My dear Devika and Svetoslav,

I was deeply grieved to read of the passing away of George. How I wish I were with you at this time of distress to share with you your grief and to lighten as far as possible your burden. Raghavan wrote to Chanda about your going to Moscow on the 20th April and that you would return in about six weeks' time. I wonder if your programme will now be changed. George was a great friend of mine just as you have been and I enjoyed being with him in Kalimpong for a fortnight in April 1955. We had a number of meetings in Bombay when he was on his way to Russia. I had great affection for him and I know he liked me immensely also.

It was good that you were with George all this month and last before his passing away so suddenly. When we meet, which I hope will be very soon, you will tell me all about him and his work in Moscow.

I am very tired for the moment as I have had no leave during the last 18 months since my return from Hong Kong early in December 1958. I have got stuck to Bombay and it seems for the next three months at least, I will be in Bombay. Not only because of my normal work but because I expect to complete during the next three months my book on Labour. It is going to be a long long story and I have already written over ten chapters.

When this book is finished I would like to take a good

holiday and I do not think of any place better than Bangalore where we three can stay together and you look after me as you did in September-October 1953. Please accept my heart-felt condolences and remember that when you return to India and to Bangalore we must get together.
