Many thanks for your letter of the 4th instant ( Ref.No.1754 ).

Please find enclosed the corrected proofs of the first 49 pages of the book. Most of the corrections need no comments. As you will see the corrections are not too many. I think the sign should be kept for aspiration, thus k , c , t , etc. , and the sign for palatalization, thus k , c , etc.

On p.8 of the proof two recent works on Geser should be included in the foot-note.

The legend on p.10-11 was to accompany a map of the area which was included in my original MS. If it is not intended to reproduce the map in the book, the legend could be omitted.

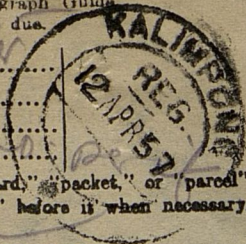
