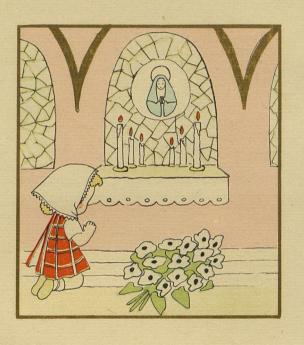

To be presumptuous and arrogant is to be empty-headed, to be really worthless, to have an exaggerated idea of one's own

value.

The upright man does not hate; he pities the ignorant and misguided.

Hate is a worm within the heart.



You consist of a body and a soul.

Hygiene in all its forms is desirable for the body. Thus, for example, hygiene of the skin means scrupulous cleanliness; hygiene of the stomach consists in eating what is necessary, without overeating or taking harmful foods; hygiene of the lungs means breathing pure air in abundance.

The soul also has its hygiene: to think no evil; to prevent oneself from being carried away by wicked feelings; to learn humility and obedience; to know how to address a prayer to God.



To a little twelve-year-old orphan who goes to Mass and carries out her religious duties, I say,

Jesus, the Son of God.

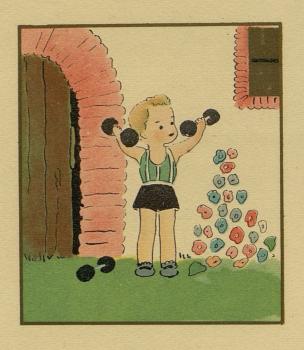
Jesus illumines us within, gives us powers, comforts and encourages us.

Have faith, hope and charity, and, then and there, you will be rich and mighty, for you will possess the best wealth and the greatest power.

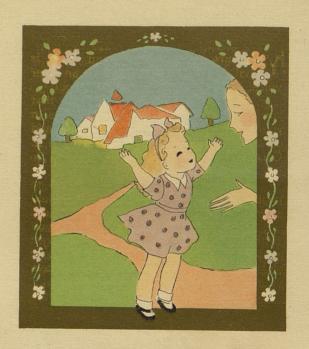


To pray is something very wonderful. To pray is to put oneself in communication with the divine beings who are in heaven.

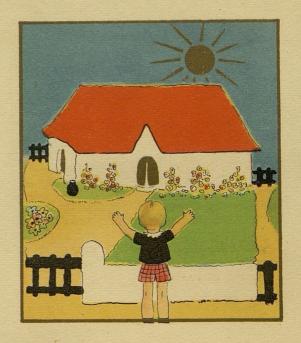


Every morning when you wake up, your strength, your will and your joy return; you are stirred by a desire to see your parents and your brothers and sisters, and to go to school.

This "something" that speaks to you thus in your inner self is your surest guide. Accustom yourself to consulting it and following it faithfully. You will save yourself many sorrows.



You must accustom yourself to feeling united to the Divine Power. You must realise that no action is hidden from the eyes of God, nor is there any good deed that He does not reward. Thus you will surely find peace of heart: thus you will not depend on human judgments which are fickle and capricious.

Sometimes it will happen that you have done a good deed and nobody knows about it. Do not let this matter to you.

If you have been under the impression that eating, sleeping, reading, writing and reckoning, playing and growing were the only things necessary for life, you have been making a great mistake. The body and the brain possess one life; another

life is that of the spirit.

In order to live the spiritual life which is very superior to the other, you must love God and feel Him always at your side; you must convince yourself that worth and goodness are recompensed in one way or another, late or soon; you must look for the opportunity of doing at least one good work every day. This work of yours can consist of a few kind words or a righteous or benevolent deed.

To appreciate the difference between the material and the spiritual life, let us compare the two great sensations: pain and pleasure.

You eat a sweetmeat which you enjoy very much. It is a material pleasure. In a few minutes the enjoyment is over.

You have a penny. You meet another child who is very poor and hungry. You give him your penny. All that day you will remember your good deed. A year later, twenty years later, you will remember how one day you gave up your coin so that another child could buy bread. This pleasure is spiritual. It is pure and lasting.

If you trap your finger when you shut a door you will feel pain. But this pain goes away and the following day you have already forgotten it. It was a mate-

rial pain.

You displease your mother very much, you steal something or you act dishonourably towards a companion. Conscience tells you that you have behaved badly. You are upset because you have acted in this way. This pain will trouble you for a long time. This is a spiritual pain.

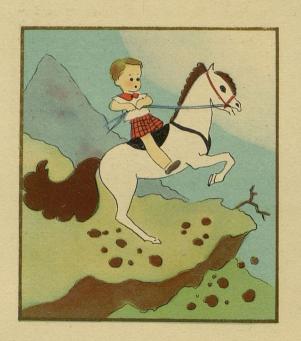


Cometimes you say, "When I am big..." It seems as if nothing would please you so much as being tall and bulky. But perhaps there is a misunderstanding in this. You say that you want to grow and what you really desire is to be worth more, to be more than you are in intelligence, will and power. 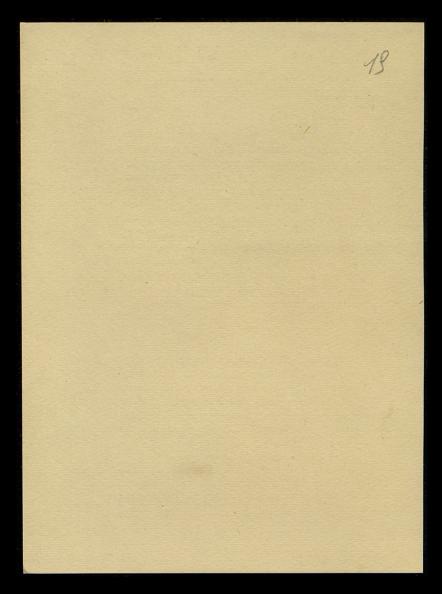


I would like all little boys to understand the following words from The Fallow Land: "To be better to-day than yesterday: to-morrow better than to-day: this

Use your will-power for the great work of your life—your progress towards perfection.

