The proper procedure to adopt if you wish to procure forest land for the cultivation of Kuth or any other purpose is to apply to the Assistant Commissioner, Kulu, for a Nautor under Punjab Government Notification No. 285, dated 1st June, 1896.

By this procedure, it will not be necessary to enquire from every right-holder, whether they agree to the proposal or not. Each case will be dealt with on its own merits.

Dear Mr. Roerich,

Have you yet seen Burke about land for your Kuth?

I am afraid I misinformed you the other day, and in my
letter regarding "Nautor". Apparently even for "Nautor" the
right-holders have to be asked whether they object or not.

I had understood from Burke that this was not necessary,
but it is.

I shall put the whole case up to Mr. Glover when he comes to Kulu at the end of May.

In the meantime, is there no private Zamindari's land at all, which is suitable for Kuth growing, which you could lease direct from the owner? I think that this is the only certain way for you to obtain land for the transplanting of your Kuth plants - until the present law is changed. Even if I now ask Government to issue a notification closing the Chander Khani area for the purposes of growing Kuth, and then lease the areas you want, to you - the notification will not be issued in time for you to transplant - it takes about six months for a notification to go through. I greatly regret all this delay, but as matters stand at present, I am powerless to lease you the areas you want. I will let you know directly I have seen Mr. Glover. With kind regards.
