom he represents. He responded beautifully to this idea and its importance for the future developments. He was greatly interested in this and in what I have told him about Mary's and Johnson's achievements along those lines in their work with cultural representatives of California. He inquired where exactly Johnson is now,after he heard that he is there working on these wonderful projects, having been invited to advise on these matters. He was immensely interested to hear of Mary having played such an important part in California and the neighbouring places. I brought up the question of the necessity of his approval for the scholarship fund,telling him that Bel.Logv.and Walter are working now on this and that Walter may approach him for the approval. His attitude was friendly on the subject and when his secretary came in at that moment to indicate that the interview was over, our host told him most firmly - "just a minute" and the secretary retired... Upon my telling him that we have so many things yet to discuss with him, he at once asked when we can come again and he himself has set the date of March 14th at 2 o'clock writing the date on a piece of paper for us to give to his lady secr. This was of great joy to us,for it was a proof of how interested he was in speaking to us further on the subject of Your glorious letters,Beloved,Precious Massik. Even Walt.,according to Fr. words has a hard time to get to Mur.--- The appointment was at once confirmed by his secr.without the need of his second man secret....

During our interview,Mur.touched on Beloved Mo's beautiful expose in Her letter about Philadelphia and turning to Logv.and myself he looked most penetratingly at us and said twice most powerfully: "We must work together". Thus



indicating that he would like Logv. and myself to help him bring about the beautiful ideal contained in our Precious Mo's letter.

Your gifts enchanted him and it was a joy to see his enthusiasm and gratitude to You for these beautiful tokens. He looked with such affection and admiration at the woodcarved figure, finding it most beautiful and he was most eager to know the symbology of the magnificent tanka of which he was informed from the depth of the heart. Glory to the L. and You, Beloved One for this beautiful Bridge. Beloved Poroomotchka is aflame in heart in the carrying out of this great Mission and we unite flamingly in our divine Love for our Precious Mother.

Our interview with Walt. gave us also great joy. The L. gave to him this contact just at the right moment, for he found it most difficult to deal with Mod. for many reasons. He is elated to have this direct contact with us three in the Name of our Ta., whose letter he read and re-read in our presence. I had the greatest privilege, given to me by the L. to tell him of Ta's closeness to the L. throughout millenniums, to speak of Her Divine Image to him, Her united consciousness with the L., Her being the Feminine Aspect of the L. was truly a Sacred Duty to me and a Sacred Joy. He seemed also greatly encouraged that in the place where he has applied for a fund for scholarships and where the people were interested in it, Logv. had a very good friend amidst the authorities of this firm. We stressed that he shall do his utmost to carry out the Will of L. in this direction. He was very responsive.

Walt. begged very much that in order that we shall be able to see him and he shall have the full benefit to carry out Beloved Ta's bidding to work with Her closest ones, that Mod. should not know anything about it. He said that he will see her as before and he will deal with her on all the exp. matters and write to her so that she shall not feel any change of attitude, but he cherishes so deeply

He fully understood the importance of this work for his future and is willing to apply all his efforts for this and work together with Logv. and us. This is why we found it advisable not to come as yet together with him in any official capacity openly, for it would only create complications. When we will pave the way a little more with the Comm. and Mod. consciousness will be a little more affirmed in this direction, then only will it be possible to have the FIRST OPEN MEETING WITH HIM. But if we do it before, only obstacles will arise. I hope my Precious Massik agrees with this. Walt. is a changed person and Our Inspiratrice would have the greatest joy to see this great change in him. My Precious Beloved Massik,

My heart is filled with joy and gratitude to You for Your precious letters to me. I have received them regularly, but one condition has greatly perturbed me - namely the inner envelop which contains Your personal letter to me arrives each time in a strange condition, with obvious signs of the seals having been changed. The strange thing is that the OUTER ENVELOP is in perfect condition, and the seal which Var. affixes looks perfect in every way with the clip under the seal, it is ONLY THE INNER SEALS that are in a bad condition. I am enclosing herewith two envelopes for You to judge, Beloved Mother. Perhaps the seals were affixed this way, then a worry will be off my shoulders.

My Precious One, here I am again in full swing of work and activity. The members of the circle have met me cordially and thus far we had no outbursts on me, and I had none on them. I made it clear from the moment I stepped off the boat that I did not come neither to interfere into anyone's business nor to fight with anyone, but I came with a definite mission to help Logv. and Por. This has greatly helped me preserve my freedom of going and coming to and from the visits without having to account to anyone where I was etc...

