

I have the pleasure to send under separate cover for your information a copy of the first issue of the Proceedings of the National Institute of Sciences of India, containing an account of the foundation of the Institute and of the objects thereof, concerning which special reference is invited to Section IV of the President's Inaugural Address.

From this (p.22) you will find that one of the duties of the National Institute will be to issue a consolidated Compten rendus or Proceedings containing summaries of papers read before the cooperating Academies. On further consideration it has appeared to the Council that such a publication, though useful, would only partially satisfy the need that is felt for a consolidated publication containing summaries of papers read not only before the Academies but before all scientific societies in India, as well as papers published by scientific departments, research institutions and universities. The Council of the National Institute has, therefore, decided to invite the conceptation of all societies, departments, and institutions that publish scientific papers in helping the National Institute to produce a consolidated Armetated Bibliography of Science in India, under the title of 'Indian Science Abstracts', commencing with papers published in the calendar year 1935.

Assuming that the societies, departments, research institutions and universities will welcome this opportunity to cooperate
in the production of such a work, the Council of the National Institute have formed an Editorial Committee specially for this purpose,
and it appears to the Council that this project can be carried out
with the greatest ease, and with the least chance of error, if each
society, department, and institution is invited to submit abstracts
or summaries of all papers published as soon as possible after publications

The plan is to classify abstracts and summaries into 9 main sections as follows:

- I. General.
- II. Mathematics including Mathematics, Astronomy and Geodesy.
- III. Physics including Physics and Meteorology.
- IV. Chemistry including Pure and Applied Chemistry.
- V. Engineering Sciences including Engineering, Mining, Metallurgy, Electro-technics and kindred subjects.
- VI. Geology including Geology, Palaeontology, Mineralogy and Geography.
- VII. Botany including Pure and Applied Botany.
- VIII. Zoology including Pure and Applied Zoology and Anthropology including Ethnology.
- IX. Physiology including Animal Physiology and Medical subjects, with sub-divisions under each section,

It is proposed to aim at a quarterly issue and to publish each quarter such summaries as have come to hand, retaining throughout the same sectional numbering, so that a reader interested, for example in Chemistry, would turn at once to Section IV in each successive issue

With reference to the financing of this scheme, the funds of the Institute are at present limited, and it is hoped that each contributing society or institution will regard the cause as sufficiently desirable to justify an annual contribution of Rs. 100/-, although it is recognised that some of the smaller societies and institutions might prefer to contribute Rs. 50/- annually. In return it is proposed to issue to each contributing Institute a sufficient number of copies of the annotated bibliography to make up the value of the contribution— Rs. 100 or Rs. 50 as the case may be.

Jour Council, and let me know in due course whether your Council you approve(s) of the scheme, and in addition is prepared to collaborate in the manner suggested and to contribute financially to the extent suggested. Should your Service be for any reason unable to contribute financially as suggested, your collaboration is still desired in the supply of abstracts of papers.

On receipt from you of an intimation that your Society Institution is prepared to collaborate, the Editor will send you a copy of the instructions concerning the preparation of abstracts.

It is thought by the Council of the National Institute that the issue of such an annotated bibliography will perform two functions (1) of giving to each scientist an account of all the scientific work done in India, and (2) of ensuring that every scientist's work is brought to the notice of all other scientists not only in India but abroad, for it is anticipated that this publication will attain a wide circulation both in India and abroad.







MUSEUM OF ZOOLOGY

The Guatemala party is off to the Peten district for the season, probably until June 1. Dr. Van Tyne, Dr. Murie, and Dr. Bartlett departed from a crowd of friends at the Michigan Central Station, at 9:25 a. m., Tuesday, January 20, en route for New Orleans. They had a half day to spend in the Field Museum in Chicago before starting south to their port of sailing. As this goes to press (January 23) the United Fruit Co. S. S., "Coppename," is sliding away from the pier, off for Belize and other Caribbean ports, with the biologists aboard. Our expedition lands at Belize, British Honduras, January 26, and, weather permitting, will at once ascend the Belize River to El Cayo, at the head of navigation, in company with the two men of the Carnegie Institution of Washington who are directing the excavating at the ruined Mayan city of Uaxactun. At this point the party will find mules waiting to take men and baggage by trail four or five days north to Uaxactun. Heavy rains in the Peten, notice of which was cabled by Dr. Rickettsan at Guatemala City, may delay entry into the region. The men are all prepared to do some collecting along the British Honduras coast and the lower reaches of the Belize River if the delay is necessitated.

The last week before departure was hectic. Flash-light powder boomed and hissed as the newspaper photographers shot the party, shot the n poring over maps, standing absorbed over maps, and dreaming over maps; shot them behind piles of baggage, popped them at their desks and over specimens. But the packing was completed and all baggage was off prior to the expedition's departure, in accordance with the field man's one unbreakable rule, "Never get ahead of your baggage."

The birds, mammals, and plants of the Peten have a hard season ahead of MUSEUM OF ANTHROPOLOGY

In the Division of the Great Lakes, Miss Fine has made excellent progress in compiling the records for the index of the many maps collected by Dr. Hinsdale. Some time has been spent in reviewing and rearranging the archæological material. We are all much pleased because Dr. Hinsdale has brought to the museum his collection of baskets, which we understand will be placed on exhibit in one of the cases on the fourth floor.

