Thapar. my wige desires me & thank you for your kind letter & also for the negetables and lovely pears which were awaiting us on our arrival. The will write to you by the nest mail. I thank you very much for your kind letter of yesterday's date and am very glad to know that you are satisfied with the result of our efforts. I feel sure that our success was largely due to Mr Shibayev's meticulous care with regard to his personal appearance. Had he been about to make a proposal of marriage he could not have been more particular. Each hair of his imposing moustache was carefully placed in position. I am not prepared to swear that he didn't use lipstick and face powder!

I am truly thankful that the case ended without our having to go to Dharmsala and also that no one can claim that the case was given against us. I do not think others have received much encouragement to take us we into Court in future.

We were extremely sorry to hear that you have been so upset, and sincerely hope that the cosmic disturbances will become less violent and that you will be permitted to enjoy better health.

We had a very severe thunderstorm accompanied by torrential rain last night, and were thankful to find our bungalow still standing this morning.

I will tell Mrs Merrick that you hope to meet her personally.

I have already told her of your illness and warned her that you may not be able to see her. She is coming to lunch with us today.

It seems strange that Zodpa should have gone through to Dharmsala without coming to see any of us.

Again many thanks for your kind letter, and I hope we may soon be able to rejoice in the good news that your health is better.

After a glorious day yesterday we have now got snow again. It rained most of the night and started snowing this morning. It is now about 4 inches deep and it is snowing heavily.

Major Banon leaves Kulu tomorrow for Bangalore where he is to be attached for duty on a Prisoners of War Camp. Now Herbert will have all the wives and properties to do what he likes with.

I hope you are all keeping well in Naggar. Our servants are having influenza and babies. Our Khitmagar's wife had a baby two days ago and the Bearer's wife should have had one about the same time, but hers seems to be a delayed action bomb and we are still in suspense, at least she is.
