Dear Mr. Mundy,

I write to acknowledge with thanks the receipt of your cable received on the 30th December, of your letters dated the 31st December and of the two sets of books. Duty at Geneva has prevented me replying earlier.

2. I am afraid that you have put yourself to unnecessary trouble in writing to me so fully, because your letter deals very largely with matters which, as I explained to you at the beginning of our talk on 15th December, do not fall within the sphere of the High Commissioner for India. This Office handles no political matters whatsoever, and all negotiations regarding the rights of foreign subjects in India are the concern of the India Office in England and the Government of India in India. I gather from one of the accompaniments to your letter that you have been in communication with the India Office, and will therefore forward to that Office a copy of your letter to me.

3/ Towards the end of your letter you are good enough to repeat the offer, made during our talk, to arrange exhibitions of the work of Indian artists, or tours of Indian musicians in the United States of America. We will communicate this offer to the authorities in India.
