Dear Mrs. Roerich:

So very many times as I think I will write to Mrs. Fosdick two word well up, unhidden, but filled with love and gratitude - They are "Dear Helena", two of the sweetest words I know. How can I thank you enough for the book "Hierarchy"? A life time of loving service to mankind would not compensate for the many unexpected blessings I have received in the past year.

I am keenly aware of many of my imperfections - probably I have many more of which I am

as yet unaware. I am sincerely striving toward self-mastery as I am becoming increasingly conscious of how we circumscribe our ability to serve by our own defects. But how often I fail! And how often I am unsure of just what is the correct thing to do.

I have been very ill. I had an attack of angina pectoris so severe that for a moment I really feared an abrupt end of this incarnation. Now, I am unable to do much physical work. If I am receiving my instructions accurately I should study six hours daily. That requires a real effort of will for I am not, by nature, studious. However, I keep trying to do it - It would be easier to do it nightly when the children are in bed - except that it would distress my husband too greatly. I do hope that after the children return to school in September I will find it less difficult to study.

Mrs. Fosdick has been very kind to me. I hope that some day I can prove my gratitude by being really useful.

How often during the past months I have wished that years ago I had had

the courage to follow my inclination  
to do something to help Nicholas Roerich's  
work - But at that time I thought  
any effort of mine would be too  
insignificant to be of any use.

If I were to send you a few bulbs

How very kind you are! How am I ever going to thank you enough for the lovely crystals from the Himalayas! Every night I go to sleep with one clasped in each hand. One night I dreamed that some one violently wrenched one from my hand and threw it onto the floor where it broke into splinters. I was horrified but realized that no outside force could shatter the thought it represented. I awoke and found that it was indeed on the floor several feet from the bed but was not broken. That was the largest crystal, the one which seems to be filled with infinite love. The small one which had the yellow surface color doesn't have such a powerful effect. My youngest boy says it is like a castle with a door - And the third one I gave to my very dear friend, Florence Stanaway, because

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it was the most precious thing I could give her to take to her new home. I hope it was not wrong of me to do so.

Jacob, my youngest son said, "Mother, don't you think we should go to India?" My heart says, "Yes! yes! yes!" The attraction of the Himalayas is very strong — but I am far from worthy of many of the privileges I would like to have. If I ever am worthy I am sure I will receive definite instructions — Or should I say "when I am ready" for last year when I was re-reading "Altai Himalaya" the message came, "Read carefully for you will pass this way," and several other things since indicate the possibility. But there must be hundreds of others far more worthy than I.

I am enclosing a small gift I made for you, as words fail to express the depths of my gratitude for the lovely crystals and the freedom from fear which they have brought.

My heart yearns to express its love in a gift to you - but I am trying to discipline myself enough to do the mending and sewing I should for the family first.

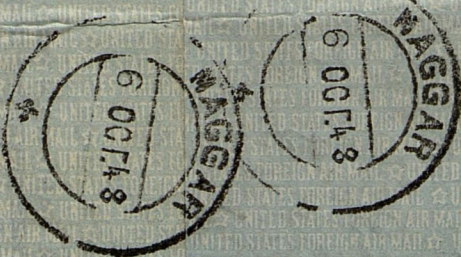