Two of the cases from the old building have been rebuilt, and placed in the range of the Division of Ethnology. Dr. Gilmore has chosen an interesting series of specimens illustrating the principal features of North American Indian ethnobotany for exhibition in these cases.

During the month, our Honorary Curator in the Division of the Orient, Benjamin March, of the Detroit Institute of Art, spent an afternoon with us, devoting much of his time to an examination of certain ceramic fragments from the Philippines, which have recently been unpacked. We are happy to report that the Morse collection of Philippine material, housed in this Division, has been rearranged and catalogued. It contains 218 specimens.

At the request of the Carnegie Institution of Washington and the Peabody Museum of Harvard University, the University administration has granted Dr. Guthe permission to devote a portion of his time to the task of reviewing the evidence and arguments concerning the correlation between Maya and Christian chronology, a highly technical question, which has been brought to a sharp focus by the recent publications of Dr. Spinden, of the Brooklyn Museum, and Dr. Teeple, of the Carnegie Institution. The main point at issue is the Maya method of recording lunar phenomena, as recorded in two hieroglyphs in the supplementary series found in the inscriptions.

UNIVERSITY HERBARIUM

Mr. James B. McFarlin, a member of the Herbarium staff, is in balmy Florida this winter making an exhaustive study of the flora of Polk County. A recent letter tells of profitable and interesting field work in spite of the unusual winter season. His report reads, "cold and disagreeable with frost for nearly two months," and he adds that he has never been so cold in his life. However, his descriptions of the high, rolling pine lands, long stretches of low, flat woods, deep cypress swamps, and the veritable thickets and jungles of the hummocks, make a picture that seems like a collector's paradise. He is finding an abundance of material for study.

Professor H. H. Bartlett is off again on a trek in quest of the new and rare. With Dr. J. Van Tyne and Dr. A. Murie of the Museum of Zoology, he will carry on investigations in Guatemala, in connection with the explorations of the Carnegie Institution of Washington, with headquarters at Uaxactun. We are indeed fortunate in having the advantage of Professor Bartlett's skillful collecting and are looking forward with interest to the outcome of the trip.

An acquisition during the past month was a collection of more than 1000 flowering plants from the high altitudes of the Himalnya Mountains of northern India. The plants were collected by Dr. Walter Koelz, and were sent thru the kindness of the Director of the Urusvati Himalavan Research Institute of the Roerich Museum. They make a fine and acceptable addition to our collection from the Punjab.

NEWS OF THE REPTILES AND AMPHIBIANS

When the Herpetology Division returned from Christmas vacation, there were new gray rubber mats in Dr. Ruthven's laboratory and a dazzling, freshly-oiled laboratory bench in the cataloguing room.

A fine collection of neotropical reptiles has been received again, as so many times in the past, from the Harvard duplicates.

The poikilothermal pets of the Division are all doing well. Besides offering excellent opportunity for observations, they keep glowing the spark called hope-of-life which the winter months so nearly snuff out. The fire-bellied toad, that formerly had to be compelled to open his mouth and swallow the food—delicious, tempting food—which was thrust therein, now swallows of his own free will. Both the lacertid lizards eat eagerly and well. The red-bellied tri-

ton has an enormous appetite and eats beyond our expectations, even to our astonishment. The five-and-ten baby turtles have been transferred to the live-room. Whether or not their food habits are regular is still undetermined.

Mrs. Gaige has been very busy with reams of manuscript and gallons of frogs and toads.

Mr. Hartweg spent a few days during the holidays examining turtles at the U. S. National Museum.

NEWS OF THE BIRDS

The Curator of the Division of Birds has cleaned and made up more than one hundred flat and greasy bird skins since July, and has skinned and made study specimens of fifty birds that came in the flesh.

We have received a fine lot of specimens from E. Doane of Labrador: one Iceland gull, the first for our collection; three kittiwakes (gulls), of which we had only one specimen; one long-eared owl, which we believe is the first record for Labrador. A flock of pine siskins has been noted near Ann Arbor, also a black rough-legged hawk, by Wm Haynes.

Dr. Van Tyne has spent much of his time collecting and packing material for the Guatemalan expedition, which left Ann Arbor on January 20.

William G. Fargo is settled at Passa-Grille, Florida, for the winter, bird collecting. He left January 6, driving down by car.

NEWS OF THE FISHES

The Division of Fishes has had its usual quota of distinguished visitors during the past month. Dr. Myron Gordon, of Cornell University, completed his work with Dr. Hubbs on the collections made in Mexico last spring, and has returned to Cornell. Mr. and Mrs. W. J. K. Harkness arrived from Toronto the first of the month; they are busily engaged in work with the sturgeons, life history, rate of growth, embryology, and so forth. Mr. and Mrs. C. Willard Greene have just begun a month's further work on the Wisconsin fishes. Mr. Greene has taken a month's leave from his work with the New York Conservation Department and hopes to make great progress on his old problem of the distribution of fishes in Wisconsin.

