Mrs. Sophie Schafran, eightythree, a former trustee of the Roerich Museum, 310 Riverside Drive, died Saturday at her home, 319 W. 107th St.

A native of Odessa, Russia, Mrs. Schafran came to this country thirty-five years ago. She was associated with the late Nicholas K. Roerich, Russian painter and archeologist, in the founding in 1924 of the International Art Center which, in 1929, opened the Roerich Museum of Art.

Mrs. Schafran was active in the cultural program of the museum until she retired in 1944 because of a heart ailment. By that time, the museum had become involved in financial and ideological controversies and Professor Roerich had departed for Tibet and India. He died in Kulu, East Punjab, in 1947.
