The third volume of the Journal of the Urusvati Research Institute of the Roerich Ruseum contains much that is of interest. This volume is dedicated to Dr. Sven hedin, the great explorer of Central Asia, and opens with a sketch of his thirty years' labours. Punjab readers will be particularly interested in the account of the Cosmic Ray expedition to South-Lastern Ladakh which was undertaken last year by Lahore scientists, written by Professor J. M. Benade, the leader of the expedition. Another article which should be of interest to lahore readers is an account of a journey to the Gangotri Glacier by Professor Kashyap of the Punjab University. This readable and informative article is profusely illustrated by excellent photographs. There is a concise account of recent archaeological discoveries in India, written by Colonel A.R. Lahon, D.S. C., which should be of general interest. Count du Lesnil du Buisson, Director of the Archaelogical Mission of Mishrife-Qatna, contributes an instructive article on the use of clues in excavations. Throughout the ancient world there have been found evidences of the knowledge of the benefit to be derived from exposure of the surface of the body to the sun and air. With the conquest of the world by Christianity this hygienic measure was sacrificed until well into the middle of the eighteenth century. With the accumulation of scientific knowledge there has been a simultaneous increase in the knowledge of the public as to the benefits to be derived from exposure to sun and air. In an article on the Rôle of the Skin in the Preservation of Realth Professor S. Metalnikoff, of the Institut Pasteur, Paris, stresses the value of air and sun baths. There is a lengthy and scholarly article on the Tibetan dialect of Lahul by Dr. Georges de Roerich which should ensure this volume finding a permanent place on the shelves of students of Oriental languages. The subject

is one on which the writer is an acknowledged authority. The annual report of the Institute and a description of its new building for medical research are interesting accounts of the work that is being carried out under the supervision of Professor de Roerich and give some idea of the multiple activities of the Roerich Museum in New York and its Himalayan branch at Naggar, Kulu. In addition to the above are other articles that will appeal to the scientist as well as to the general reader. The previous volumes had set up a high standard which has been fully maintained, if not surpassed, in the present volume and the Institute is to be congratulated on the success of its labours.