We have been very fortunate in the talks at our Fish Seminars. Carl Russell, of the National Parks Service, gave us a fine illustrated talk on the fisheries work of the National Parks; and Dr. Harkness gave three illustrated lectures on the fisheries investigations being carried on in the Province of Ontario.

Dr. Hubbs and Dr. Gordon spent a week in Chicago going over Meek's old collections from Mexico. They were comparing types with their proposed new species and are now ready to complete the manuscript upon the collections made by Creaser and Gordon in Mexico last spring. Several new subspecies, species, and genera will be described. Also several new fascinating points have been raised concerning hybridizaton of fishes.

The most outstanding accession for the month has been the old Miles collection, presented to us by Michigan State College. This collection is of great historical interest, but in rather poor condition and poorly labeled. W. G. Parris has sent a collection of fishes from the Tennessee River. S. C. Bishop sent a large collection of material from about Rochester for identification. Two Chinese fishes have just arrived from P. W. Fang. One of the most startling acquisitions is an entirely new species of fish collected in a spring in Nevada by C. T. Brues of Harvard.

Aside from the ordinary routine of the Institute for Fisheries Research, Gerald McCrimmon has made frequent trips to the various lakes about Ann Arbor, checking the fishing being done through the ice. There seem to be plenty of fish shanties on the lakes but not a great many fish are being caught. We have just had word that the Water Refining Company is shipping us a second Iron Trap Filter. This filter is being sent as an indefinite loan for experimental purposes. We have had such outstanding success with the first that we hope to accomplish a great deal with the additional equipment.

NEWS OF THE MOLLUSKS

The Division of Mollusks, in January, passed the number 50,000 in its accession catalogue. The period covered by the accessions is about eighty years if we may begin with the "curiosities" that Asa Gray sent back from

Europe at the time he was commissioned to acquire books for the University Library. It might seem that the accumulations have amounted to no more than 600 lots a year, yet during these eighty years there were decades in which few or no specimens were added to the collection, long stretches of time in which the collection was neglected and suffered losses rather than enrichment, movings, storages, and casualties, as destructive as earthquakes; and these exigencies no doubt account for the differences known to exist between the records and the specimens supposed to be represented by them. The most of the material dates from the year that Miss Winslow came to the Museum and began systematic cataloguing and proper storage. The Division is at present engaged in numbering and putting into cases about 1000 identified and labeled lots. None of these has been in the institution much more than a year ,and it seems likely, considering the rate of growth today, that there will be a thousand more before the end of 1931.

In the early eighties of the last century, Professor Richard Ellsworth Call spent a summer season or two in Georgia and Alabama. He was the kind of collector who took everything in sight. His opportunities were unusual, as much of the original forest was still standing and most of the streams were unpolluted even by cotton field loam and were not much changed by water power development. As he appears to have been immune to damage by rural hospitality and willing enough to travel mule-back, he reached districts into which automobile roads have not yet penetrated. Call sold much of his collection, but retained the bulk of it, until finally, by gift or sale, it passed to the Museum cf Comparative Zoology. Two huge cartons of the material have been sent here for identification, and the Division has been allowed a liberal amount of sampling as remuneration for the labor. By this means we have obtained shells of local races whose colonies have long been extinct, and in addition we have some topotypes of rarities. The impression given by Mr. Clench's letter is that only a beginning has yet been made on the Call collection.

The expedition is financed by grants from the Faculty Research Fund of the University of Michigan and from the Carnegie Institution of Washington. We are off to a good start on a twenty-year job in the Maya country.

Museum Visitors.—W. E. Clyde Todd, Curator of Birds in the Carnegie Museum, spent a couple of days with rs. He came up from the Cleveland meetings with Dr. Van Tyne and went over some of our Labrador bird collections. Prof. J. G. Needham, head

of the Department of Entomology of Cornell University, visited us while lecturing in Ann Arbor, and renewed an old acquaintance with E. B. Williamson via the dragonfly route.

As the January ARK went to press, fourteen past, present, or associated members of the Museum staffs presented papers at the A.A.A.S. meetings in Cleveland: Dr. Hubbs, Dr. Van Oosten, Dr. Wright, T. L. Hankinson, and H. J. Deason addressed the General (Hydrobiology) Session; Gerritt Bevelander, the American Society of Zoologists; Dr. Byers, the Entomological Society of America; Wendell Krull, the American Society of Parasitologists: Dr. Van Tyne, the Wilson Ornithological Club; Dr. Dice and W. L. Strunk, the Ecological Society of America; Dr. Guthe, Dr. White, and Dr. Gilmore, the Anthropology Section (H), of which Dr. Guthe is Chairman.

Mr. Carl P. Russell, Field Naturalist of the National Parks Service, gave an extremely interesting illustrated talk in the Seminar Room, January 15, on Educational Projects in the National Parks. This talk elaborated and made graphic the activities briefly touched upon in the article contributed by Mr. Russell to the January ARK.

