Dear Sina;

Enclosed I am sending the bill of lading for the 60 pieces which left on the evening of June 3rd for Liberty, Indiana. Also the list of boxes and bill of expenses incurred in Danbury.

The boxes will arrive in Liberty at the freight yard of the Erie Railroad in about 6 or 7 days. As we had decided I sent the boxes collect via freight. Most of it went by cheapest rate which is \$1.32 per 100 pounds. Only on two cartons the rate is \$1.55 as there are photographs in it which are framed and under glass. I worked along with the men all the time they were at the Warehouse, addressing the boxes and helping to repack etc. I certainly hope that after all the work the boxes will arrive safely. Although the man at the freight office said that he thought the boxes were too thin and weak for their weight and distance to be shipped.

At the same time I found your suitcase with the linen and I am sending it to you by American Express.

If you have any news of the outcome of Plauts claim against Mme. R's 2500 dollars, would you please let us know about it. As we expect to be very little in New York this summer, would you be kind enough to send us translations of the General letters.

The enclosed bill of lading will have to be mailed to Gene as he needs it to clear the boxes.
