I wish to thank you very much for your kind letters up to Nov. 3rd 1934. These letters are regularly read attour Meetings here and the replies to questions raised by you, as for example the cost of the Tibetan Dictionary, or acknowledgments of new subscriptions, are embodied in our Minutes sent from here fortnightly.

The Institute wishes however to take this opportunity to thank you most heartily for your constant valued cooperation and to express its great appreciation of your detailed letters and your interest.

As regards exchange publication, I may add that all such journals and magazines are regularly entered into our fortnightly Minutes. Besides this I am compiling a catalogue of all books and periodicals in the Library in Naggar and when this shall be ready a copy will of course be sent to the New-York Office. As regards American exchange publications, it was understood that all these will be sent by the publishers direct to us here at Naggar, since the Journal is printed here and is also sent by us all the way from here to them. This is the usual procedure with exchange publications and with volume III we had requested to send out to all our exchange subscribers a card requesting them to send their publications direct to India. This had been done in Augil 1933 and I enclose herewith a copy of the card sent out by the New-York Office at the time. On going over our exchange material received during 1934, we find however that only the following Institutions send their publications direct:

All others either send their publication to the New-York Office, or do not send us any exchange material at all.

If without going to the expense of writing special letters to these Institutions, at some casual opportunity a card could be sent to them reminding them of the fact that exchange publications should be sent direct to India - the place of issue of our Journal. - this would save us a great deal of trouble and expense in having the ship over all the material at our expense, as we shall have to do, once the Laboratory will start working.

With special regard to the Botanical Library of the University of Pennsylvania, we find as stated in our yesterday's Minutes that these were not received here during the last, and neither the previous two years and apparently they were also not sent to the New-York Office as in the reports of the latter over the last year, we also find no trace of this Institution. Our Library has however received in the lot sent over some years ago the following publications from them