"A first-class example of a perverted sense of humour,"-that's what the President calls the whole incident of Old Henry's mysterious disappearance and reappearance. The life-size bust of Old Henry, the Ottawa Indian, Mr. Angell's original cast, which was placed on a pedestal in the rotunda of the Museum, disappeared over night a year and a half ago. The other day a person, presumably an innocent bystander, approached Prof. White of the Department of Anthropology, stating that an Indian head had been found in a rooming-house basement and would be returned if no questions would be asked. It was returned; no questions were asked; and the Department of Anthropology turned over to Mr. Angell his old friend, who had not suffered as many injuries as we feared. No reward can be offered, unfortunately, for the scalp of the of-

Dr. Ruthven reports that he has been appointed member of a national Council for the Conservation of Whales. This appointment undoubtedly is the result of it becoming known that the President is looking for something really big in the way of a job.

CENSUS OF NEUROCORDULIAS (DRAGONFLIES)

In defining the subfamilies of dragonflies, one finds that Libellulinæ and Cordulinæ cause more trouble than any of the others. And yet the collector, in any locality where the two families occur, in general finds libellulines both numerous and conspicuous, while the cordulines are apparently rare and are most certainly seldom observed. For a few of the many corduline genera this is not true, but the exceptions serve to emphasize the general condition. In spite of their size some of the cordulines are among the least known of all North American insects.

The genus Neurocordulia belongs to a group of four genera, two of which occur in North America, one in South America, and one in Madagascar. Not only is the number of genera in the group small, but the total number of species in the four genera is also small, two genera being known each from a single species. The genus Neurocordulia contains four nominal species, and the solution of the problem of specific rights awaits adequate material, since two of the species are known, each from a single female. Further comment on the rarity, or retiring habits, of Neurocordulias, in the light of these facts, is unnecessary.

A bit of sentimental interest attaches to the fact that Thomas Say, in 1839, in a posthumous paper, described the first Neurocodulia, naming it Libellula obsoleta. Say said of the species that it "inhabits Indiana and Massachusetts." The Massachusetts material consisted of a single female collected by T. W. Harris at Milton, Massachusetts, in 1820-so far as known the earliest capture of a Neurocordulia. Later, in the same year, Burmeister described a single male, under another name, from New Orleans. And in 1863 Walsh described a single female, under still another name, from Rock Island, Illinois. In 1873, Hagen summarized the situation thus: "This is one of the rarest and most interesting species. Besides the specimen (a male) from Indiana described by Mr. Say, only three other specimens (Harris' female, Burmeister's male and Walsh's female) are known." And in 1890, Hagen records that Say's Indiana male and Walsh's Illinois female had been destroyed, and that no additions had been made except a single male from Galena, Illinois. So far as collections of dragonflies were concerned, here

was a species threatened with extermination. Since Say's time no specimens have been captured in Indiana. Fortunately other regions have been more productive. In 1893 Calvert reported a female from Pennsylvania. In 1900 records were more numerous. Burnham took a male near Manchester, New Hampshire; Calvert recorded a female from Delaware Water Gap, New Jersey; and Hine reported that Dury and his associates at Cincinnati had taken specimens for three consecutive seasons. In 1901 Needham gave the first description of the nymph, a single specimen from Pennsylvania, and in a footnote recorded exuviæ from White Lake at Nashville, Tennessee, by Williamson. Wadsworth took the species at Manchester, Maine, as recorded by F. L. Harvey in 1902. And in 1903 Calvert reported exuviæ and a dead imago taken at Lake Hopatcong, New Jersey. In the same year Williamson reported a nymph from Chattanooga, Tennessee (C. C. Adams), and several nymphs from the Cumberland River near Nashville. They were clinging to fish traps when the traps were drawn from the water. In 1906 Brimley reported a capture by G. M. Bentley at Wilmington, North Carolina, April 3, 1905. Howe in 1917 first called attention to its crepuscular habits and reported it from Meredith Neck, New Hampshire, July 27-29. Another southern record became available when Brimley in 1918 recorded it from Southern Pines, North Carolina, June 5, 1909 (A. H. Manee). In 1924 H. Garman reported a nymph from the Cumberland River at Pineville, Tennessee; and the next year Needham reported five exuviæ from Lake George, New York, W. T. Davis, a most competent observer and collector, in 1927, at the age of 65, after a life time spent in the field, says, "The writer has collected but three specimens of obsoleta". When the captures are totalled, one arrives at about twelve males, twelve females, and twenty-five nymphs and exuviæ.

