I wish to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 30th ult. I take it that your inquiry concerns the Himalayan Research Institute with Headquarters at Naggar, Kulu. This Institute under the presidentyhip of Prof. N. de Roerich, is a research base established in the Himalayas to conduct scientific exploration in the Himalayan region and ajacent countries. The Institute consists of two departments a The Department for the study of ethnology, archaeology and linguistics and The Department of natural science. The first department has been so far concerned mainly with the study of Tibet, for which purpose the Institute has founded the series "Tibetica" of which the first volume on the dialect of Labul has appeared in 1934. At present this department in engaged in completing a Tibetan-English Dictionary, a leaflet of which is herewith enclosed. The second department conducted an extensive botanical survey in Western Tibet and the adjoining Himalayas as well as the Punjab. The results of this survey will be published by Dr.E.D.Merrill, Prof. of Botany, Harvard University, who is preparing a monograph on the subject, for the Institute. The department has also gathered information and made an extensive collection of Tibetan materia medica. The Institute has published three
