Dear Colonel Bailey:

I am sending you the cheque (Rs 3005/-) for Lakhmandas Ramchander. We got to Dergechy alright in one day, there was some delay only at Singtun. On arriving we had a hard time to find rooms - every thing filled up. Prof Roversch and Mr Roversch got a room in the bungalow of the manager of Eden Sanitarium, we the Colonel, Doct^r and I in the dormitory. We secured Hillside and shall move in to-morrow. We went to see the Deputy Commissioner and the Police officials and ^{settled} arranged all the passport matters. The Colonel and Doct^r will be leaving soon for Calcutta and further. We all thank you very much for your kind assistance and hospitality. We shall send you soon the money to be forwarded to the Thasa Government for transport and some Mongolian bank notes and stamps. We heard recently from Mr. Crane Potamda arrived today the baggage is due to-morrow.

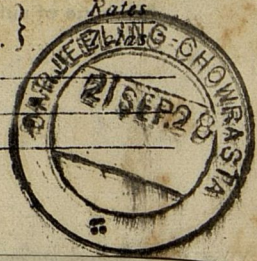

We are writing to inform you that we have received through your kindness the acknowledgement from the Tibetan government of the receipt of 1826 Rupees, covering the expenses for the caravan of the Roerich American Expedition and for the return of money for the brocade acquired by the Tibetan authorities from the Roerich American Expedition. We presume that we shall now hear shortly regarding our communications of June 20th and August 17th to the Tibetan authorities in regard to the detention of the Roerich American Expedition.

Should you hear of any intention on the part of the Tibetan authorities to apologize for their actions regarding the Roerich American Expedition, we shall be grateful if you will inform us.

We appreciate the courtesy with which you have assisted us in all matters of the Expedition and again thank you for your graciousness.