Thirty-six years after obsoleta was described, Abbé Provancher described and named a sing!e male from Mt. Yamaska, Province of Quebec, as Aeschna yamaskanensis. He obtained a single female two years later in 1877. So matters stood as regards this species for nearly twenty-five years when, in 1900, Hine reported its capture on Rattle Snake Island in Lake Erie by

Professor Osborn. A year later Harvey reported the capture of five males and two females at Orono, Maine. Walker in 1906 reported that about a dozen exuviæ were found on the logs of a timber slide on Ragged Lake in Algonquin Park, Canada. In 1910 Calvert reported the capture of a male by Mr. Daecke at Perdix, near Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. Walker in 1913 describes the nymph from specimens found in numbers at Go Home Bay, and in the Muskoka Lakes district, and in 1915 records for the first time its crepuscular habits, flight commencing soon after sundown and continuing about half an hour, and says it is abundant and of general distribution in the vicinity of Go Home Bay. Kennedy, 1922, who found it abundant along rocky shores of the Bass Islands in Lake Erie, confirms Walker as to its crepuscular habits, and says it rests during the day in trees. Byers, 1925, under the name N. obsoleta, records a (very) teneral male collected at East Pcint Pools, Cheboygan Co., Michigan. And, to close the record, P. Garman in 1927 reported its capture at Salisbury, Connecticut. In the case of yamaskanensis we have a species apparently much less retiring than obsoleta; and estimating as well as possible the frequently indefinite records, it seems that the number of specimens in collections is about thirty males, an equal number of females, and about fifty nymphs and exuviæ. The Museum of Zoology has a perfect female taken along the cold, clear, rocky Current River in Carter County, Missouri, which seems to be almost certainly this species, and, if this identification is correct, we have here a surprising extension of its range.

Muttkowski described Neurocordulia clara in 1910 from a single female from Alabama. This is getting pretty close to the locality from which Burmeister's type of polysticta (identified by Hagen and de Selys as obsoleta) came. Davis described Neurocordulia virginiensis in 1927 from a single female taken in Buckingham Co., Virginia, and captured eight years before. During these eight years no more specimens could be obetained but on the opposite side of the James River female obsoleta was Byers has some undetermined nymphs from Florida. His best efforts failed to yield him an imago. In the dragonfly collection of the Museum of Zoology there are the following imagoes: 2 males and 2 females of N. obsoleta. and 8 males and 5 females of N. yamaskensis.

MUSEUM OF ZOOLOGY

When the American Ornithologists' Union decided last year to hold its 1931 meeting in Detroit, many members expressed the hope that they might take this opportunity of visiting Ann Arbor and seeing our museum. So we arranged to have one day's session here.

In spite of bad business conditions and the distance of Detroit from the east, where the majority of the members live, the meeting had an unusually large attendance and was very successful. Twenty-two Fellows and a large number of Members were on hand for the business meeting, which opened the session on October 19th. They came from all parts of the country. California, Maine, British Columbia, and Florida were represented, as well as most of the ornithological centers between.

The main session on Wednesday was held in the fourth floor exhibition hall of the Museum and a double session was held in the afternoon, a program on conservation occupying the seminar room.

President Ruthven came to the opening of the Ann Arbor meeting and welcomed the Union to our Museum. The program was a most interesting one but cannot, for lack of space, be detailed here. The most important of the papers by our own members was Mr. Wood's illustrated account of his findings on the rare Harlan's Hawk. There were also papers that day by Harrison Lewis, John B. May, Alfred O. Gross, Myron H. Swenk, Alfred Bailey, and others.

But the real center of the meeting was the Bird Range. Never before has Michigan seen such a concentration of ornithological erudition. Gathered there were ever-changing groups of ornithologists, talking together and working over specimens. They found much to interest them in our collection. J. L. Peters studied the ruffed grouse, which he is now revising. F. H. Kennard, of snow goose fame, found in our collection the first Chen

MUSEUM OF ANTHROPOLOGY

The limitations of space in this issue of the ARK make it necesary to confine the notes on the activities of this museum to a statement of accomplishments during the summer. The developments since the middle of September will be reported upon in the next issue.

The outstanding event of the summer has been the issuance and distribution through the General Library of the "Archæological Atlas of Michigan" by Wilbert B. Hinsdale. The columns of the ARK have contained for many months items concerning the progress made upon the monograph. It is the result of nine years of detailed study of Michigan archæology, pursued with a never-wavering vision by the author. The text, the illustrations, and the twenty two-color plates constitute a folio volume, 19 by 24 inches, upon which the Museum of Anthropology congratulates the author, and in which it takes great pride, as a member of the Museums organization issuing the series of which this book is a part.

During the early part of the summer Dr. Hinsdale took two field trips. The second week in July he went to Grand Ledge and Diamondale to study Jay See's collection of Michigan stone implements in the latter city. He also called upon Charles B. Fuller of Grand Ledge, who is making casts of interesting archæological specimens which have been found in Michigan. On July 27, Dr. Hinsdale left Ann Arbor for a three weeks tour of the western part of this peninsula and the eastern part of the northern peninsula. A visit was made to Leelanau County for the purpose of meeting living Indians and examining archæological sites. Photographs, notes, and a few specimens were collected. Later Dr. Hinsdale found some new archæological sites in Chippewa County near the Soo. He also called upon Father Gagnieur, S.J., at St. Ignace, who has accumulated a great deal of information on the Chip-

UNIVERSITY HERBARIUM

Several new people have been added to the staff of the University Herbariun to replace those whose appointments ended in June. Mrs. Jennie Drummond is Recording Assistant in charge of the Herbarium Library. Library hours are 8:00-10:00 a.m. and 3:00-5:00 p. m., but access may be had during the remaining working hours by applying to Mrs. Drummond. Joseph Tidd is a Graduate Assistant who is helping with the crytogamic collections. James Tuttle and Claudia Siple are Student Assistants working with phanerogams. J. B. McFarlin is back after a year's residence in Florida, where he collected in Polk County. He brought back an extensive collection of flowering plants, mosses, and lichens. Mrs. Frances J. Thorpe is abroad for the first semester. She writes of profitable interviews with Dr. Dixon, the leading English moss student. She has had the opportunity of studying his excellent moss herbarium.

