My dear Inge,

I was delighted to hear that father's paintings have been released and I hope they will be moved as quickly as possible. I shall be very grateful if you could send me a rough description of the sizes of these paintings though I know the period when they were painted. It would be interesting to remember how many paintings of the larger size are in this lot. I consider it very fortunate to secure them as it was an important period of the Kulu-Lahoul sejourn. I imagine the Triptich of Jeanne D'Arc should be among them.

In my last letter to you I have written about my sixteen cases of paintings etc. Do let me know Catherine's and your reactions to my suggestion. You may well guess the reasons for this particular consideration of mine.

I may be sending two small boxes of things directly to you soon. There will be no difficulty for you to receive them. Do let me know sometime, when you have the time, something about your own life and activities. My dear Inge,

I heard from Catherine the other day and I was delighted to see that the paintings had already been secured and safely stored, that is a great achievement and I congratulate you for this success. Now I shall be expecting a list of these paintings as I am very interested to know which particular things are there.

I have heard from Mother that either Catherine or Sina wrote to her to say that there is at present some sort of a medicine which is most effective in cases of Rheumatic Fever and Arthritis. I would like to know the particulars for a friend of mine. According to Mother this remedy was some sort of a specific and produced marvellous results. In case it was Sina who told her about this and you do not know the name of it please find out from her.

In her last letter Catherine has written to say that the U.S. Customs have extended the storage period for 6 months instead of one year. This of course I have noted but I still maintain that the best solution would be to take all these 16 boxes out at the earliest opportunity. The American Consul here is a personal friend of ours and in case the U.S. Customs, or Government, would like some sort of a special type of document executed here to facilitate the securing of the paintings I shall be very glad to do so if only you could let me know what type of paper is really required.

Catherine's last letter describing your life on the farm was a great delight to me and I hope to become a participant before very long. In case you have a photograph of Catherine's little niece, Kay, do send me one, I would like to see it very much. We are of course very happy to know that Panasenky is now fully recovered, that is very good news. Please convey to him my most cordial greetings, tell him how happy I shall be to see him before long.

I hope the Tractor that Catherine proposes to purchase will be a light one, it will definitely come in useful, if it comes to the worst we could use it to move the paintings.

We are all well and leaving for Bangalore the day after tomorrow. Bangalore is midway between Madras and the West Coast and if you have a map I am sure it will not be difficult to find out. We shall be there for ten days or so, after which we again return to Bombay. In the meantime if you could find out what document or paper I should execute here I could easily do it provided we know the type of document that will really be acceptable to the Customs there.

My dear Inge,

The other day I sent off to you the Declaration duly signed and attested by the United States Consul in Bombay and I sincerely hope that it will meet with all the requirements.

It makes me very happy to think that all these cases shall now be in your possession as I was somewhat worried as regards their safety.

I hope by now you have fully recovered and you have my sincere sympathies and all best wishes always.

Mother and George have gone to Darjeeling where they are staying at the Himalayan Hotel; Mother is well and is feeling much better in general. There is a great deal of work for my brother to do in connection with his studies and he will have to remain there for some time. I have had no letter as yet from them, only telegrams, but I know they had a very pleasant journey. For the time being they will all stay at Kalimpong since it is a much more central place for George's work, as soon as they are established and as soon as I free myself of all the incessant worries and details which I have to attend from day to day, with no sign of diminution, I hope to go to Kalimpong myself where I will stay for a little while. There are so many things that I must attend to in different parts of India that some times I feel I will never be able to come to America, yet, I am quite certain that I shall be there before the Autumn.

I always regretted that Catherine and you have not come out to India before. Conditions here are really quite normal and, I believe, as normal as one could expect in any country these days. It would be nice for you and for Catherine to be with Mother for a little while and I would like you to think over this matter when you have time.

Mother's book, "Foundations of Buddhism" is being brought out again by the Mahabodhi Society and George's large work on the History of Tibet is being published by the Royal Asiatic Society of Bengal. There is so much to do that even five years would not exhaust the present programme. I am at present negotiating for the Indian Government to publish George's large Tibetan Dictionary which was completed by him some time ago, of course, that is a very monumental work and would require a lot of editing before it is ready for printing. I am giving you all this news since you ask me to give more details. The girls are well and flourishing. Mother and George will probably take a house in Kalimpong and remain there for the time being.

As regards Kulu, our Doctor is in charge of our estate there

looking after it and trying to improve the property, whatever that may mean.

I have still, as I said before, hopes that you both come to India some day and that I shall be able to show you personally all the places that are of special interest. I would have certainly come to the United States earlier were it not for my work tying me down here, unfortunately it is not painting, but all sorts of other, perhaps rather irrelevant duties but they cannot be avoided for the time being.

You were quite right, when you last wire came I was away from Bombay, I was in Bangalore, which you can find on the map somewhere west of Madras in the middle of the Indian Peninsula, my wife has an estate there which I hope will be very profitable some day. Let us hope the hope materialises!

