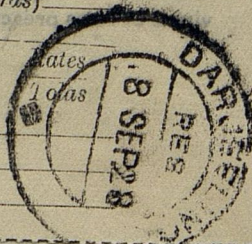

Dear Colonel Bailey,

On returning from a trip to Simla, we found your kind communication as well as the acknowledgement from the Tibetan Government of the money sent to it.

During our trip to Simla we met great cordiality. His Excellency the Viceroy is a most charming personality and his gracious reception of me shall serve as a memorable recollection. The Honorable Mr. Glancy and Mr. Acheson also showed full sympathy and response, the former expressing surprise that as yet the Tibetan government had not extended its apologies, for their unwarranted actions. Now, since receiving the acknowledgement of the Tibetan government for the money, we may hope to receive further communications in regard to the detention.

Once more I take the opportunity to send you our best greetings and our gratitude for your constant and friendly assistance. Mrs. Roerich and we all send our best regards to Mrs. Bailey and yourself.

And especially with illnesses of the heart and blood pressure one has always to be extremely cautious.

I paint daily and besides write on questions pertaining to Art and Culture. Both my sons are very busy, Svetoslav painting and Georges with his philological studies and now especially with his Anglo-Tibetan Dictionary which grows into a monumental work.