The field work of the summer, by expeditions and by individual collectors, has brought some very interesting The Director, Dr. E. B. material. Mains, spent a part of September in Emmet County, Michigan, and has a nice set of fungi from that locality. Dr. L. E. Wehmeyer and Alexander Smith were together in Nova Scotia all summer and report abundant rains and favorable conditions for good field work. J. L. Lowe was in Syracuse, N. Y., making a study of the polypores of New York. He visited the chief herbaria of the state and did some good field work as well. Dr. Wm. R. Taylor brought back from Wood's Hole a nice lot of algae from the east coast. Dr. J. H. Ehlers made a special study of the genus Solidago around the Michigan Biological camp and in the Upper Peninsula. We have the material from Lake Superior collected by Carl O. Grassl, who, with George Stanley, made a study of the lake beaches.

MOLLUSK DIVISION

The field work of the Mollusk Division consisted of one and a third expeditions, which is to say that the Division had one party of its own and bought a third interest in another.

The Michigan party devoted itself to getting further series of mollusks from streams already visited by one collector or another, to looking into streams hitherto unexplored, to hunting for a lost species or two, and to observing variations of fauna from stream head to mouth. Rains that fell the first night out followed us, until the decision was made one noon to peep into just one more river in the territory which we had planned to work and then strike across the Mississippi for a rainless belt. That afternoon, the skies cleared and thereafter the weather was an ally and thoughtful protector. Luck was with us also in other instances. Due apparently to the world renowned depression, a dam in the Elk River had been emptied of its waters and out of a small part of its mud floor we dug Naiades that are rare in collections even as one or two specimens. Again, in the Duck River magnificent collecting was carried on just below a dam where the mill was idle and had empounded the stream for a work day ahead. By wriggling over red clay roads that seemed to have no mind at all as to where they were going the party reached that part of Muscle Shoals which lies between the new Lake Wilson and the deep water above the rock reefs. A visit was made to the Alabama Museum of Natural History before we turned northward. This part of the trip is particularly memorable because of a new, high road that ran through forests, at the base of which was a swift river untainted of sewage, mine waste, factory waste, or field wash. It may further be said for the road that it hadn't a hot-dog stand the entire length of it.

The other expedition, under charge of William J. Clench, invaded the Appalachian country, going down on the west side and coming home on the east. Among the things sought for was the habitat of the strange Elliptio spinosus, a clam with spines upon it, that has been taken from the Altamaha River of eastern Georgia. It was

hoped to learn why it bore thorns. The Altamaha now is a poor sort of soup, and it seems probable that E. spinosus has surrendered to the altered conditions and become extinct. A good deal of land collecting was done in the Carolina mountains. The material is being worked up by Allen F. Archer at the Museum of Comparative Zoology. The catch of fresh water univalves is here now for study, and should be reported upon this winter. C. G.

CRUSTACEAN DIVISION

The Crustacean Division has been enriched to the extent of several thousand specimens during the past summer. The major portion of these were obtained by an expedition in the lower Mississippi valley. Aside from a few rattle-snakes, eight-inch rainfalls, a bank robbery in Tennessee, and the unique experience of being mistaken for revenue officers in Kentucky, the expedition was entirely uneventful. In Missouri the expedition became confused by finding itself in Ironton instead of Irondale. This blunder was compensated by the discovery of a new species at Ironton. Heavy rainfalls curtailed our activities in certain sections of Louisiana and Mississippi.

Much of the material obtained will be examined by Donald Ameel for parasitic infection. By such study the distribution of the fluke, **Paragonimus**, living in the lungs of mink, pig, and cat may be ascertained. The crayfish is an intermediate host. This study is unique in that the distribution of a snail and a parasite can, in all probability, be worked out from an examination of the hearts of crayfish from various localities.

Other additions to our collections have been furnished by J. Clark Salyer, working in Missouri and Kansas, and by the Institute for Fisheries Research in Michigan. R. E. Coker has recently sent phyllopod and decapod material from North Carolina. Dr. Carl L. Hubbs brought back a few valuable additions obtained while on his "vacation" in Arkansas and Tennessee.

Work has been renewed this fall on the monograph of the North American crawdads.

A glance backward reminds us that in the year 1863 we had 187 specimens of crustaceans, while today if we were to start counting the individuals in our range, after we passed the 20,000 mark we would still be going strong. E. P. C.

INSECT DIVISION

I. Speed Rogers has left us to return to his department at the University of Florida. He stayed with us all summer working on the collections and carrying on field work. After the year with us, Rog is greatly missed; especially at night the closed door of his office emphasizes his absence. In the interests of needed economy in the Museum his position was not filled in the insect division, so we start the year with a good friend away and even more short handed than before. We learn from his letters that his department is experiencing a record enrollment this year and that every facility is taxed to the utmost.