As You know the boat arrived 36 hours late... and I was terribly impatient to finally reach N.Y. Logv. came out on the cutter at 7 o'clock

in the evening and my heart just sank when I saw how drawn pale and thin

he looks. All the hardships and sufferings of these trying years reflect

on him physically, but his courage and valiance are incomparable. He is

the whole day on the go... active from early in the morning till late at

night doing the most unpleasant, the most difficult and disagreeable jobs,

straightening out everything and taking care of everything. The financial

situation is very serious and all the creditors are pressing and much work

will have to be done now for the further straightening out of all the diffi-



cult problems of the Building in order to strengthen the victories which were won and which with the L.'s Help will relieve the works from the burdens

But of course we have to do a lot of thinking and planning that this relief should come, for all people care about is to get their money back and they do not care how much they may injure an endeavour thru their ruthless actions I am grateful to the L. and You, Precious Massik, for being able to be of help to Logv. - he needs it and deserves it. When I look at Logv. I understand the Care the L. expressed about his heart. Your glorious heart of Ta. has also felt when I was with You, how much care must be shown and given to Logv. Your heart never errs, my Beloved Own One.

March 19th.

We have already seen a number of important people. We saw Logv. friend a Banker about the scol. The interest of this banker has given impe-

tus to Walt. to push stronger along the same direction. And I feel confident that something good will come out of it.---- We have seen the Head of the Tax Depart. and we have accomplished that which the lawyers could not do for six months - namely a hearing for our case which will come up soon. He was very friendly to us and we had a good conversation with him. He assured us that he will assist us at the hearing which will take place in a few days, Kramer and his partner could not get over the fact how easily and quickly we secured an appointment and the hearing itself. The tax exemption is the most important thing for the Institutions at the present.

March 20th.

We missed the boat last week, therefore both reports on the two visits to St. will reach You together, Precious Massik. These days have been more than hectic. Your Precious letters gave us a divine joy, Beloved One. We have endless talks about You together with Logv. and Por. It is the joy of our life to unite in Your Name. Poroomotchka's work with the Living Ethics would give You great joy, if You would see how much devotion, warmth and enthusiasm Beloved Poroomotchka gives to this work, this work is the most important for her and to link it with Your Name is her life's aim. Of course



the fieriness with which she is leading her groups kindles the hearts of the members and many feel transformed since they came closer to the Teachings thru Poroomotchka and since they have come closer to Your Great Heart.

I had a talk with Am. and she read what she was supposed to read. I am keeping it as Indic. She had nothing to say in her defence, as she admitted having been a "traitor" and "Judas" on both sides - going against Por.

and Log. and going against Lu. She admits that the word "low" is not the definition for what she has done and has pledged to keep confidential what was told to her by Mary. She admits having written letters which gave all the ground to her friend to be upset and come to the most absurd conclusions, but she claims that she has never said that Logv. and Por. have insisted that she give the donations anonymous in order that her young friend should not know about it, she claims having written that it was HER REQUEST THAT HER NAME SHOULD NOT BE MENTIONED. She also claims that her friend has made her promise that she will not give a penny to the work here but that whatever she wishes to give she shall send to Mary. She will probably write this to You herself. She realizes the terrible harm she has done and confesses the meanness of it. She also stated that her friend had written to her that Mary told him she knows nothing of any gifts nor loans Am. has made to the Institutions. She does confess having set on two chairs all these years and she realizes what the consequences are from such actions. She also stated that "if there is a person who has ever saved my life and that of my friend it is Logv. and this is how I have repaid him and Nettie"... As the things stand she does not offer any excuses, because she realizes how doublefacedly she has acted. I have had a few good talks with her, on this subject and she confessed how disloyal she has been on both fronts. She will write to You Beloved One.

March 22d.

It was a great joy to hear the other night from Walt. that the Ch. suggested to have the signing in his office on April. This is a wonderful



outcome of our interview with St. when we discussed with him this occasion and how significant it is that he shall take the initiative in his hands. I know how happy Beloved Massik was at the cable which we have at once sent to Her. It is a wonderful example for Walt. to see how everything has become easy and successful, and he realizes it. All this is due to the great Heart of Our Ta. and the L.-- Thus far only we know it, as they wish first to arrange all the details and then let the others know, Mod. and the others. Walt. wrote to her that h/e will have some good news for her in a few days. And he asked us to keep it thus far only between us three. We also suggested to Walt. to mention in his speech on April the Perman. Comm. and he was delighted to include it into his speech.

