Madam:

I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of August 15, 1928, stating that you have come to India, with Mrs. Sina Lichtmann and Mr. Sviatoslav Roerich, to meet Professor Nicholas Roerich and the members of his party in Darjeeling and requesting that mail addressed to you in care of the Consulate General be forwarded to Darjeeling. Your request will be complied with.

You also ask for any literature which the Consulate General may have on the subject of American naturalization and American citizenship. The laws and regulations relative to naturalization and citizenship may be found in the Statutes of the United States, the Consular Regulations of the United States, Instructions from the Department of State to diplomatic and consular officers, and publications of the Bureau of Naturalization, United States Department of Labor, which are on file in this office but are not available for distribution. 
will

It is suggested that if you, Mrs. Lichtmann or any member of the Roerich party is an American citizen, you inform me of the number, date and place of issuance of your American passport so that these may be recorded in the Consulate General.