Associate Curators A. W. Andrews and Sherman Moore have added many good records from their collection during the summer. We had a week-end with them at the Edwin S. George Reserve, and hope during the next year to have many more.

T. H. Hubbell spent the summer with us working over the Orthoptera collection, which is now rounding into fine shape. In typical Hub fashion he put forty-eight working hours into each day and accomplished an astonising amount of work in one summer.

J. K. Gwynn Silvey made a collection of insects for us in Texas with a short trip into Old Mexico.

E. B. Williamson wound up the summer with a trip through the south-castern states, on which he broke all existing records for North American dragonfly collecting, including new species, long series of rarities, and as interesting a lot of beautiful specimens as could be imagined. There is a real thrill in handling his captures of the trip.

Mrs. L. K. Gloyd combed the back country of the far southwest and amplified her collections of the previous season with more beautiful odonate material.

From other sources nice material has come in, including some specimens from Cuba, by-products of Mr. Greenhall's herpetological expedition to the island.

Holland's new edition of the Butterfly Book is just at hand, together with the first three numbers of **Revista de** Entomologia, a most interesting new entomological journal published in San Paulo, Brazil.

FISH DIVISION

The summer has been a busy one for the Fish Division, although the work has been confined to the state of Michigan. Ten men were in the field from the middle of June till the middle of September. The State Izaak Walton League sponsored the lake survey work, as previously. This year a party of six were assigned to that branch of our research activities. Six weeks were devoted to Hillsdale County, two more to work in scattered regions and about six to Antrim County. A great deal of material was obtained for the Museum and much information of use for practical purposes of conservation. Canuto Manuel completed the gathering of data for his work on the food of the tern. J. Clark Salver collected a good lot of bird stomachs for his problem of trout versus trout enemies. Dr. John R. Greeley spent a month starting the New York summer survey and then continued his study of trout streams in Michigan. Clarence Tarzwell spent the summer putting barriers in the Michigan trout streams. Dr. Hubbs was in Ann Arbor most of the summer, taking occasional short trips about the state superintending the scattered field parties. The latter part of September the Hubbs family drove to Hot Springs, Arkansas, to attend the meetings of the American Fisheries Society.

During the summer Milton B. Trautman and Joe Howland spent a few days going over some of our material and working out papers with Dr. Hubbs. Mr. Trautman is again with us writing a paper with Dr. Hubbs. Leonard Schultz, of the University of Washington, and a student of his, Allan Delacy, spent July and August identifying the 1926 Pacific coast collections. In the course of the summer Mr. Schultz and Dr. Hubbs finished several papers on the material.

We have obtained several valuable accessions, probably the most outstanding being a fine lot of fishes from Missouri, brought in by Mr. Salyer. Dr. Charles Burt has continued to send small lots of fishes during the summer. Ralph DeSola sent some much desired material from Georgia. The Oklaho-

ma survey was continued under Dr. A. I. Ortenburger's supervision. Numerous small lots of useful specimens are coming in at all times.

Orel Shoebridge was married last July to Stewart Carter, of Goderich, Ontario. Mrs. Carter is continuing her work in the Institute for Fisheries Research for the present.

R. W. Eschmeyer was married in September. Mr. Eschmeyer is continuing his supervision of the lake survey for the Institute. Mrs. Eschmeyer is working in the University Library.

HERPETOLOGY DIVISION

Among the visitors to the Division since the last ARK are Dr. and Mrs. E. R. All were interested in the examination of certain specimens, and we were particularly proud to be able to offer large series of each.

Howard K. Glovd returned from the west, at the end of the summer, with a large series of specimens. L. C. Stuart brought back a fine series representing intensive collecting in restricted habitats of the basin-range province of Utah. Dr. Burt sent in various small collections from different parts of the country. A collection of Cuban reptiles and batrachians, very good in view of revolutions, hurricanes, and the like, was obtained by Arthur M. Greenhall. T. E. White gathered a presentable lot of specimens in Texas between blows of the paleontological pick and daubs of paleontological shellac.

Cataloging of the specimens received during the summer has already progressed beyond the initial stage.

BIRD DIVISION

On June 12, Mr. Wood returned from a six weeks collecting trip on Keweenaw Point where he found some rare and interesting birds. Leonard Wing was in the Upper Peninsula at the same time looking up the rarer birds of that region, and was with Mr. Wood in Crawford County from August 4 to 8. Here they found young

clay-colored sparrows in the same locality where Mr. Wing found the first nest and young of this species for the state. Dr. Van Tyne has identified and catalogued many of the unworked collections, and with Mr. Wing has put the collection in order.

A few birds have been sent in. An immature red-throated loon from Prof. J. N. Lowe of Marquette is very acceptable, as it is a rare bird for the state.

The first meting of the Bird Club for the year was held in the Seminar Room, October 28. A. D. Tinker talked on the birds of Whitefish Point; Leonard Wing reported on the first breeding of the clay-colored sparrow in Michigan; and Dr. Van Tyne gave some intimate and behind-the-scenes news of the A. O. U. meetings.

