Bombay very unexpectedly
as now is Easter and every

My dear Mr. Shibaefft,

I
have just received your
kind letter including the
letters from my wife and
from Dr. Lechtman. I am very
sorry, that madam continues
to suffer, though it had to
be expected at the approach
of the hot weather. I am
sending her through Mr.
Shklaver a medicine (per
month) against heart spasms
and high blood pressure.
It does not contain anything
which can harm her as
alcohol etc. and I hope it

will give her some relief during heart attacks. I would be very pleased to hear, whether this medicine was useful or not. I advise her again to take regularly Phytin, as this is only substance which is nutritious for nervous tissue. In case of any hemorrhage (bleeding) an absolute rest is essential. When "flushes" are very disquieting, the application of medicinal leeches, which can be found in Kulu, on her back will be useful. Before the application they must stay for 1-2 days in a pure water. Anybody can apply it. Mula. Madam had already some experience of this kind and she has told me that she felt always better after this. Of course, this is only in an emergency case, especially when she cannot suffer a counter-irritating treatment by an application of heat to her hands or feet.

Dr. Lechtman writes me that Mr. Lechtman asked his advice as to the treatment of M-me Raerich. He is asking me about the diagnosis and sends you "Strophantose". This medicine is absolutely useless because of following reasons: He thinks that M-me has troubles in heart's valves or muscles, which is not the case at all.

2) This is a strong medicine, which can dangerously increase the blood pressure. (3) It is a modification of Strophantus, therefore - nothing new, and 4) it should be injected instead of being taken by mouth. With the extreme sensitiveness of M-m's organism and the rare and complicated nature of her disease it is almost impossible to treat her from distance without a full knowledge of her condition. Therefore, I advise you to thank Dr. Lechtman for his kind thoughts, but not to use Strophantose. I strongly hope, that M-m's condition will be improved after her trip to Lahul.

I have sent you and Dr. Koelz two Berettes, and I am glad that thus I was able to render

you both a little service.
 There is of course no question
 in sending me money unless
 you want to offend me. I was
 looking in Paris for a R. Phar-
 macology, but was not able

 through Mr. Sholaver. I am
 sending you a new catalogue

The camera on order you one from Pathe. All my last pictures including Kulu dances, my trip back, Venice etc. came out splendidly. Some scratches on the films were due to some rust in the camera and the rusted part was changed. From now on I hope I will have unscratched films. The palaces in Venice are very good, though the pictures were taken in a rainy day after 4 p.m.

I am seeing how many people and have met several times princess Chetvertinski, princess Tessieff, m-me Gernanoff, gen. Potoszi, Baron Taube, m-me de Vaux etc. of course, everybody was very interested in the m-me Barwick's condition. They all are very grieved that the condition persists to be very serious. M-me de Vaux has called me to the me Partier and we had a long conversation about the scientific work of the H. Reas.