St. goes away tomorrow for a vacation until beginning of April. The L has Given us the reply to his question which is marvelously solving his dilemma. It will be transmitted to him as from the "distant Control".---

I saw Grebentch. and his wife - he certainly looks GLOOMYYYYY... The Harb. Times finished him up.... He started to recall how much he was opposed to the Mahatma Letters at the time they were published.... He also resents the policy of having once adhered even slightly to some movement and then rejecting it... How characteristic it is that he has left out the name of Mme Yarovsky's Book, as You write Beloved One....

Klisovsky's book arrived and I looked EAGERLY FOR THE NAME OF THE ONE WHO HAS INSPIRED THE ENTIRE BOOK BUT ALAS... I DID NOT FIND IT.... Your quotation from his letter DID NOT reconcile me with him, as I find it of paramount importance to give credit to the Inspiratrice.... I was quite sympathetic to him however in his desire to have a Portrait of You, Precious One.... How does the Serov reproduction look fixed up by him?????

Beloved Massik, I do not reply to all of the points in Your beautiful letters as else my letter will be TOO LONG... and I will miss the boat again.... Poor Massik will have to read so much... On Monday Logv. and myself will see Saw. From N.K's letters we see that the activities of the Harb. Times continue... N.K. wrote that he and G. are greatly alarmed at my coming to N.Y.... I hope that this worry has passed by now...

March 16th, 1935.

My very Own, Precious Mother,

We arrived in the morning in St. place <sup>on March 14th</sup> and a few hours before our appointment we received a call from his office to make sure that we were coming and that the appointment takes place. As it appears his office has called New York, the uptown and downtown office, to let us know that the appointment stands as arranged. This was certainly a wonderful gesture and made us feel good.

When we entered his office he at once took up with us the questions on the matters we discussed with him on our previous visit and we started with the scholarships, telling him of the chief concern which is interested in it where Logv. has a friend and to whom Walt. also spoke, to another representative of the same firm. We took up the question of the necessity of the approval of his and he seemed to be in favour of the concern which is interested to make the loan for the scol. fund. (St.'s firm gives no loans to outside places, because a law has been passed not to give any loans by his firm on account of the debts which were not paid.) St. was very frank with us telling us that he wishes to avoid the O.H. on this approval, and that he will write a letter to another institution, under his management, which has the same rights to approve loans and which is more progressive than O.H. In this letter he will state that he is in favour of this plan of loan for scholarships. I told him that Logv. has spoken to his friend in this firm who is interested in this scholarsh. fund, realizing its benevolent significance. We thanked St. warmly for his readiness to approve it.

St. again stressed the point which he brought out during our last ~~visit~~ visit about Philadelphia and that Logv. and myself can assist him in that.

We told him how close to Your heart is the realization of this wonderful plan and that we shall be happy to work with him.

Since the L. has permitted to us to convey to him that some of his questions can be answered, giving him the impression that it will all come



thru the channel of our Beloved Ta. he addressed himself to us saying to ask the "distant control" for a few technical questions on financial situations in various places. St. has likewise appreciated enormously to know that Beloved Logv. is so versed in finance and he saw the possibility of Logv. important advices and has asked him already a few questions pertaining to finance and economics. I have brought up this important point of Logv. being trained also in that field, which St. appreciated immensely, for he does not have anyone who could give him such points of view as Logv.

We also spoke about the date of the signing in April and of how important this event is. He took great interest in this event and in the Pact in general. We also told him about the award and he was greatly interested in our trip there.

He was interested in the world situation and the acute feeling of hostility and war looming in the air. He spoke against the pacifists and parades of preachers. Our visit lasted 25 minutes and NO secret. came in to disturb us. When we left him he asked when we were going for the award and when I will return from there to New York. He asked most cordially to convey his greetings to Beloved Mother.

In the evening we saw Walt. who looked joyous and happy. He had announced to us that he has an appointment with the representative of the firm for the scholarsh. the next day in the morning, the same firm where Logv. has his good friend. We strengthened him to tell this representative that St. will approve the laon, that we know it, for the way is paved for this and we told him thru which channel to get the approval. We had to tell him that we met St. thru his mother and Walt. was elated to hear this. Said he: "In your physical bodies?" Upon our confirmation, he exclaimed "What a joy". This of course has given him tremendous strength and confidence to proceed unabatedly and fearlessly. As the matter stands now with the scholarsh. fund they expect an important member of the firm to return and then there will be a meeting with him Walt. Logv. for the furtherance of the scholarsh. fund.

