I had been very happy to have spent the day in kulu in plesant company of your husband and Colonel Mahon. Such little trips are rather interesting to have a chat on the way.

Yes, we are afraid Mme de Roerich's health is no better though we have the Kiko Fan already at work. Mme de Roeric has also had a very unplesant toothache lately.
