The work of the Kalimpong Branch is continuing. The Tibetan classes are doing well. though the number of students has decreased. I'we attend more or less regularly. and another student plans to join the class by the end of July. The Chinese class has not restarted. Mr. Shen Fu-min had some personal differences with Mr. Chakravarti in whose house we used to meet, and does not want to continue the work ar take part in the Association's activities. Mr. Mukerii and myself have tried hard to persuade him, and have asked Mr. Liang, our Vice-President, to help us to find anether teacher. He did try to help us but all available teachers refused. I then contacted Mrs Mishh, whom you know. She first said, she might do it, but then wrote me that her English was poor and she had too much work to do at home. The only solution left to us, is to engage a Tibetan teacher who knows Chinese well. Of course it isnhobethe same thing. but better than nothing. There are still about six students wishing to study Chinese and they constantly ask me about the classes.

Our President Mr.M.C.Pradhan has been appointed Chief Magistrate of the Sikhim Government and is at present in Gangtok. I have no objections to include Mr.Indra as suggested by you. Perhaps he could be made Joint Secretary with Mr.Mukerji. Please write to him and let me know he is reaction. On hearing from you we shall contact Mr.Pradhan ir Cangtok and arrange for a meeting of the Committee of the local Branch. I understand Mr.Mukerji has written to you already..

I have tried hard to find a suitable Tibetan teacher for your Tibetan class about which you wrote in your letter of the 12th ult. Unfortunately it is very difficult to find a teacher with a knowledge of English or Hindi. Nest of these who know Inglish or Hindi, have a very seant knowledge of their native tengue, and those who are well-versed in Tibetan usually are ignorant of English or Hindi. A Tibetan friend of mine who has applied for a position in Coleutta, tells me that if he gets the job, he will be willing to help you out. None of them are ready to come to Walcunta on a nominal salary.

I was expecting your answer to my letter of July 21st about our Chinese class. Your advice in this matter will be helpful. We are trying to restart it with a Tibetan teacher who knows Chinese exceedingly well, and Mr. Mukherjee, our Secretary, is trying to settle with him the days and hours. The Tibetan class shows signs of growing. At present there are four students attending it, including one

graduate from Calcutta University.

It was most gratifying to read

about the function at the Raj Bhavan. It is a very good beginning and in the right direction. After all cultural links should always be preeminent and transcend all other links

Are you coming to Kalimpong this autumn? Mr. Pradhan was here for a day and we had a long discussion about the local branch. Unfortunately he is kept very busy at Cantok.

Many thanks for your letters of the 19th and 27th ult, the last letter enclosing the sum of Rs 120/- in 12 postal orders representing the Samskriti's grant to the Yalimpong Branch for the months of July to October, 1954.

Our President, Shri M.C. Pradhan, was here and we have discussed the present position of the Branch. Unfortunately the secretary, Mr. Indra, is away in Calcutta and we could not arrange a meeting of the Committee.

It is very difficult to get a set of the Tibetan Tripitaka. Transport charges and the cost of paper
are prohibitive. The Maha-Bodhi Society in Calcutta have
a Kangyur ( Lhasa edition ) and you could use, I presume,
their copy. As to the other books, I suggest you should
first get the necessary grammars and dictionaries. You
will find a list in Professor Bhattacharya's Bhota-prakāsa. Since the publication of the book Grammars of the
Tibetan Language in French by Bacot and Lalou were published in Paris, but then they will be of little use in
Calcutta. My own Handbook of Tibetan is being published
by the Baptist Mission Press in Calcutta.
