My dear Mr. Sinha,

On the eve of our departure from Bangalore I wish to write to you and to thank you for your letter of the 16th of February and for your kind words about our visit to Calcutta.

I must tell you that we were very happy to be with you and all your friends during our visit which you all tried to make so pleasant for us. Please thank Mr. Justice S.A. Masud for the very fine speech he made on both the occasions when the Calcutta Art Society was felicitating us. If it is at all possible I would like a copy of his speeches on both occasions and also your speech on the occasion of the Medal of Honour to my husband. I intend to make a small booklet of this function which may perhaps also contain the function you so kindly gave to me. Please thank our dear friend Mr. Dawood who was good enough to take us about in his car - we shall never forget his kindness to us.

Of course, it was your wonderful energy that had arranged everything to go with clock work precision and that is why both the functions went off so well. Apart from this the welcome I had I shall never forget. It was the best welcome-home that I received in the whole of my life. To have been with you was a source of great joy to both of us, but to me in particular it meant a great deal because of your friendship with my Mother, my Grand-Mother and each member of my rather past family. The precious things that you gave to me I shall treasure always in particular the lovely bangles which mean a great deal to me.
