Honored Sir,

I hasten to acknowledge your letter of Sept. 5th A.C. and thank you for the same. When you will be in possession of all the facts of the case you will no doubt take measures to make good for what has past and to ensure that such actions as those mentioned in my letter will occur no more on the part of the Moravian Mission in Lahul.

As regards "the real facts" of the case, I believe that the enclosed copy of the Mission's letter addressed to Captain Hugh Banon, Superintendent of Transport and Supplies of the Himalayan Research Institute of the Roerich Museum, is a fitting illustration of the Mission's attitude towards a sick lady asking for shelter in the heavy months of Indian monsoon.

In order to complete the story of the case, we could easily furnish you with a list of Churches and Cathedrals decorated by Professor de Roerich and also with a list of high dignitaries of various Christian Churches and Communities who have paid homage to Nicholas de Roerich's great achievements in the realm of spiritual work for the sake of humanity.

If you wish to have any statements of facts pertaining to the present case, I will be glad to bring them to your cognizance. Indeed, it is the duty of every Christian to battle for the truth and to dispell all misrepresentations and slanderous insinuations which may have clouded it.
