NICHOLAS ROERICH

ICHOLAS ROERICH, artist, scientist, philosopher, writer, first came to the United States in 1920 at the invitation of the Art Institute of Chicago to conduct a rotary exhibition of his paintings through America. For the past forty years, Roerich has been recognized as one of the greatest spirits in art in Europe and the East. His paintings hang in the Louvre, Luxembourg, Victoria and Albert Museums and other great museums of the world as well as in private collections.

While in America, Professor Roerich, in accordance with his firm belief that all the Arts are one and inter-related, founded the Master Institute of United Arts, a school where all the arts are taught undo one roof. A summer branch of the school has been established. Moriah, New ork.


In 1923, Roerich headed the Roerich American Expedition to Central Asia which for more than four years journeyed through the almost impenetrable regions of Tibet, Chinese Turkestan, Altai Mongolia and the Himalayas. This expedition was conducted under the auspices of leading American art and educational institutions. From an artistic and scientific standpoint, the results of this expedition are unparalleled.

When Roerich completed his tour of American cities, the impression his paintings had made on the country was so great and the demand so insistent for a permanent home for this collection that it was decided to found the Roerich Museum in New York. This is perhaps the only museum in the world dedicated to a living artist.

The Roerich Museum soon outgrew the modest building in which it was founded at 310 Riverside Drive, New York City, and the directors decided to build a new edifice on the same site,—the twenty-four story Master Building, the first skyscraper museum. In the new building the Roerich Museum will have most of the paintings of this master art.

Roerich was nominated in the spring of 1929 by the Department of International Law of the University of Paris for the Nobel Peace Award. The committee making the citation said, in part:


"Since 1890, Nicholas Roerich, through his writings, lectures, researches, paintings and the many fields into which his broad personality has led him, has forcefully expounded the teaching of international brotherhood. His propaganda for peace has penetrated into more than twenty-one countries. As an artist, one of the greatest that history has every produced, his paintings have illustrated the great volume of beauty and spiritual light symbolized by his teachings."



His Excellency, Professor Nicholas de Roerich, President-Founder, Master Institute of United Arts, Naggar, Kulu, Punjab, British India.

My dear Professor de Roerich:

I have received your letter of January 31st, and wish to say that the question of the Campaigns for our various endowment funds, is one which has become especially serious and has greatly concerned us of late.

As you know the committees had been formed some years ago, in accordance with your and Mme. de Roerich's plans for the raising of these funds which would relieve the institutions and permit them to go on with their work unhampered by lack of means. We awaited the moment of the end of our receivership and the reorganization of the Building to launch into these campaigns with added fervor. The fall of 1935 was very auspicious for this possibility - the return of the Building to the Roerich Museum control assured our friends and helpers of the stability of the building; the signing of the Roerich Treaty last April - all these factors were conducive to utmost success.

Instead, all these plans have been completely disrupted, due to Mr. Horch's insidious conspiracy. The Friendship Bond campaign which could have assured to the Bondholders the safety of their investment, and which you so precisely foresaw so many years ago, has of course been completely frustrated by Mr. Horch's scheme. The Banner of Peace campaign which now had complete possibilities to demand the public support for a plan so near realization has been destroyed, and even more, Mr. Horch is attempting to wipe away that which has already been accomplished. Similarly, all the other plans such as the Press Fund Campaign for our publications; the Educational Fund Campaign for the Blind and Physically Handicapped, have been destroyed.

We may say that Mr. Horch, by his present conspiracy to invade the rights of the Trustees and usurp the achievements thus far made, has not only atrophied our present work completely, but he has prevented the possibilities of insuring our future work. The actual financial damage he has brought, not only to the institutions but to the bondholders as well, is incalculable.

I deeply regret the need of having to write you this discouraging report,

but it is only just that you should have the facts, and know that Mr. Horch's premeditated scheme has rendered the Committees helpless to aid us, as they undoubtedly could have done in the normal progress which we anticipated.
