My dear Miss Lichtman,  
I was very glad to receive  
your nice letter, but, at  
the same time, it was  
very sad to read about  
the condition of health  
of Mme Kaurich. She is  
so extremely sensitive to  
any change in the weather,  
that it seems almost  
impossible to prevent  
her painful reactions.  
The only principle of the  
treatment, as you know, is  
to sustain at any price  
the normal tone of her  
nervous system by using

proper medicines, as music,  
opium etc. and by avoiding  
any irritating agent of  
physical, nervous or psychic  
nature, which might produce  
a reaction with an expense  
of her forces. I strongly  
hope, that the protracted  
long stay in Lahul will  
bring quite an improvement  
of the general condition.  
It would be interesting for  
me to hear about the  
action of the medicine  
I have sent you through  
Mr. Skrlaver, though, of  
course, I cannot expect  
any long beneficial effect.

and in all excursions,  
which George is planning  
to undertake. It must  
be gorgeous. I love  
so much the austere  
nature of mountains,  
as I loved the shores  
of the Arctic ocean.  
But in India there is

come to Paris ~~then~~ next

fall? I do not know,  
whether we will be still  
there: we are planning  
to go to Morocco and  
to settle in Casablanca.  
Everybody praises Mo-  
rocco very highly. But  
I will be very sorry if I  
~~write~~ miss you. Do write  
me from La Hul about  
M-m's health and about  
everybody. Give my special  
greeting to Madame. I am  
never tired to praise her  
character and to speak  
about her diseases ~~with~~ <sup>to my</sup>  
friends.