My most Beloved Precious Massik,

We have just received Your letter of March 13th and the enclosed special letter to Por., Log. and myself was read by us with all the depth of our hearts and all the sacred Love for You, Most Cherished Massik. I can well imagine how impatient Your heart is to see the fulfillment of the scholarship fund to take place in order to alleviate the burden of F. We fully realize how important and indispensable this fund is and our hearts are filled with the desire to see it materialize, but as soon as one touches on money everything takes on a different picture in dealings with people - they wish to know a great deal what their money is to be used for and who will be responsible for the loan and who will guarantee it etc. No doubt Mod. has given You all the details about it since the friend has given her all the points which those who are interested in the scholarship fund wish to know. He has told the same thing to us and he stated that not only the bankers, but also private individuals who are interested wish to know details and they are writing over to F. for same, which is of course a delay, for it takes them time to write it over and to receive a reply. People who have large sums of money are NOT IDEALISTS and they regard everything from the point of view of investment. The Bankers whom Log. approached wish also to have information, without which they will not consider entering into the negotiations.

St. showed great interest by expressing his readiness to approve the loan. When we asked him whether he would prefer this loan to be granted thru any of his agencies, he clearly pointed out that the law which was passed some months ago, because of the non-payment of the debts, forbids am. capital to be loaned anywhere else and that even private loans MUST BE APPROVED and reasons shown why the money is given and what percentage of it will be spent here. St.'s friends are all either politicians or harsh business men and they will all wish to have certain definite informations before they would even consider such a loan for scholarships.



Mrs. Mur. is away on a vacation since the end of March and she will stay away until about the middle of April.

We were greatly interested to hear from Walt. how St. has acted in letting him know of his plan to sign in his Home. Logv. and myself have prepared the ground for it and we have actually arranged it when we saw St. Walt. said that when he, Walt., had asked St. for a "few words" for the day of signing, St. said at once "we shall sign it right here". Walt. knows who has prepared it all and that he did not have to do anything for bringing this victory about. St. will also broadcast over the radio on that day. The letters from the Pan Am. Un. which we have received as invitation to attend the April 15th begin as follows: "I am directed by the Pres. to invite you to attend the signing...."--- The publicity about the signing will be handled by Gab. and it will be done much better and more befitting <sup>than</sup> if done in the old style to which we are accustomed. Especially so since the signing is to take place in the W.H. I know how Your heart rejoices that the Treaty will be signed in that place, my very Own, Beloved Massik.

I have transmitted Your beautiful letter to the Philadelphia Living Ethics group to Poroomotchka, who will send it to them on Your behalf.--- When Amrid. has learned thru Avir. that with the end of receivership we will have to pay for all the guards of the Museum, she has offered that Inge will pay for a man by the week. But since Amr. gave the promise to Lum. that she will not give any funds to the Institutions here, and she was greatly perturbed as to how to extend this assistance, Por. and Logv. did not want to enter with her into any of her schemes and Por. is taking care of the guard from the R. Soc. We do not want Amr. to go back on her promise to Lum. You write Precious Massik that You were worried about my talk with Amr. I can only assure You that we had a very good talk and she realizes the harm she has done and the doublefaced role she has played, this according to her own words.

Maj. Stokes has sent a check of \$200.- for the upkeep of a "couple of

months for Urusvati", this is the result of his promise, given to Log. and myself to help Urusv. monthly. We shall give the check to Rad, for her to send it over to You.--- The Europ. Center worries us greatly - the father of G. is asking about the payment of his back salaries. We also worry greatly about Your constant advancing for the Institutions, Beloved Massik, since the financial situation is very strained on all ends.

We have cabled to Sture about the signing of the Pact at the W.H. and the possibility for them to deposit also their signature s, to which he has replied that they expect "a call from the Pan Am. Un. or President R." We shall see what can be done in this respect, since the world Treaty opens after April 15th. We are following it up.

Catherine told me that Sv. wrote to her that I will give her some package of seeds for her. In the trunk where I had all the things given to me by You, Beloved Massik, Lum and Yar., which Raya packed for me, and which



I did not open en route since it did not contain any of my things needed en route, I did not find the seeds, except the package of seeds for Por. I would like to hear from You as to whether these seeds were sent directly to Catherine perhaps.

I can feel how happy You will be to learn of these good news, as I recall how You shared in our worries about these various obligations, my Beloved One,

..... April 17th.

One of the most glorious days in the history of our Institutions was April 15th, the Day of the Signing of the Roerich Pact at the White House. This Day shall remain forever ingraved in our hearts and memory, for its significance, solemnity and heartiness of the President, who has adorned this occasion by his fullest support, lending all the glory to the event. Three days before the signing there were only 12 or 13 nations to sign, but since President Roosevelt has invited the nations to the signing to be held at the White House, every Ambassador has executed pressure upon his Government that they should hurry to adhere on the 15th of April since the entire occasion is taking place in such unusual setting. Thus far, outside of the Brasil Pact with the USA, which was sigend some time ago at the White Pact, NO OTHER PACTS HAVE BEEN SIGNED AT THE WHITE HOUSE, all the pacts are usually signed at the State Department. The noble gesture of President Roosevelt, in inviting the nations to the White House for this event, has stirred the remaining nations to adhere. It is the first Pact signed in unanimity and this was underlined by every representative of the 21 countries present



at the signing. The feeling of all was one of joy and solemnity.

