Many many thanks for your last three articles, in portuguese, in italian, in french about America this is a glorious scope! I always rejoice seeing how
vividly and persuasively you victoriously fight for

As regards the Old Masters it turned out as I expected: the summer season in America has dispersed all people - some have already left, some have packed and their thoughts are far away. That a strange situation prevails in America - apparently the country is in a similar crisis like in 1929. We received news that a portrait by Rembrandt of similar quality like yours, could only reach \$3,000 recently. To my mind this is an absurd price, or the country must indeed be in the grip of chaos. It is also asked whether one can show the photographs in England and France, but without your consent, I of course cannot decide. Others ask whether these paintings

were offered for sale before? - please let me know.

As regards Gaugin's panneau, also a ridiculous figure
of \$1000 was mentioned in New York. Either America is
overfed or critically ill. But until I receive your news
I cannot take steps regarding London.

By the way we are sending everything always to your Geneva address, since we thought you are in San Remo temperarily, but perhaps it is advisable to send to San Remo? Did you receive "Zelta Gramata" from Riga? They are just sending it out. If for some useful purposes you need some more copies, then write to Riga and I am sure they will send you. We have had several most cordial appreciations of this book.

On June 16th in Praha the opening celebrations of my Hall in the Museum took place and we had reports that the event was most successful, and I received an address signed by all members and guests. In Praha a reproduction of my son's portrait of myself has been made in colour, which no doubt will also reach you in due course.

Every line from you brings joy to us in our snowwe peaked Himalayas and often remember the Alps, which we also loved very much.

We have written that 25 reprints should be reserved for you.

I also thank you very much for the good news from Coimbra. After the election I would like to reciprocate with one of my large paintings "Sancta Protectrix", a small reproduction of which I am sending you herewith. Since you wanted a religious subject it will just answer the requirement and moreover it will remind about our Pact - and for such a famous University the question of preservation of cultural treasures is no doubt very near to the heart. Please ask Coimbra to what exact address it should be sent and in what way - the painting is at the moment in France. Perhaps there are some special regulations about custom formalities. Upon receipt of your reply, I shall give instructions accordingly. Please send the postcard to Coimbra.

I know that you are very much interested in our Pact

and you will therefore be glad to hear that I have just received a telegram from Allahabad that the Indian History Congress has unanimously adopted our Pact. When war clouds are still in the sky, every such cultural step is especially encouraging.

In your letter you asked me to send urgently to Coimbra my article and my painting. I enclose herewith for your information a copy of my airmail letter of yesterday, from which you will see that both your advices have been earried out. Many thanks for all your suggestions, which I always greatly appreciate.

We liked very much the article about yourself in "PHENICIA" - indeed you are a real modern encyclopédiste, but I would add - a benevolent encyclopédiste, because your highly constructive work stands out in our age of destruction and negation.

you write that you are sending separately the size of Rembrandt's painting - in this letter we did not find it and are therefore awaiting it with your next letter. The photo of Gaddi's painting reached safely, but without the certificate, which probably also

follows. You know that even excellent paintings meet difficulty in sale when not accompanied by authoritative certificates. Such is our conventional age that even something obviously genuine and beautiful should be accompanied by "scraps of paper". The same applies helas to all human relationship at present. The most convincitand most uplifting covenants are called "scarps of paper", But the eternal law remains as such and The Beautiful is forever a fundamental condition of Life.

Following your wise advice I have sent to Coimbra a painting on a religious subject and I believe that for an ancient University such a solution of the problem is the best. Probably when the University will send the Diploma, they will also add some literature about their Museum, which will help me still more to cooperate with them. - You will be interested to hear that our Pact was not only endorsed by the Indian History Congress at Allahabad, but that also the Nagari Pracharini Sabha, the oldest Lirerary Society, in Benares, intends passing a resolution of adhreence. -

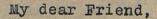