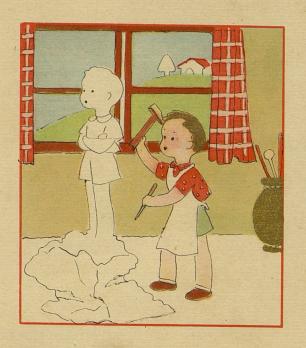

You possess only one means of freeing yourself from your grief: to go up to the person you have offended and ask pardon of him for your words.

Your affliction will be greater if you use actual violence against anyone. It will make you grieve more because it will hurt you in your soul. You will feel the pain longer, for your conscience will remind you of your cruelty, for days, months and

vears.

In order to feel happy you must first be good.



To-day you are healthy and happy, tomorrow you may be ill or hurt yourself or have some disappointment.

Life is like this and we must be ready for its changes and fickleness.

Do not consider yourself a privileged creature, exempt from pain; realise that you have to be ready and armed to resist it; you must always live in communication with Jesus, Who is everything great, strong and merciful that you could desire for your support and help. If you rely on His support you will feel powerful in spite of your smallness and frailty. Pain is stronger than our bones, muscles and nerves; it overpowers and vanquishes the whole body. Only the spirit dares to defy it and, supported by Jesus, it can prevail.

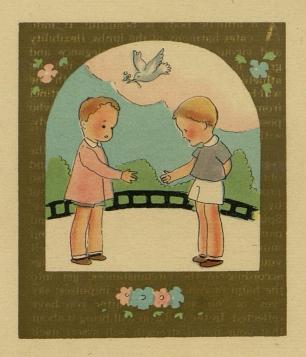
The first person you must convince of your goodness is yourself. Your conscience cannot deceive you. And when it tells you that you are good, when that voice from within declares it, your heart will overflow with gladness.

For you can choose among many occupations and professions, you can acquire a special skill that makes you notable, but nothing else is worth so much as being good.

When they say of a man, "He is a great engineer"; or, "He is a very skilful blacksmith"; or, "He is a famous painter", the principal thing remains to be known,

"Is he good?"

Being good is the great occupation, the noblest profession, the inexhaustible treasure, the highest wisdom, the best business, the true glory, the supreme happiness.



An athletic body is beautiful. It indicates harmony of the limbs, flexibility and vigour in the muscles, elegance and grace in the whole. A man is not an athlete because he has great strength: he will be a strong man. The athlete is distinct from this and superior: he is a man who possesses a healthy and perfect body, within the limits of his person.

In the same way that you procure the regular functioning of your organism and obtain health and vigour, so you also procure the health and power of the soul by means of will and perseverance. Spiritual improvement calls for daily and painstaking exercises which you can and must perform. For this you must tell yourself to do or not to do things according to the circumstances; get into the habit of controlling your impulses; say "yes" or "no" to yourself after you have reflected. In the end you will bring it about that your moral strength will assert itself in all circumstances.



Even among the most savage peoples and from the earliest times there has been a doctor for the body and also a doctor for the soul, that is to say, the priest. Even the ignorant have understood that, besides bones, muscles and blood, there is something else in their beings which is not material, something that goes on living when the body dies.

Such certainty is the reason why ancient peoples placed offerings, useful things and even food, in the tomb of their dead. They thought that after death they went on living as before and with the same bodily needs. In this they were mistaken, but in the fundamental idea they were right; life goes on; the soul, parted from

the body, survives death.



In order to understand the prayer, "Our Father", you will need many days, many years, much intelligence, much virtue. On saying, "Our Father Who art in heaven", pause, consider what it means, repeat these six words slowly, pronouncing the syllables well, until you perceive their meaning. For it is a marvellous thing to say that, besides the father who is head of your home, who gave you this life, who provides for your needs and safeguards your future, you possess another father, Who is father of all of us human beings, and Who is in heaven.

When you add in your prayer, "hallowed be Thy name", resolve to sanctify it, to respect it, to reverence it, in intentions, words and deeds. Make up your mind to be a worthy son of such a Father.





The first, the most important and the most useful thing that you must learn is that life does not end with death.

We are travelling in a train: suddenly it enters a tunnel: for a time there is complete darkness, then the train comes out again into the brightness and the journey continues. When we die it is as if we entered a tunnel: everything is in shadow, but presently brightness returns, that is to say, life goes on.

This life of yours, however long it may be, is just a part of your existence. That is why we talk about our earthly life, our passage through the world. For we come to the earth, and on dying we go away. It is essential to understand this

well.