The fact that Logvan was invited to speak on the same program with the President Roosevelt from the White House is also an unprecedented occasion for NO PRIVATE CITIZENS have ever broadcast from the White House and it was also the President's gesture to invite Logv. to be on the program together with him. It also proves the respect which Logv. has won, for would it have been to the contrary, the President would not have chosen to have Logv. with him on the same program, as it depended entirely on the President's choice. We deeply value this beautiful attitude of the President, who appreciates the merits of his friends.

Another beautiful gesture of the President was to invite Logv. and myself to his Office to see him just before the ceremony and to tell us in the warmest way of how "great" he considers this occasion to be. He shook warmly hands with us and welcomed us in the friendliest way. We thought of You, most Cherished Mother, while in his Office....

Then came the procedure of the ceremony. In a room where all the Ambassadors were gathered, the names of each representatives were called out in alphabetic order, to enter the Cabinet Room where the ceremony took place. After the diplomatic corps, came the diplomatic corps of the Roerich Museum and the President shook hands with all in a cordial way. He greeted Logv. and myself as one greets good friends, saying in front of everybody to us: "Once again"....

All were invited to stand up for pictures around the President and all the photographers were busy working were busy clicking their cameras. Then all were invited to sit down with the President sitting alone at the long table in front of the microphone waiting for the time to begin his speech. A few minutes before the announcer began to speak, giving an excellent expose of the Roerich Pact and description of the surroundings where the signing takes place, there were a few minutes of an unforgettably solemn silence, which was impregnated with unique emanations. I felt so keenly the presence of the Ray and You, Beloved One, and I was almost moved



to tears during these great solemn and irrepeatable moments.

At 12.05 sharp the President began to read his speech over the Radio then the other speakers followed and Logvan finished the program with his speech. Logv. read his speech beautifully. After the President finished his speech, he left the Cabinet Room to retire into his Office while the program continued with the other speakers, Leaving the Room the President bid all to sit down in the most hospitable way and with the warmest smile.

Argentina was the first country to sign, according to alphabetic order. All the other countries signed after the speeches. Mr. Wallace gave the pen with which the Pact was signed by the 21 countries to Logvan to be kept by the Museum as a historic remembrance of this great Day. The Secretary <sup>of</sup> State was also there, and he congratulated Mr. Horch with his "good speech". Some of his assistants were also there.

After the ceremony we spoke to the various Representatives and we left the White House at One o'clock. Our Hearts throbbed with a divine joy and gratitude to the L. and You; most Cherished Mother, for the beautiful share of work which You have entrusted us to perform in this.

Glory to the L.! We bow in awe before His Heart and Might!

April 18th.

Two letters arrived yesterday afternoon from You, Beloved Mother, with minutes No. 98. Your letters are of March 22d and 28to 30th. It is the Help of the L. that the minutes No. 98, contained in Your letter of 22d arrived one week later, for these minutes contained the cable which we have sent You privately about the signing of the Pact at the White House and about Walt. being elated working with us....Words cannot describe what the reaction of Franc. was and I am so happy that these minutes did not arrive just before the signing, for the poisoned atmosphere would have spoiled everything on that Great Day...It was a real tragedy and according to Rad. and Avir. her condition was so abnormal, that the only thing which could alleviate her mind was that Logv. and myself had the contacts with



St., this according to an Indic., and we had to persuade her that this contact had nothing whatsoever to do with her friend. My Precious One, I do not care to give You any details about it more than necessary, details which Logv. gave You already, but our hearts were aching that after such a great Victory, with the signing at the great place, we had to go thru such an ordeal. She cannot reconcile with the thought that anybody else shall have anything to do with her friend, hence it would be best that she shall continue with her friend all the exped. matters, as she did until now and we can see Frederick without anybody knowing about it and without hurting her feelings.

April 19th

You ask me Beloved Mother whether I have conveyed to Lepetit the thought that there is a possibility of closing the Center of his. Such a thought never entered into any of my conversations with him nor the Old Lady The ONLY QUESTION upon which we dwelled was the AMOUNT OF THE SUBSIDY, since the financial crisis has hit us so badly. That is the decision he awaited from New York, and THAT IS ALL we spoke of in regard to the maintenance of the Center. Of course we all realize the harm which the closing of the Center would bring about.