Economically India is both inflation and depression and one really does not know how these two conditions seem to co-exist alongside each other. Yet, life goes on fairly well and people who come from abroad say conditions here are infinitely better, which I believe. Of course, the uncertainty of the general situation has its repercussions here but on the whole whatever happens India reacts much more slowly than any other country. After all, most of India's population is still on the land and only a very insignificant number is employed in Industries. In the present state of our world I still prefer this country because here you can still find that which our West is fast losing, contact Tradition of life as it has come down to us through ages a continuity of evolution and development and civilisation has not changed the general outlook on life as abruptly as it has changed it in the West with the result that the West has, to a great extent, lost its roots and the present civilisation has not been digested by the This richness of life which you find in India is something which makes India very precious to me from so many different points of view and in the surviving tradition one can still find so much of the original thought which has brought this about. Practically every day, with friends, we discuss the modern trends of civilisation, the unavoidable enslavement of mankind by industrial development and the gradual change over from some sort of a freedom which life on land gives you, to the abjext slavery which a worker in factory and mill must experience. There is no solution for this problem because civilisation in itself trying to emancipate man and free him by giving him the freedom of movement and expression yet binds him by virtue of the necessity to maintain that civilisation as without maintenance it breaks down completely and leaves nothing for man to fall back upon. Perhaps in the future we shall be able to discover some means of coordination of life on land with some sort of Cottage Industry as it has been done in France and Japan where weaving was done at home and only the assemblage and the bigger operations conducted in factories. As one can definitely observe, our modern civilisation does not make man any better, on the centrary, it deprives him of a great many human qualities, and while it frees his thought it also couples it to some

extent as it fills our mind with all sorts of irrelevent issues and constantly occupies our attention with some sort of outside impetus thus, man loses the faculty of independent thinking and becomes like a parrot, repeating words and digests by other people as there is no time to form ones own opinions, and if you look round, man is not any better, on the contrary, there is every evidence that man deteriorates. Look at all the crime waves that sweep the country, look at the present outlook of young men and women, you will see for yourself that unless a complete change in our attitude towards some higher valuation comes, and comes soon, we shall definitely go into a dead corner from which there will be no issue.

I read in the papers that at Harvard the Russian Sociologist Mr. T. Sorokin, is now the head of a research fund to discover the means which would make man better. This, of course, is a hopeful manifestation and I wish him every success, but I believe almost every man knows in his own heart what is really necessary to be better and how to be better except that no one wants to practise it.

I was very happy to have the list of Father's paintings which Catherine sent me, but I notice that some of them are not of the earlier group and must have been put there in place of some that may have been removed at the time.

I was delighted to have the two little snaps of Kay (junior), if you have a more recent snap of her please send it to me.

It has a beautiful view, it has an appropriate name and it looks yery compactly and conveniently designed. The terrace may be a bit cold in the winter as it does not seem to be enclosed. The best part of it of course is the view and it shall be an endless source of delight and inspiration to see the ever changing colours and the beautiful Alpen Gluhn. Do the two elevators reach to the top floor or do they stop at the floor below?

In India we have many a difficulty over which no one has any control and we hope that they will resolve themselves in the near future. Of course the predictions are that two more years are difficult from a point of view of food especially. It is a certain three years cycle which has to be passed through. The food situation is serious, but thanks to the timely help of many nations including the United States, conditions have been controlled and food grains are available in reduced quantity only. But if the next years will have a scarcity of rains, it shall become very serious. There are many restive elements who are looking for every opportunity to cause trouble. Though in our own plantation we are not so much dependent on water as other agricultural developments are, yet we already feel the drought and our lakes are completely dry which has never happened before. With all that there are no signs of rains which ought to have come at this time. Temperatures are considerably above normal and everything points to difficult timeSahead.

Our trip to North has been postponed and we have not as yet fixed the date of our departure. The Punjab State to which Kulu belonged has been now divided into three portions - Punjab, Hariana and Himachal Pradesh. We shall be part of Himachal Pradesh which is a Himalayan Region taking in the North Western Himalayan Areas. It is unfortunate that one must have divisions at this time, but this is only a follow-up of certain mistakes that have been committed some years ago. People have ways of complicating their lives and creating new Karma when things seemed to have settled down to a certain mode of life.

Our days are spent as usual in our work with heavy correspondence in which I am far behind as there is a large volume of Russian letters and I have no Russian Secretary to do the work.

We are always happy whenever we hear from you and we both send you our very best thoughts and wishes and hope to hear from you soon again.

I imagine Katherine is away to the Canary Islands. I hope she likes them. When is she planning to return from there?

My Deares / Lige,

I hope you have fully recovered from your operation and its after effects. We often think of you and even if we have not written, you must know that we always send you our affectionate thoughts and wish you everything that is best. Do write to us and let us know how you are and something of your life these days.

We have returned from Kulu not so long ago where we have stayed this year less than usual on account of Devika being not quite well which necessitated treatment both in Bombay and Delhi.

Life in India has become very complicated with seemingly unsurmountable obstacles looming large on every horizon and threatening in so many different ways. When one looks at all these complex problems it seems sometimes a solution may well be never found intellectually, but there is the greater wisdom of Providence and we can always hope that some unexpected solution may bring some consolation and possible restoration of some felicity. As always all problems are man-made and it is man only that can remove them from his path.

I have been painting again, working on a large series of paintings mainly on philosophical and pan-human subjects. They are large and therefore also entail extra work. Many have not as yet been properly photographed, but as soon as they are photographed I shall send you some copies however unsatisfactory they usually are. In this connection I would like to say that the photographs which were made of my portraits of Katherine in Switzerland were among the best obtained so far. The problem of reproductions was never solved by us here satisfactorily and the best efforts have fallen far short of our expectations.

In Kulu I have done considerable research work on the 'Art of Kulu', visited many new temples, photographed many new sculptures. There are still a few temples to be visited, a few sculptures to be recorded. I was happy that my representations to the Government about the restoration and preservation of a certain important temple has borne fruit and the Government has now included it into the list of protected monuments.

Even since you were last in India, life has changed a great deal, not to say or use the word deteriorated. What with the unbelievable increase in population which cannot be checked inspite of some efforts by the Government and the inability of people to emigrate because nobody wants to have any emigration these days - a point of saturation can be forseen in the not too distant future. This problem completely frustrates every effort

to raise the standard of living and improve the economy of the country.

Do let us hear from you and in the meantime take good care of yourself and give our warmest greetings to Katherine, her husband and to Dora.