MAMMAL DIVISION

Ordinarily there is a general exodus of mammalogists at the beginning of the summer, but this year proved the exception. This was in part due to the return, at the end of the school year, of two expeditions which had been in the field during the winter and spring months. Early in August Dr. Dice journeyed to Sand Point, where ten days were spent making life history studies of Peromyscus. A little later Dr. Murie departed for Jackson Hole, Wyoming, where he continued studies begun a year ago. Milton Landwer spent part of the summer collecting mammals in the vicinity of the Edwin S. George Reserve. The major expedition consisted of Philip Allan's work in the New England States. From early June to late September was spent in a study of the mammals of Monomoy Island, Martha's Vineyard, and the adjacent mainland. Many live Peromyscus taken in these localities were shipped to the Museum, and a number of specimens of other forms were secured for study skins.

Wm. P. Harris, Jr., presented the Division with several fine collections of Costa Rica mammals collected by Austin Smith. Other gifts are: two skulls from Leonard Wing; an albino house mouse from Dr. J. B. Steere; three antelope skeletons from the Edwin S. George Reserve; a bat from Dr. Hubbs; and 22 live Peromyscus from Dr. and Mrs. Arthur Svihla.

The Division has purchased an electrical calculating machine, which is of great service in the statistical computations necessary in the study of variability in Peromyscus.

New assistants in the Division this year are H. J. Leraas and S. A. Hoslett, from Luther College, Milton Landwer from Texas, and Philip Hershkowitz from Pittsburgh. During the summer Robert Bradley acted as special assistant, devoting his time to reworking specimens, cleaning skulls, and tint-photometer work.

During the A. O. U. meeting, on October 21, former students W. B. Grange and W. L. Strunk were with us again. In the summer Paul Moody, Robert Enders, and L. C. Stegeman spent a few days in the Division. Dr. J. C. Cross, from the University of Texas, spent about 10 days here in early July preparing specimens of various species and subspecies of Peromyscus for cytological examination. A. H. Howell, from the U. S. Biological Survey, spent two days early in June examining our ground squirrel collection.

MUSEUMS LIBRARY

The librarian, since the last appearance of the ARK, has had the good fortune to visit several museums, including the Cleveland Museum of Natural History and the American Museum of Natural History in New York City. At the Cleveland meeting of museum librarians held in connection with the Special Libraries Association, M. W. And so it went, —dozens of ornithologists examining specimens and many others talking in small groups, discussing their common problems.

One was of the Kirtland's warbler, another of the passenger pigeon, and one especially interesting one showed all of the editions of the seven "State lists" of the birds of Michigan, this being perhaps the first time they have ever been brought together. It was altogether a memorable occasion and many of us considered it the best meeting the Museum has ever entertained.

pewas during his many years of service among them. The Father has consented to make this museum the repository for his records.

Dr. Gilmore, Curator of the Division of Ethnology, spent from July 11 to September 18 in field work in North Dakota, continuing his study of the Arikara Indians. Special attention was given to the cycle of activities in the Arikara year. Data upon folk-lore, material objects, and processes associated with their agricultural, industrial, and ceremonial occupations were secured in the form of notes, photographs, moving pictures, and specimens. Near the close of the season arrangements were made with Dr. W. D. Strong, of the Bureau of American Ethnology, whom he met in the field, by means of which the two scientists will cooperate in their study of the Arikara culture.

The Director divided his summer somewhat irregularly between the office and field. During early June he excavated an Indian mound on the shores of Lake Gogebic in the northern peninsula. Although the mound had been rifled by unknown relic hunters, some notes upon methods of construction, two copper awls and some

pottery were secured, which may serve to locate the mound culturally. On the way home, Dr. Guthe visited the field parties of the Milwaukee Public Museum, the University of Chicago, and the University of Illinois. From the twenty-third of July until the last day of August, Dr. Guthe was in Ann Arbor. The first three days of September were spent as representative of the National Research Council at the conference on Northern Plains Archæology in Vermillion, South Dakota, Within a few days after his return to Ann Arbor, he left to excavate two mounds near Stony Lake in Oceana County. The occurrence of two firepits in a north-south line in one, and the presence of two burials, a mass of secondary burials, a set of arrowmakers tools, and some pottery in the other, made this trip worth while. On the way home from Stony Lake, inquiries were made in Muskegon which resulted in a visit of three days during the first week of school, to assist in finishing the excavation of a small mound east of that city in which a burial had been found associated with rolled copper beads, a flat copper celt, a fragment of sea shell, a perforated bear's tooth, and a shattered but complete Hopewell pot. These specimens demonstrate that the interesting Hopewell culture, centering in southern Ohio, had at one time influenced the Indians of Muskegon County, just as it had those of Newaygo and Kent Counties, from which similar remains have come.

Mrs. Elizabeth Selheimer, who worked on a part time basis in the Division of the Orient last winter, spent the early summer continuing to unpack the collections of the Philippine Expedition of 1922-25. Although most of the ceramic material is now available, a few of the two hundred and eighty-odd boxes in which the material was shipped still remain unopened.