I shall close these lines with again expressing my joy at the glorious ceremony of the Signing of the Pact where the Name of its creator was so glorified. This ceremony had the widest publicity thruout the country and the entire world. All our friends are elated with this great Victory.

We are thinking of our trip to Europe and Logv. is trying to obtain a loan from some people downtown for business purposes of his to be used for this trip. We pray that he may succeed.

With all my deepest Love and Devotion to You, my Precious Massik, You were and are in our hearts during all moments of the day.

My very Own, most Cherished Massik,

This has been a most hectic week of preparation for Logv. and my journey to the Northern parts. Our decision depended upon funds and we did not know until the last moment how the things would turn out. But help came and Logv. business made it possible for us to go. I know Beloved Massik, how happy You will be to hear this. We sailed yesterday at midnight in a great rush. We have the needed letters of recommendation which were Indic. We hope to carry out the L.'s Will as the L. wishes it and we shall put all the best of our hearts and capacities towards it.

Before leaving we received an Indic. that I shall return to N.Y. to continue the work, which we have communicated to You in a cable, as the works need great attention. There is no doubt the financ. situation is dreadful, not only because of pending lawsuits but also because of the deficiency judgment pending against the Mus. for over 2 million dollars. This would gain publicity in the newspapers. Besides this there is the pending deficiency judgment against Log. which will be ruinous. Unless great vigilance will be shown to protect the name and Log. reputation in averting by some measures these most threatening actions all the victories thus far gained will become clouded. Logv. being



tremendously busy the whole day with the work uptown and down town, needs my help. Precious Massik, whatever I depicted to You while being with You about the financial situation, is exceeded by far by reality and actual conditions, which prevail here. You, Beloved Massik have been always deeply concerned about the conditions and Your heart has realized the seriousness of the situation. We keep our courage high and we shall fight for our rights to the very end and we shall win too. But as always we must do the entire work ourselves, for no else will and can do it for us. With all the love for the L. and You we shall protect the works of the L. and victory will be ours. We keep You in our hearts and spirit, most Precious Massik.

April 30th.

Beloved Logv. has described to You St. wish to see us at once upon our return and we were very happy to hear of this. Walt. is in very good spirits and he has expressed again his joy to work with us. Walt. has likewise told us that he has NEVER implied to Franc. that St. would give a loan for Kans. He told us very definitely that St. WOULD NOT GIVE ANY LOAN but he wanted St. to know of the scholarship fund, so that when the time for approval comes, St. should be advised of it. Walt. never spoke to St. about the scholarship fund and we, Logv. and myself got the approval for this from St. We are exceedingly sorry that Franc. gave so many misleading statements about the scholarship matter to N.K. and to You.

I am enclosing herewith a letter from Amr. for You.

My innermost thoughts and all my love are going out to You, my most Precious Massik. We unite in our love to the L. and You.

My very Own, most Cherished Massik,

We have rushed thru Europe in great haste, and are on our way to the Northern Countries. We have not seen Lepetit and he does not know about our visit to Europe. Logv. is trying hard to renew his old connections in business. We are utilizing every minute, travelling at night and working the whole day. We made a fine connection with the American Ambassador here, who was most cordial and friendly to us. We have laid before him the movement of the Pact and have stressed the President's desire to see the Europ. countries adhere to the Pact. The secretary of the Embassy told us that Mr. Tulpinck keeps them informed about the progress of the Pact.

We have also visited the Amer. Embassy in Paris. Beloved Logv. will give You all the detail about this visit, and our visit to the Belgian Embassy (Amer. Embassy at Bruxelles).

We are leaving tomorrow for Antwerp and Amsterdam and we have an appointment with the American Ambassador at the Hague on the 13th. Before leaving New York, Logv. has prepared a little printed pamphlet containing the speeches of the Signing at the White House, ~~which~~ the text of the Treaty and the names of the signatories. This pamphlet is most useful here and makes a deep impression on everybody to whom it is presented. Despite all the hurry before the departure Logv. has taken care of this too.

Your letters to the circle, which are sent to my address in New York, Precious Massik, will be opened by Poroomotchik and translated by Avirach. Your personal letter to me, which You always send in a separate envelop, will be







kept by Poroomotchka or forwarded to me by registered mail.

We are returning to New York beginning of June and will probably be in New York on June 8th.

May 12th

It is with deep anticipation that we are approaching our destination North and we shall apply the best of our hearts on this Mission.

My Beloved , Precious Massik, as I did not know what to write to Father in regard to the recent developments, I have not written anything, since You give all the news to Father.

