My dear Mr. Fosdick.

I have just received a letter from our august patron, Prof. Roerich, in which he has asked me to establish correspondence contact with you whom he hails as a "very able young musician". Hence this letter.

I might perhaps interest you to know that I have recently formed, in the name of the great Messiah of Culture, an organization for the promotion of cultural intercourse among the youth of the world. Our President is a distinguished Professor of English literature in a local college. In addition to our internal activities we want also to have friends and representatives abroad. It was in this connection that Prof. Roerich gave us your name. I hope you will be interested in our work and will do all you can in securing correspondents for us in the States.

I understand that there is being published in Chicago a journal of the name "World Unity" which, I am told, is in our line. As we would like to get it regularly for our library will you kindly cause a specimen copy of the same to be sent to me? I shall be much obliged if you will.

I am the Secretary of the Roerich Students' International. I am at present studying in the Loyola College which is being conducted by the Jesuit Fathers. I am sixteen years old and am interested in journalism--I frequently contribute articles to Indian magazines. All this is only by the way.

Just now I am preparing a pamphlet setting forth our aims and objects. As soon as it is ready I shall send you a stock of the same for circulation all over the States.

Our Society has 45 members on its rolls. It comprises students of German, French, Italian and Japanese nationalities besides the Indian. Thus it is truly international in conception and composition.

Indeed the cause of culture is very near to our hearts. In this materialistic age it stands forth as a lightning among the clouds. The interests of peace can best be served by the servants of Culture. In this our aim I hope we will have your valued cooperation. As a matter of fact

we shall look to you as one who will rise with steadfastness and resolution to spread the seeds that will grow into mighty trees under the shade of which all nations may live happily and peacefully. Whatever you may do in this regard will be of distinct service to the Cause to which both of us have dedicated our lives.