I feel deeply grieved that You had to send again money to Lepetit, since I know the financial situation.

We are greatly concerned about the Scholarship fund and we hope that means and ways will be found for this.

Europe is cold and GREEDY - one feels very much the devaluation of the dollar....No one knows here what is coming next....

Logv. and myself are looking forward to see St. upon our return. We certainly extol the Focus in speaking to him, bringing out the highest and the greatest.

Avir. has no doubt written to You about the Egyptian Princess' name being Sulamith and her closeness to King Solomon, also that some of the failures at that time were due to the fact that King Solomon could not be united with her.

My Precious Massik our hearts and thoughts are with You and we keep You constantly in spirit.

New York, June 7th, 1935 <sup>76</sup>

Beloved Mother,

We returned from our trip yesterday late afternoon and I have haste to write to You and elucidate some of the matters which seem to have so greatly perturbed You and which have made You lose Your faith in us. In regard to the Indic. which the L. has permitted to be given to St. directly, as it dealt with a technical question of silver, the reply <sup>to</sup> which ~~we~~ <sup>we</sup> received, I wish to state the following - this short Indic. was not sent to You, because the L. SO INDICATED, because of the norma. We thought that You will take for granted that there was some cause of importance which has held us back from quoting it to You. If we would have thought that You will regard it as disrespect for Hierarchy, I assure You that we would have mentioned it to You then. I am very sorry for not having done it then. Since You ask for it I shall quote it to You : "You can transmit to the P. that thus far impoverished Ch. will cling to silver. Therefore barter can be established. And the people of Ch. will not resent the fluctuations of silver, since the fundamental principle will constitute a humane gesture to provide food for the ~~needy~~ people. Thus will A. be the great balance and P. the saviour of needy Ch."----- This was typed on a plain sheet of paper, not on Your paper and bore NO SIGNATURE. It was simply inserted in quotes.

I have just received Your cable : "Indication write me oftener more details required. Mother." ---- Logv. and myself have made up a report of our visit to the Northern Countries and to Europe which we enclose herewith. As we sailed home from London we deemed it advisable to look over the report ~~one~~ once more and mail it from New York.

During our visit to Europe, we hurried from place to place and we have covered in a very short time much, taking in consideration the time spent on the steamer crossing forth and back to New York. Logv. has made very good connections and we have utilised every hour for our mission which we had so at heart to perform with all the ardour of our spirit. Apparently we have



failed in Your eyes, Beloved Mother, as You seem to be very displeased with us, and with me particularly. I feel grieved for this.

In regard to Your mentioning that it was an unsuccessful step, our not telling to Frances about the signing of the Pact being transferred to the White House, we considered that our Hierarchy could be informed of this new development before all the others knew about it, since it was in the beginning a strictly confidential matter, before everything was finally arranged. A few days later Mod. and all the other Trustees knew about it and Frances sent You a second cable about this development. We could not imagine that the harm would be so great by Frances having the news a little later than You had them, since we know how things can be spoiled if divulged prematurely. Beside we did not have the right to divulge these news to everybody before the final conclusion.

We have sent You a cable about the fine connections made at O. acquainted We have/the members whom we saw there with all the data and we fully realize how important it was to see all these people personally. The secretary is not a friend of F. one could feel that. We are so happy that we made contact with the important members and that we can correspond with them now too.

Poroomothcka has prepared Walter upon receipt of Your cable about Murray and the scholarship fund and Logv. and myself may go tomorrow to see Walt and see that some actions should be undertaken. The enclosures which You have sent to be transmitted to St. will be transmitted to him within a fortnight or so, since St. goes away today for a few days. Logv. has called up already for an appointment and the secretary stated that only after next week will he be able to give the date as he does not as yet know the date when St. will return.

In regard to Your question as to what exactly has taken place on April 15th with St., I have nothing else to add to what I said in my letter No. 12. He shook hands with us warmly and said what a great occasion it was we handed him the envelop containing the reply to his question, which I quote above and he left immediately for the Room where all the Representatives waited for him to sign the Treaty. You can be certain that if there would have taken place some conversation WE WOULD HAVE WRITTEN TO YOU the contents.

I feel heartbroken, Beloved Mother, that at a time when we need all the joy of spirit for construction and all the enthusiasm, there are currents which make You and us unhappy.

Upon receipt of Mme de Roerich's cable instructing us to transmit to Fred that he shall see Murray and speak to him about the loan for Kansas, Mrs. Horch came in touch with Fred. (in Mr. Horch's absence) and transmitted to him the contents of Mme Roerich's cable, emphasizing to him the importance of the K. matter and its urgency. Fred promised to see Mur. Following this interview with Mur. Fred called us up asking Mr. Horch and Miss Lichtmann to come to see him. On June 8th we went to see him.

Already in March after our interviews with Mur. we had <sup>then</sup> informed Fred. of Mur.'s great interest in the K. matter and of his readiness to approve the loan. We then also instructed <sup>Fred,</sup> ~~him~~ of the channel thru which Mur. wanted the loan should be handled, as he did not want the O.H. should have anything to do with it. This information was important for Fred. to have, as in approaching various people for the loan, he could give them the tangible fact as to who is in favour of the K. matter and as to who will approve of the loan.

According to Fred. Mur. was very friendly to help the Kansans, but personally he cannot give this loan. Mur. added that this matter must be approached in a strictly business/<sup>- like</sup> manner and it must be arranged thru regular business channels. After Fred laid before Mur. the K. matters and after the latter expressed his views on this matter, Mur. said that he had already spoken about the K. possibilities with Mr. Horch and Miss E. Lichtmann and that he told them <sup>at that time</sup> ~~that~~ he will give his approval for the loan. We have advised Mme de Roerich of the outcome of this interview of Fred with Mur. by cable. The K. matter remains pending, awaiting receipt of the data needed. As soon <sup>we</sup> as/receive the needed information we shall do our utmost to see the K. matter consummated.

We discussed further with Fred the possibilities of the various ways to secure the loan.

Plan No. 1: A straight loan to K. by a Bank or by a group of friends



This demands most exact details and fullest guarantees by the K. people. Plan No. 2: The possibility of a Bank here (Go. Institution) to advance approximately 1 million dollars worth of goods from hereto K.. K. would receive a fair length of time to repay the money due for the goods. The time of repayment for these goods would be a matter of negotiations. It is essential that the names of fully legally empowered representative of K. to conduct these negotiations and conclude the loan should be made known to us.

The matter would be handled here from the Go. Bank and from K. by the high authorities there, to whom the K. Go. gives the right to purchase goods here. No money would be advanced under this plan to K. but only goods. Our Go. Bank here will advance the money to business concerns here up to 90% of the amount sold to K. The K. people will have to make out an exact list in detail as to the goods which they desire to purchase here. This list could be submitted to the Bank here for approval after a definite approval is received from this Go. Bank, then could the K. authorities place the orders with the firms here who in turn would be paid 90% by the Go. Bank. Then the goods would be shipped to K.

K. must also state the guarantees which it would give to the Go. Bank here in order to assure repayment of the purchases. This is in brief the outline of the proposed plan.

As soon as all requested details in former letters and cables are received, we shall follow up all the possibilities. A statement of income and expenditures of the K. <sup>authorities</sup> is needed and a blue print or a map showing the localities of the resources put up as a guarantee.

My Beloved Mother

We have visited Mur. and the results of our visit you will find in Logv's Diary. She was very cordial.

We have been perturbed with the news in the newspapers about the activities of writers at K. These activities are going on for quite some time according to reports.

Fr.is in Wash.taking up the matters of the Exp. and the counter-action of the adverse articles that appeared, with her friend. She has handled this matter exclusively and you know all details from her, since she wired us from Wash. that she received a number of cables from you and that she is in communication with You. We have been advised that Maurice is with Frances at Wash.

\*) Your cable about our Indic.has revealed to us a new development which is so contrary to anything that has happened in the past along this line. For in the past you have always strassed that no matter who or what the media may be in our milieu, we should just the same accept the Will of the L. which goes through one or another channel. During the past few years the L.has given us His Trust in permitting us to speak. Limitless was His Help during the most trying months and years of receivership and during the Convention for it is uniquely through the Ind. of the L.that the Building was saved and many other things accomplished. Of course nothing ever will nor can shatter our faith in the L., for we keep the Image of the L.in our hearts. Likewise do we trust the Voice of the L., which manifests itself thru the Indications given to us.The Will of the L. shall always remain for us Supreme.

In Your last letter you warn us of the dangers which come from permitting one's heart to become embittered. It was the supreme Love for the L.and faith in Him that kept our hearts all these most difficult years of our work with our coworkers from becoming embittered, as otherwise there was nothing joyous nor uplifting in carrying on work with some souls whose actions were remote from those of plain human beings in a plain human milieu, where humaneness, honesty and cooperation are the foundations.

For the love of the L.and our devotion to You we withstood all the pressure keeping a flaming Faith in every word of the L.

I have haste to send this letter thru a friend who leaves for N.Y. and I hope it will catch this week's boat.
